Union Home Minister Amit Shah on Sunday extended Hindi Diwas greetings, and asked everyone to respect all Indian languages and move forward towards a self-reliant, self-confident and developed country. Shah noted that from the heights

of the Himalayas to the vast beaches of the South, from the desert to the rugged forests and village 'chaupalas', languages have shown the way to a man in every situation to stay organised and move forward unitedly through communication and expression. He also said that the greatest strength of India's languages is that they have provided every class and community with an opportunity for expression. "Our country is fundamentally a language-oriented nation. Our languages have been a powerful medium for carrying forward culture, history, traditions, knowledge, science, philosophy, and spirituality from generation to generation," he said in a message on the occasion of Hindi Diwas.

Extending Hindi Diwas greetings, the home minister said he firmly believed that languages, by becoming companions of one another and bound in the thread of unity, were moving forward together. "On this occasion of Hindi Diwas, let us respect all Indian languages, including Hindi, and move forward towards a self-

reliant, self-confident and developed India," he said. Shah said "walk together, think together, and speak together" has been the core mantra of India's linguistic-cultural consciousness. He said the songs of Bihu



in the Northeast, the voice of Oviyalu in Tamil Nadu, the songs of Lohri in Punjab, the verses of Vidyapati in Bihar, the hymns of Baul saints in Bengal, Kajri songs, and Bhikari Thakur's 'Bidesia' — all these have kept the country's culture vibrant and welfare-oriented. The home minister said Saint Thiruvalluvar's verses are sung with as much devotion in the South as he is read with interest in the

North and Krishnadevaraya was as popular in the South as he was in the North.

"The patriotic compositions of Subramania Bharati ignite national pride in the youth of every region. Goswami Tulsidas is revered by every Indian, and the couplets of Saint Kabir are found in translations in Tamil, Kannada, and Malayalam," he said. Shah said Surdas's poetry remains prevalent in the temples and musical traditions of South India even today.

"Srimanta Sankardeva and Mahapurush Madhavdeva of Assam are known to every Vaishnav, and Bhupen Hazarika's songs are hummed even by the youth of Haryana," he said. The home minister said even during the difficult period of slavery, Indian languages became the voice of resistance. "Our languages played a significant role in making the freedom movement a nationwide endeavour. Our freedom fighters connected the languages of the regions and villages with the freedom struggle," he said.

With 14 crore memberships, BJP is world's largest political party: JP Nadda

BJP national president JP Nadda on Sunday said that the saffron party has become the world's largest political party with 14 crore members, out of which two crore are active. The party has 240 Lok Sabha members, around 1,500 MLAs and more than 170 MLCs across the country, he said.

Addressing a party rally here, Nadda termed Prime Minister Narendra Modi-led NDA regime as "responsible and responsive". "We are the largest political party in the world with 14 crore members.

In India, we have the NDA governments in 20 states and the BJP governments in 13 states. We are the largest representative party in the country. We have 240 MPs (Lok Sabha). We have around 1,500 MLAs. We have more than 170 MLCs," he said.

Nadda said in the 11 years under PM Modi leadership there has been politics of performance and accountable government, while in the previous governments there were politics of non-performance, and they did not carry out development works. They also forgot the promises made in the manifestos. There was family-based politics, corruption and appeasement, he said. "We come from a party which has an ideological base," the BJP president said. Listing out the developmental works undertaken in Andhra Pradesh, Nadda said the Centre has provided Rs 15,000 crore for the construction of the capital Amaravati.



Punjab's Sikh Farmers Face 30,000 Crore Loss — Urgent Economic Aid Needed to Revive Agriculture

Punjab is reeling under one of the union's worst floods in decades, leaving the state's Sikh farming community in deep distress. Preliminary assessments indicate an estimated ₹30,000 crore worth of losses to crops, livestock, and rural infrastructure. Experts warn that Punjab's agriculture could be crippled for the next two seasons, as farmlands are now buried under several feet of silt, sand, and debris, rendering them temporarily unfit for cultivation. Villages across Punjab have been devastated. Farmers have lost standing crops, agricultural equipment, and even their homes. The fertile topsoil of many fields has



been washed away, replaced by sand and muck. To restore the soil's fertility, farmers will now have to invest heavily in earth-leveling, cleaning, and soil-treatment — a process that will require substantial funding and months of hard work. Adding to their misery, thousands of cattle — the backbone of rural economy — have perished in the

floods. Farmers will need significant financial support to repurchase livestock, rebuild sheds, and restart dairy activities, which are a major source of income for rural Punjab. Social and religious organizations have been working tirelessly to provide cooked meals, rations, and essential supplies through

langars and relief camps. While these efforts are commendable, they do not address the core issue — the economic rehabilitation of farmers. Experts emphasize that mere food distribution is not enough; what Punjab's farmers urgently require is direct financial assistance to revive their fields, repair their homes, and restore their livelihoods. The Sikh farming community is looking towards both the Punjab Government and the Central Government for swift action. Delays in financial support could further worsen the situation, as anger and frustration are reportedly growing among farmers. Timely relief packages, direct bank transfers, and ground-level implementation of compensation schemes are essential to prevent a long-term agrarian crisis.

Madhya Pradesh government committed to 27% OBC quota, CM Yadav tells delegation

The previous Congress government under Kamal Nath, which was in power from December 2018 to March 2020, had raised the OBC quota from 14 to 27% through an ordinance. However, it got caught up in legal tangles.

Madhya Pradesh Chief Minister Mohan Yadav has said his government is committed to 27 percent reservation for the Other Backward Classes (OBCs) in the state.

A delegation of the OBC Mahasabha met Yadav at his residence on Saturday evening and submitted a memorandum listing various demands of the community, a government release said. The CM assured the delegation that rights of the OBC community would be protected, it said. "The Centre has approved caste-based census to prepare basic data of all communities. The issue of OBC reservation is pending before the Supreme Court, with regular hearings scheduled to begin from September 23. The government will abide by the court's decision," the release quoted him as saying.

CM Yadav has assured that his government is committed to 27 percent reservation. OBC Mahasabha's national core committee member Lokendra Gurjar told PTI. "Currently OBCs are getting 14 percent reservation in MP. We want this figure to go up to 27 percent," he said.

Gurjar, who is one of the petitioners in the case related to OBC quota being heard by the Supreme Court, was part of a delegation of members of his outfit, other petitioners, lawyers, etc, that met the CM. Earlier on Saturday, a meeting chaired by Advocate



General Prashant Singh here resolved that the state government, through Solicitor General and Attorney General along with lawyers proposed by the OBC community, would present the case effectively in the apex court.

"A Victory For Every Citizen": N Sitharaman Praises New GST Structure

The changes will see the current 5 per cent, 12 per cent, 18 per cent and 28 per cent structure replaced with just two rates - 5 per cent and 18 per cent.

Union Finance Minister Nirmala Sitharaman on Sunday said that the Goods and Services Tax (GST) reforms have reduced the tax burden on people.

Addressing the Joint Conclave of Trade and Industries Association - 'Tax Reforms for Rising Bharat' in Chennai, she explained that the four-tier GST structure has now been simplified to just two slabs.

"Earlier, GST had four categories. Now, we have simplified it into two slabs - 5 per cent and 18 per cent. Items that were taxed at 12 per cent and 18 per cent have largely been moved to the lower 5 per cent bracket. For certain essentials, tax has been reduced to zero. This reform will significantly benefit all 1.4 billion Indians," FM Sitharaman said. The changes, the biggest overhaul since GST was introduced in 2017, will see the current 5 per cent, 12 per cent, 18 per cent and 28 per cent structure replaced with just two rates - 5 per cent and 18 per cent. Additionally, a special 40 per cent tax bracket has been introduced for goods considered harmful or excessively luxurious, including cigarettes, tobacco, pan masala, soft drinks and high-end luxury cars. Prime Minister Narendra Modi had hinted at the shift during his Independence Day address from the Red Fort, underlining the government's intent to ease the common man's burden before the festive season.

The revised rates will come into effect on September 22, just ahead of Diwali. Government officials pointed out that the timing of the announcement was deliberate, keeping in mind the major festivals across regions.



"Poses Challenge To New And Old Rivals": Rajinikanth Praises MK Stalin

Actor Rajinikanth has praised Tamil Nadu Chief Minister MK Stalin, saying he appears set for the assembly elections in 2026. Rajinikanth commended Mr Stalin's leadership as they attended an event that was organised to felicitate renowned music composer Ilaiyaraaja for completing 50 years in the film industry on Saturday.

"MK Stalin is posing a challenge not only to the ruling government at the Centre but also to new and old rivals," he said. The 74-year-old actor also said that the DMK president is "emerging as a star in national politics". "With his trademark smile, he appears all set for

Zomato delivery agent slows down bike to take U-turn on Southern Peripheral Road, crushed to death by truck

A 20-year-old delivery rider with Zomato out to hand over a packet of food died after being hit by a truck on Southern Peripheral Road (SPR) around Friday midnight. Around 12.10am, Vikas was on his way to deliver an order, navigating the SPR near Vatika Chowk. As he slowed down to take a U-turn — a common manoeuvre for riders weaving through the city's roads — a rashly driven truck crashed into him from the side. The impact was devastating. Vikas's bike got lodged in the front right tyre of the truck, and the delivery agent was fatally crushed. Sudhir Sharma, who happened to be nearby, was left shocked. "It was a horrific scene. I saw the truck crushing the biker under its wheels. Many Zomato riders gathered around and tried to help him, but he had already died by then. His head was crushed," Sharma said. The truck driver, instead of stopping to help, abandoned the loaded vehicle and fled the scene. A police team arrived quickly, impounded the truck, and began a search for the driver, who remained at large till late on Saturday evening. An FIR was registered against the unidentified driver under BNS sections related to rash driving and causing death by negligence at Badshahpur police station. Vikas's body was moved to the mortuary around 2am, and his family in UP was notified soon after. The incident sparked calls for safer roads. Many of Vikas's colleagues protested at the accident scene and demanded immediate arrest of the truck driver.

Woman jumps with son (11) from 13th-floor Noida flat

Noida. (Agency)

A 37-year-old woman allegedly jumped with her 11-year-old son from the balcony of their 13th-floor flat at Ace City in Greater Noida West on Saturday. Both died on the spot. Police said the child was suffering from a neurodevelopmental disorder and was under medication. A note left behind by the woman indicated that she was overwhelmed by stress and took the extreme step. According to police, the child's father, a chartered accountant, was in another room of the house while his son was taking a walk on the balcony with his mother. Around 10am, he heard a scream and rushed to the balcony only to see his wife and son lying on the ground. Police and emergency services reached the spot soon after and sent the bodies for autopsy.

Cops said the note written by the woman, and addressed to her husband, said they did not want to trouble him anymore, and no one was responsible for their deaths. "Information received so far indicates the mother was extremely anxious about the boy," said Shavya Goyal, additional DCP, central Noida.

An officer from Bisrakh police station said, "According to the sequence pieced together so far, the father had asked his wife to give medicine to their son around 9 am. After administering it, she took him to the balcony. Minutes later, both fell to their death." In her note, the woman wrote to her husband, "We are leaving this world... Sorry. We do not want to trouble you anymore. Your life should not be ruined because of us. No one is responsible for our death." Neighbours told police that the child had been undergoing treatment for a developmental condition for a long time. He did not attend school and was heavily dependent on medicines.

Police said handwriting analysis of the note and statements of relatives and society residents are being collected to rule out other possibilities.

As cars get more connected, ICAT says cybersecurity ratings on way

Imagine your teched-up-to-its-teeth car suddenly swerving and hitting a median on the highway when you had it fully under control. This could be the handiwork of a cyber hacker who remotely took control. Just like phones and laptops, modern high-end cars can be hacked too as they come with many built-in software connected through networks — electronic control units, or ECUs, smartphone apps, telematics systems and key fobs are some of the ways a hacker can break in, experts say. To deal with such challenges, International Centre for Automotive Technology (ICAT), which functions under the Union ministry of heavy engineering, is developing a process to issue cybersecurity certificates to cars. India currently has the Bhart NCAP (New Car Safety Assessment Programme) star ratings system, which was introduced in 2023 and is issued to automobiles based on their performance

in crash tests and hardware. "Most high-end cars are now equipped with SIM cards. The ECU of the vehicle can be hacked and its programming can be changed," said ICAT director Saurabh Dalela. Manesar-based ICAT, which is a premier centre for crash-testing and certification, hopes to test car software and issue cybersecurity certificates in two years' time, Dalela said, adding it would necessitate changes in laws by govt.

Modern vehicles come equipped with M2M (machine-to-machine) SIM cards — special chips installed by carmakers in partnership with telecom companies. These SIMs connect the car to a central server, enabling remote control without the internet, much like IoT devices.

Designed for long-term and automated communication, an M2M SIM ensures the car's control systems — such as the ECU and engine management unit (EMU) — receive instructions and transmit data seamlessly. According to

experts, hackers can access telecom databases and extract details of the M2M SIM installed in a car, thereby manipulating the car's critical functions — from locking systems to acceleration and braking. Atul Rai, co-founder and CEO of Staque Technologies, a company working with multiple state police forces to help them use artificial intelligence solutions in crime detection and identifying and tracking criminals, said one form of attack involves cloning or intercepting the M2M SIM. "Once hackers replicate the SIM, they can send false commands directly to the ECU and EMU. This allows them to interfere with how the engine responds — forcing a sudden brake, accelerating without driver input, or even steering the car into danger," Rai added. "Access to the M2M SIM essentially means access to the car's brain," said a cybersecurity expert. "It's like giving the keys of the engine to an outsider who can then dictate what the car

does."

As vehicles advance towards automation, AI-powered sensors such as LIDAR (light detection and ranging) and cameras have become crucial. These systems allow cars to detect obstacles, stay in lanes, and park automatically. But what happens if the sensors themselves are tricked? Rai said a GAN (generative adversarial network) attack is within the realm of possibility. Manipulated visual data can be fed to the car's AI. While driving at speed, the car's sensors may be tricked into detecting a "phantom obstacle" on the road. The vehicle could suddenly brake or swerve, causing a crash. "Imagine you are driving a car over 100kmph and suddenly a car, which has some pattern (invisible to the naked eye) on its rear, overtakes yours. There is a possibility of an AI-based camera in your car being duped into believing that there is an obstacle and applying a sudden brake or a sudden turn, leading to an accident," said Rai.

Monsoon set to withdraw Gurgaon marks sixth day without rain

The city experienced another day of clear blue skies on Saturday, marking the sixth consecutive day without rain. With abundant sunshine throughout, the maximum temperature rose slightly to 33°C, compared to 32.8°C the previous day, while the minimum settled at 25.9°C, marginally higher than Friday's 25.6°C.

India Meteorological Department (IMD) indicated that conditions are becoming favourable for the withdrawal of the southwest monsoon from parts of western Rajasthan around Sept 15. This will pave the way for its eventual retreat from Haryana and the Delhi-NCR region in the coming weeks. While no rainfall is expected in the city over the next five days, some isolated areas in northern Haryana may see patchy showers. "The gradual decline in rainfall and slight rise in temperatures are expected as the southwest monsoon prepares to withdraw from Rajasthan. Although conditions will remain mostly dry, occasional patchy rainfall may occur in northern Haryana before the monsoon completely



withdraws from the state," said an IMD official. According to the weather department's five-day forecast, the city is likely to remain dry, with maximum temperatures ranging between 33 and 36 degrees Celsius, and minimum

temperatures around 27-28 degrees Celsius. So far this monsoon, Gurgaon has recorded 618.7mm of rainfall — 33% above the seasonal average of 464.5mm. By comparison, last year the city received 746.2mm of rain.

Meerut metro, part of RRTS corridor from Delhi, completes trials; ready for rollout

Ghaziabad: Trial runs on the 23km Meerut metro-cum-rapid rail corridor, which began this Feb, have been completed and the section is expected to be inaugurated soon. Part of the Namu Bharat network, the corridor will cut travel time between Delhi and Meerut to 55 minutes, offering seamless high-speed connectivity for commuters. The high-speed regional rapid transit system is already operating on 55km—between New Ashok Nagar and Meerut South of its planned 8km route.

The 17km Sahibabad to Duhai Depot section was first to open on Oct 20, 2023. Subsequent sections were opened in stages, including Duhai to Modinagar (North) on March 6, 2024, and Modinagar North to Meerut (South) on Aug 18, 2024, and Sahibabad to New Ashok Nagar on Jan 5, 2025. The Sarai Kale Khan station, one

of the largest on the corridor, is likely to open to commuters next week. However, there is no official confirmation on it.

Once the Meerut corridor is opened, commuters will be able to cover the 33.5km distance from Ghaziabad rapid rail station to Meerut South in just 25 minutes. A one-way journey along the entire corridor will take just 55 minutes.

NCRTC officials said Meerut metro is the first project in India where a local metro system will operate on the same infrastructure as a regional rapid transit line. With 18km of elevated track and 5km underground, Meerut Metro has 13 stations, including Meerut South, Partapur, Rithani, Shatabdi Nagar, Brahmपुरi, Meerut Central, Bhainsali, Begumpul, MES Colony, Daurli, Meerut North, Modipuram, and Modipuram Depot. Of these, four—Meerut South, Shatabdi

Nagar, Meerut Central, and Begumpul—will be shared with rapid rail corridor for seamless interchange.

Unlike Delhi Metro, the Meerut Metro will have 2x2 transverse as well as longitudinal seating, along with provisions for wheelchairs and medical stretchers. Passengers will also have access to air-conditioning, luggage racks, USB charging ports, and ergonomic seating to enhance comfort and convenience.

The new trainsets also feature modern designs, regenerative braking systems, and advanced safety technologies such as Automatic Train Protection (ATP), Automatic Train Control (ATC), and Automatic Train Operation (ATO). Each three-car train, capable of carrying over 700 passengers, will operate at a frequency of 10 minutes.

How to tackle waste Haryana to hold a meet with residents

Gurgaon: In a first, Haryana will bring vendors, residents' groups, and civic officials together to decide how Gurgaon and Faridabad can manage their solid waste. The govt will host a high-stakes vendors' meet on solid waste management in Chandigarh on Sept 15 for Gurgaon and Faridabad, which have faced sharp criticism for their overflowing landfill in Bandhwari and patchy waste collection.

The meeting, to be chaired by the urban local bodies minister Vipul Goel, aims to strengthen the solid waste management mechanism, with a special focus on door-to-door collection, transportation, and processing of waste. The stakeholders will review model requests for proposals that lay down the framework for new contracts on door-to-door collection, transport, and waste processing. For the first time, feedback is being directly solicited from vendors and agencies currently or previously engaged in SWM activities; RWAs; NGOs; microenterprises and cooperative societies registered in Haryana; and labour and cooperative societies working in sanitation and waste management.

The MCG also issued a notice to the RWAs asking them to study the new model



request for proposals for door-to-door collection, transport, and waste processing and send their feedback to the ULB department at the earliest.

"The tender that we recently floated for door-to-door waste collection was cancelled. The state govt now wants to formulate a plan specifically for Gurgaon and Faridabad by taking into account the

feedback of all stakeholders, especially residents. We have also intimidated them officially by mail about the meeting and the feedback to be sent to the ULB department at the earliest," MCG executive engineer Sunder Sheoran told TOI. "The RFP was revised multiple times, and tenders too were floated multiple times, and now the tender was

cancelled. More than one year was spent revising RFPs and then floating tenders again and again, and now it is finally cancelled," said Anil Mehta, a solid waste management expert, who worked as a consultant in the Haryana govt.

'Khilafat' terror module posing as NGO busted

New Delhi: The Special Cell of Delhi Police has uncovered a suspected terror module known as Khilafat, which was allegedly operating under the guise of a non-governmental organisation and backed by a Pakistan-based handler, with the arrest of five operatives in raids across multiple states. The arrested accused have been identified as Ashhar Danish (23), Aftab Qureshi (25) and Sufiyan Abubakar (20), both from Mumbai; Mohammad Huzaifa (20) from Telangana; and Kamran Qureshi (26) from Madhya Pradesh. Addressing a press conference, Additional Commissioner of Police (Special Cell) Pramod Kushwah said the operatives possessed detailed knowledge of preparing gunpowder and fabricating improvised explosive devices (IEDs). Some

members had even expressed readiness to sacrifice their lives in pursuit of establishing a Caliphate in India under the concept of Ghazwa-e-Hind, he added. The cop added that a large cache of



incriminating material, including chemicals, IED-making components, cartridge fabrication equipment, ball bearings, two semi-automatic pistols and a country-made pistol. Kushwah also mentioned that the module was fund-

ed money through hawala transactions and was being run in form of an NGO to evade suspicion from law enforcement agencies. The breakthrough came after the arrest of Aftab and Sufiyan near

Hazrat Nizamuddin Railway Station in Southeast Delhi who were trying to procure weapons from a Mewat-based person. Based on the information from the duo, the team led by deputy Commissioner of Police (Special

Cell) Amit Kaushik, carried out raids in Jharkhand's Ranchi, Raigarh in Madhya Pradesh, and Telangana, leading to the arrest of three more suspects, the official mentioned. The police described Ashhar Danish as the kingpin. A postgraduate in English, he allegedly posed as a company CEO, professor, or NGO operator to disguise his activities. Officials said Danish had procured chemicals for gunpowder manufacturing, bought copper plates in August 2025 to make cartridges, and obtained a bullet along with a country-made weapon from Bokaro to use as a prototype for fabricating firearms. The team recovered sulfur powder, sodium bicarbonate, ball bearings, gas masks, electrical wires, fuse points, cartridges and other components used in making IEDs from his rented accommodation in Ranchi.

13 yrs on, double murder accused held after 20,000-km chase across 7 states

New Delhi: After a chase of over 20,000 kms across seven states, a man wanted in a double murder case in Southeast Delhi was arrested after being on the run for 13 years, the police said on Wednesday. The accused, identified as Lalan Kumar, alias Lalanwa (33), a native of Madhepura in Bihar, was the key conspirator behind the murder of a truck driver and his helper in 2012, they added. Deputy Commissioner of Police (Southeast) Hemant Tiwari said the accused carried a bounty

of Rs 1 lakh on his arrest and was also declared a proclaimed offender by a Delhi court in December 2012. The cop added that a team from Shaheen Bagh police station was chasing him ever since the crime took place. "Our officers traveled more than 20,000 kms across Delhi-NCR, Uttar Pradesh, Punjab, Kerala, West Bengal, Tamil Nadu and Jharkhand in search of the absconding person. Over 500 call detail records were analysed and nearly 1,000 people were questioned during the man-

hunt," Tiwari added. He said the team developed



sources in several states, monitored Kumar's relatives and associates, and examined every possible

lead. Consistent surveillance in his native place

Madhepura finally yielded information about his presence there. A raid was carried out in Shankarpur

on September 4 and the accused was apprehended. During interrogation, Kumar admitted that he had been living under different identities across Punjab, Kerala, West Bengal, Tamil Nadu and Jharkhand since 2012. The cop also mentioned that the accused avoided mobile phones and social media and frequently changed his appearance to evade arrest. To sustain himself, he worked as a labourer while staying away from his native village for long period. The incident dates back to

June 31, 2012, when a case was registered at the Pul Prahladpur police station on the complaint of Ram Gupta regarding the abduction of truck driver Shamim and helper Shera. The complainant's vehicle was also missing. During investigation, the bodies of the driver and helper were found in Palwal, Haryana, and Mathura UP, respectively. Later, the truck was recovered from Prayagraj, UP. During further probe, two persons - Sunil and Shatrughan - were arrested. Kumar was absconding since then.

Stabbed outside school, Delhi boy reaches police station with knife lodged in chest

New Delhi: Three minors have been apprehended for allegedly stabbing a 15-year-old boy outside his school in central Delhi's Paharganj area, police said on Saturday. The incident took place on September 4, when the injured boy reached the Paharganj police station with a knife lodged in his chest, police said in an official statement. He was rushed to Kalawati Saran Hospital and later referred to RML Hospital, where doctors successfully removed the knife from his chest, they said. Preliminary inquiry revealed that about 10-15 days ago, one of the accused minors was beaten by some boys and he suspected the victim of having instigated the assault. To take revenge, the boy and his two associates confronted the victim near his school gate and stabbed him, according to police. "One of the minors stabbed him with a knife while his associates restrained him. One of them even threatened the boy with a broken beer bottle before the stabbing," Deputy Commissioner of Police (Central) Nidhin Valsan said. A case has been registered under the Bharatiya Nyaya Sanhita and the Arms Act at Paharganj police station in the matter. Through local intelligence and quick raids, all three accused, aged 15 and 16, were apprehended from the Aram Bagh area within hours of the case being registered, police said. The knife and the broken beer bottle were seized from the spot, they said.

Delivery man takes child hostage, forces woman to undress in Noida

New Delhi: A 22-year-old delivery man has been arrested in Noida for allegedly coercing a woman to remove her clothes by holding a knife to her child's neck, recording her explicit videos and circulating them on social media, police said on Friday. The accused, identified as Gaurav from the Gulistanpur village, used to deliver milk and groceries to the woman's home. According to the police, the accused forcibly entered the house one day while the woman's children were asleep. He allegedly held a knife to her son's neck and compelled her to undress while he filmed the incident on his mobile phone.

"Violence Coming": Elon Musk's "Fight Or Die" Message At London Rally

Clashes erupted in London on Saturday, and police made 25 arrests after up to 1,50,000 people massed for one of the largest-ever far-right protests in Britain, organised by activist Tommy Robinson.

Protesters at Robinson's latest "Unite the Kingdom" event had marched over Westminster Bridge before rallying near Downing Street for speeches by figures associated with the far right from across Europe and North America, including billionaire X owner Elon Musk, who joined via video-link."You're in a fundamental situation here," Musk told the crowd, claiming "the left is the party of murder and celebrating murder"."Whether you choose violence or not, violence is coming to you. You either fight back or you die."Speakers at Robinson's event also included French far-right politician Eric Zemmour and Petr Bystron of the anti-immigrant Alternative for Germany (AfD) party.

Zemmour reiterated the far-right, white nationalist so-called "Great Replacement" conspiracy theory, which claims white Europeans are being deliberately supplanted by non-white immigrants.Ed Davey, leader of the UK's centrist Liberal Democrats, took to social media to criticise Musk and the violent scenes that happened.

"These far-right thugs do not speak for Britain," he added.Police said 26 officers were injured, four seriously, after facing "unacceptable violence" while trying to control the crowds, many draped in English and British flags, during several tense hours on the rally's fringes.The Metropolitan Police -- which estimated 110,000 to 150,000 people turned out, "significantly exceeding" organisers' estimates -- said the clashes broke out after some attendees tried to enter so-called "sterile areas" near counter-protesters.Around 5,000 people had attended a Stand Up to Racism march, which began around a mile to the north. About 1,000 police were deployed to keep the rival groups apart.

Indian-Americans Donated \$46 Million To Democrats In 2020, Just \$16 Million To Republicans: Study

Indian-Americans overwhelmingly favour Democratic candidates, contributing nearly three times more to their campaigns than to Republicans, a new study shows.The research, titled "An Emerging Lobby: An Analysis of Campaign Contributions from Indian-Americans (1998-2022)," was conducted by Karnav Popat and Vishnu Prakash of Ashoka University, along with Joyojeet Pal of the University of Michigan.

The study, released in September 2025, analysed two decades of political donations using Federal Election Commission data compiled by OpenSecrets.

During the 2020 presidential election cycle, Indian-Americans donated USD 46.6 million to Democratic candidates compared to USD 16.3 million to Republican candidates. In 2016, only 0.6 per cent of



Indian-American contributions went to then-President Donald Trump's campaign.

The study found that Indian-Americans' contributions are concentrated in sectors such as technology, finance, healthcare, and academia, enhancing their political visibility.Indian-Americans now number over 4.9 million, with six elected to Congress in the 2024 elections.While the study does not cover the 2024 cycle, it underscores the community's growing political engagement and consistent preference for Democratic candidates.

Inside Lashkar's Muridke Resurrection After Op Sindoor With Pak's Help

The Lashkar-e-Taiba (LeT) terror outfit is quietly orchestrating the reconstruction of its demolished headquarters, Markaz Taiba in Muridke of Pakistan's Punjab, following its destruction by the Indian Air Force on May 7 during Operation Sindoor, according to the dossier prepared by India's intelligence agencies that NDTV exclusively accessed.

At 12:35 am Pakistan Standard Time, Indian Mirage aircraft penetrated deep into Punjab province to strike three core structures within the 1.09-acre Markaz Taiba campus. The targets included a red multi-story block used for cadre accommodation and weapons storage, and two yellow-painted buildings known as Umm-ul-Qura, which served as training facilities and senior commander residences.

Only skeletal remnants remained standing, with analysts praising the Indian strike as the most severe blow dealt to Lashkar's infrastructure since the 2008 Mumbai attacks.

Demolition And The Road To Rebirth

By August 18, LeT deployed heavy machinery, razing the already crippled structures. HUMINT-sourced video reveals rubble-strewn grounds and cadres supervising clearance.On September 4, the yellow Umm-ul-Qura block was reduced to dust. Three days later, the red building followed suit.

The group now eyes February 5, 2026 - Kashmir Solidarity Day - as the symbolic deadline to inaugurate the reconstructed complex.

Trump calls on all NATO countries to stop buying Russian oil, threatens 50% to 100% tariffs on China

Trump's letter comes at a tense moment in the conflict after the recent flight of multiple Russian drones into Poland, an escalatory move by Russia as it was entering the airspace of NATO ally.

President Donald Trump said Saturday he believes the Russia-Ukraine war would end if all NATO countries stopped buying oil from Russia and placed tariffs on China of 50% to 100% for its purchases of Russian petroleum.

Trump posted on his social media site that NATO'S commitment to winning the war "has been far less than 100%" and the purchase of Russian oil by some members

of the alliance is "shocking." As if speaking with NATO members, he said: "It greatly weakens your negotiating position, and bargaining power, over Russia."Since 2023, NATO member Turkey has been the third largest buyer of Russian oil, after China and India. according to the Centre for Research on Energy and Clean Air. Other members of the 32-state alliance involved in purchasing Russian oil include Hungary and Slovakia. It's unclear whether Trump would want to directly confront Turkish President Recep Tayyip Erdogan or Hungarian Prime Minister Viktor Orbán. That leaves uncertain whether the threats might actually lead to new tariffs or a ban on Russian oil purchases.Trump's post arrives after the Wednesday flight of multiple Russian drones into Poland, an escalatory move by Russia as it was entering the airspace of a NATO ally. Poland shot down the drones, yet Trump played down the severity of the incursion and Russia's motives by saying it "could

have been a mistake."U.S. Secretary of State Marco Rubio said Saturday that the drone incursion was "unacceptable and unfortunate and dangerous" as he judged NATO's response so far to be appropriate. Still, Rubio said it was unclear if the drones were intentionally sent to Poland.

Security Council meeting Friday, acting U.S. Ambassador Dorothy Shea said America "will defend every inch of NATO territory" and that the drones entering Poland "intentionally or otherwise show immense disrespect for good-faith U.S. efforts to bring an end to this conflict."

China launches probes targeting US semiconductors ahead of Madrid trade talks

China launched two probes targeting the US semiconductor sector Saturday ahead of talks between the two nations in Spain this week on trade, national security and the ownership of social media platform TikTok.China's Ministry of Commerce announced an anti-dumping investigation into certain analog IC chips imported from the US.The investigation will target some commodity interface IC chips and gate driver IC chips, which are commonly made by US companies such as Texas Instruments and ON Semiconductor. The ministry separately announced an anti-discrimination probe into US measures against China's chip sector.US Treasury Secretary Scott Bessent is set to meet Chinese Vice Premier He Lifeng in Madrid between Sunday and Wednesday, He's office said.US measures such as export curbs and tariffs "constitute the containment and suppression of China's development of high-tech industries" such as advanced



computer chips and artificial intelligence, a Chinese commerce ministry spokesperson said.

The announcements of the probes follow the US on Friday adding 23 Chinese companies to an "entity list" of businesses that will face restrictions for allegedly acting against US national security and foreign policy interests. The list includes two Chinese companies accused of acquiring chipmaking equipment for major Chinese chipmaker SMIC.The meetings between Bessent and He in Madrid will be the latest in a series of negotiations aimed at reducing trade tensions and postponing the enactment

of higher tariffs on each other's goods.US and Chinese counterparts previously held discussions in Geneva in May, London in June and Stockholm in July. The two governments have agreed to several 90-day pauses on a series of increasing reciprocal tariffs, staving off an all-out trade war.Bessent described the talks during the last round in Stockholm as "very fulsome."""We just need to de-risk with certain, strategic industries, whether it's the rare earths, semiconductors, medicines, and we talked about what we could do together to get into balance within the relationship," Bessent said at the time.US President Donald Trump and former President Joe Biden placed curbs on China's access to advanced semiconductors including restrictions on the sale of chipmaking equipment to the country. While Washington cites national security concerns, China argues the curbs are part of a US strategy to contain its growth.

Turkey wary of Israeli threat following airstrike on Hamas in Qatar

An Israeli strike on a meeting of Hamas officials in Qatar has cast a cloud of growing concern across Turkey that it could be the next target.Turkish Defense Ministry spokesman Rear Adm. Zeki Akturk warned in Ankara on Thursday that Israel would "further expand its reckless attacks, as it did in Qatar, and drag the entire region, including its own country, into disaster."Israel and Turkey were once strong regional partners, but ties between the countries ran into difficulties from the late 2000s and have reached an all-time low over the war in Gaza sparked by the Oct. 7, 2023, Hamas-led attack in southern Israel. Tensions also have risen as the two countries have competed for influence in neighboring Syria since the fall of Bashar Assad's government last year.Turkish President Recep Tayyip Erdogan has been a long-standing supporter of the Palestinian cause and of the Palestinian militant group Hamas. The Turkish president has criticized Israel, and particularly Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu,

with strident rhetoric since the start of the Gaza war, accusing Israel of genocide and likening Netanyahu to Nazi leader Adolf Hitler.Hamas officials regularly visit Turkey and



by Israel's ability to freely use the airspace of neighboring states.

"Israel's ability to conduct strikes with seeming impunity, often bypassing regional air defenses and international norms, sets a precedent that deeply worries Ankara," said Serhat Suha Cubukcuoglu, director of Trends Research and Advisory's Turkey program.Turkey sees these attacks as a "broader Israeli strategy to establish a fragmented buffer zone of weak or pacified states around it," he added.

Turkey has superior military might

In crossing a previously unthinkable line by attacking Qatar, a close American ally that has been serving as a mediator in Gaza ceasefire talks, Israel also has raised the question of how far it will go in pursuing Hamas targets.Through its NATO membership, Turkey would seem to have a greater degree of protection against Israeli attack than that afforded to Qatar by its close ties to the United States.Turkey also boasts significantly greater military might than the Gulf state.

Assassination of US conservative activist Charlie Kirk prompts flood of false claims online

A flood of false and misleading claims filled social media in the two days it took officials to arrest and publicly identify 22-year-old Tyler Robinson as the suspect in Wednesday's assassination of conservative activist Charlie Kirk at Utah Valley University.

The reaction followed a well-worn pattern of misinformation and conspiracy theories that often come after breaking news events when facts can be fluid. Those kinds of posts appeared within hours of the shooting, with some of the earliest incorrectly identifying the gunman before officials had released any information about a suspect.

More claims spawned on Thursday and Friday, presenting old videos and photos as recent footage of the shooter and erroneously reporting on Robinson's background.

CLAIM: Robinson is a registered Republican.

THE FACTS: This is false. Utah records say Robinson was registered as a voter, but not affiliated with either political party. His voter status is inactive, meaning he did not vote in two regular general elections after receiving a notice from his county clerk.

According to Utah Gov. Spencer Cox, Robinson's family said he had become "more political in recent years" and had criticized Kirk, mentioning that he was due to appear at an event in Utah. Cox stated that ammunition found at the scene was engraved with taunting, anti-fascist and meme culture messaging.

CLAIM: Robinson is a member of the Democratic Socialists of America.THE FACTS: This is false. Priscilla Yeverino, spokesperson for the group, confirmed that "we have no members in DSA named Tyler Robinson anywhere in the country."

A photo of a person who bears a resemblance to Robinson wearing a Salt Lake City DSA shirt with the slogan "bee the change" has been used to support this claim. Yeverino declined to confirm that person's identity "for this person's privacy and safety."Prior to Robinson's arrest, many on social media were quick to assume the shooter was a Democrat and prominent conservative figures, including President Donald Trump, blamed liberal politics for Kirk's death.CLAIM: A video of a man running toward a parking lot shows the shooter escaping.

THE FACTS: This is false. The video was filmed on July 28, more than a month before Kirk was shot and began spreading before Robinson was arrested. It shows Dakota Hawver, the suspected gunman who killed three people and injured three others at the Grand Sierra Resort in Reno, Nevada, running from the front of the resort in the direction of its front parking lot.

Multiple local news networks published the footage after the Reno shooting. Hawver was shot by police and died in the hospital days later. A version of the misrepresented video included a caption falsely stating: "video shows Charlie Kirk's real shooter escaping."

More than 100,000 attend London protest organized by far-right activist, with clashes breaking out

TIRANA (Albania). (Agency)

A London march organized by far-right activist Tommy Robinson drew more than 110,000 people and became unruly on Saturday as a small group of his supporters clashed with police officers who were separating them from counterprotesters.Several officers were punched, kicked and struck by bottles tossed by people at the fringes of the "Unite the Kingdom" rally, Metropolitan Police said. Reinforcements with helmets and riot shields were deployed to support the 1,000-plus officers on duty.Twenty six police officers were injured — four who were seriously hurt, including broken teeth and a concussion, a possible broken nose and a spinal injury.At least 25 people were arrested for offenses including violent disorder, assaults and criminal damage, and the investigation continues, police said.

"There is no doubt that many came to exercise their lawful right to protest, but there were many who came intent on violence," Assistant Commissioner Matt

Twist said. "They confronted officers, engaging in physical and verbal abuse and making a determined effort to breach cordons in place to keep everyone safe."

The rally drew an estimated crowd of between 110,000 and 150,000 people, far surpassing expectations, police said.

The rival "March Against Fascism" protest organized by Stand Up To Racism had about 5,000marchers.Robinson, whose real name is Stephen Yaxley-Lennon, founded the nationalist and anti-Islam English Defense League and is one of the most influential far-right figures in Britain.The march was billed as a demonstration in support of free speech — with much of the rhetoric by influencers and several far-right politicians from across Europe aimed largely at the perils of migration, a problem much of the continent is struggling to control."We are both subject to the same process of the great replacement of our European people by peoples coming from the south and of Muslim culture, you and we are being colonized by our former colonies," far-

right French politician Eric Zemmour said.Elon Musk, the Tesla CEO and owner of the X platform who has waded into British politics several times this year, was beamed in by video and condemned the left-leaning UK government.

"There's something beautiful about being



British and what I see happening here is a destruction of Britain, initially a slow erosion, but rapidly increasing erosion of Britain with massive uncontrolled migration," he said.Robinson told the crowd in a hoarse voice that migrants now had more rights in court than the "British

public, the people that built this nation."

The marches come at a time when the UK has been divided by debate over migrants crossing the English Channel in overcrowded inflatable boats to arrive on shore without authorization.

Numerous anti-migrant protests were held this summer outside hotels housing asylum-seekers following the arrest of an Ethiopian man who was later convicted of sexually assaulting a 14-year-old girl in a London suburb. Some of those protests became violent and led to arrests.Sea of flagsParticipants in the "Unite the Kingdom" march carried the St. George's red-and-white flag of England and the union jack, the state flag of the United Kingdom, and chanted "we want our country back."UK flags have proliferated this summer across the UK — at events and on village lampposts — in what some have said is a show of national pride and others said reflects a tilt toward nationalism.

Supporters held signs saying "stop the boats," "send them home," and "enough is enough, save our children."

Prenatal diagnosis of over 1,700 fetuses finds one in four suffering from genetic anomalies

Ahmedabad. (Agency)

A 14-year-long study on prenatal diagnosis (PND) of rare genetic disorders, conducted by a leading Ahmedabad-based institute and funded by the Central government's department of biotechnology, for over 1,700 samples from 10 states and two Union Territories has found that more than a quarter of the fetuses suffered from "genetic anomalies", and 7.7% had "other rare genetic disorders".

The study, conducted by the FRIGE Institute of Human Genetics, Ahmedabad, from 2008 to 2022, from 12 tertiary healthcare centres and published earlier this week in the Orphanet Journal of Rare Diseases, showed, that out of 1,738 prenatal cases, 752 (43.27%) foetal samples were 'Normal' and showed no signs of genetic diseases. But in 519 (29.86%) cases, the foetus was identified as a 'carrier' of the disease, while in 467 (26.87%) cases, the results found that the child would be born suffering from a genetic disorder. About 75% of the samples were from Gujarat.

Of the 467 cases, 406 concerned those of autosomal recessive (AR) disorder with examples including Cystic Fibrosis, Sickle Cell Anaemia, Tay-Sachs Disease, and Wilson's Disease. In 21 cases, the sample results exhibited an autosomal dominant (AD) mode of inheritance, such as Huntington's Disease. Forty of the cases were with X-linked inheritance patterns, examples including Haemophilia. The study only focussed on diseases with molecular or biochemical genetic aetiology and did not include cases with chromosomal abnormalities identified through PND.

Corresponding author of the paper, Dr Harsh Sheth of the FRIGE (Foundation for Research in Genetics and Endocrinology) Institute of Human Genetics said, "Rare genetic disorders are increasingly diagnosed due to advancing genetic technology, whilst treatment for them is challenging.

Journalist Siddique Kappan among nine booked for unlawful assembly

The accused were booked for unlawfully assembling and conducting a protest near Vanchi Square, close to the High Court Junction, without prior permission.

Kochi. (Agency)

Kochi city police on Saturday arrested two persons and booked nine others, including Siddique Kappan, a journalist from Kerala who had been imprisoned after being charged under the Unlawful Activities Prevention Act (UAPA), in connection with a solidarity gathering held in support of Rejaz M Sheeba Sydeek, who faces UAPA charges for allegedly criticising "Operation Sindoor".

The arrested have been identified as Dr Hari and Shaneer. Others booked in the case include Neeharika Pradaush, Pramod Puzhangara, Ambika, and C P Rasheed, who had also taken part in the solidarity meeting. The arrests followed a protest held at Vanchi Square on

Saturday, organised with the support of the Social Democratic Party of India (SDPI), demanding the release of Rejaz. The accused were booked for unlawfully assembling and conducting a protest near Vanchi Square, close to the High Court Junction, without prior permission, said a source with Kochi city police. "They had no valid sanction to use loudspeakers and had gathered illegally, causing obstruction to both pedestrians and traffic in the area. Hence, they were taken into custody," said Sibi Tom, assistant commissioner with Ernakulam Central subdivision.

A police officer from Ernakulam Central station further clarified that the organisers had only obtained permission from the Kochi

Corporation to hold the event, but had not secured mandatory police approval for the use of loudspeakers. "When the police reached the spot, most participants dispersed. However, two individuals refused to leave and even pushed the sub-inspector on duty, obstructing official work," she said. The two were taken into custody and their arrest was formally recorded, and they were later released on station bail, she added. Rejaz, an independent journalist from Kerala who has been reporting on human rights issues, was arrested from a hotel in Nagpur, Maharashtra. He was then booked under the UAPA, after allegedly criticising Operation Sindoor through social media, besides raising anti-India slogans.



Unmarked speed breakers pose danger to commuters in Chennai

Improperly designed speed breakers without any markers to alert the commuters on the busy Krishnadoss Main Road and surrounding roads in Thiru-Vi-Ka Nagar zone of Greater Chennai Corporation are posing threat to road users.

The busy stretch, connecting Perambur and Ayanavaram, is used daily by hundreds of vehicles, including MTC buses. Residents say at least three speed breakers were installed last month, but none carry proper markings, reflective paint, or warning signs, making them difficult to spot, especially at night.

On Wednesday, MA Sivaraman (55), who runs a tea stall, met with an accident while riding along the stretch. "I was riding my bike around 11 am at a speed of about 25 kmph. I didn't see the hump at all," he said, adding he sustained injuries to his

knees, hands, and forehead after falling down from the bike.

The residents noted that this is not an isolated

issue of unmarked speed breakers is not limited to this stretch alone - it's a problem across the city that needs urgent attention."

"Many of these incidents often go unreported or remain unnoticed, leaving no record of accidents caused by speed breakers," another city-based activist said.

"Proper monitoring and regulation of speed breakers in line with Indian Roads Congress standards is essential. Although the government constituted a committee, headed by the city traffic police, in 2024 to standardise speed breakers in Chennai, its impact is yet to be seen on the ground,"

she added.

A zonal-level GCC official assured that the speed breakers would be marked immediately with reflective paint to address the issue.

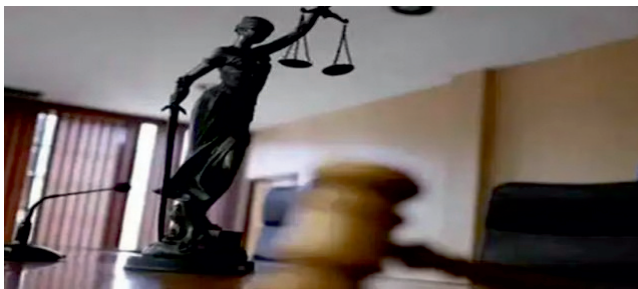


Day after SC agrees to hear plea, four Gujarat police constables booked for 'thrashing' minor at police station

Accused constables transferred to police headquarters; investigation being conducted by Inspector of the same police station where the accused cops were stationed

Ahmedabad. (Agency)

Three constables of the Botad Police were booked on Saturday for allegedly illegally confining and thrashing a minor at their police station after picking him up from the illegal custody of two other persons who had personally called up a constable, instead of calling the police control room, claiming that the teenager had been involved in a theft. The four police constables - Kaushik Jani, Yogesh Solanki, Ajay and Kuldeep Singh Vaghela - have been transferred from Botad Town police station to the police headquarters, confirmed DySP Maharshi Raval, who is supervising the case. They have neither been suspended from service nor placed under arrest so far. DySP Raval further confirmed that the case in question is being investigated by the Inspector of Botad Town police station itself, who is the direct supervisor of the four accused police constables. Botad SP Chintan Teraiya remained unavailable for comment. The 17-year-old teenager, who is still under treatment at



a private hospital in Ahmedabad, had to undergo dialysis during his treatment. The FIR was filed after activist Mujahid Nafees of the Minority Coordination Committee wrote to DGP Vikas Sahay, triggering an inquiry; Congress MLA Jignesh Mevani raised the matter; and the incident was mentioned in the Supreme Court by Advocate Rohin Bhatt.

The petition was mentioned before a Bench of Chief Justice of India BR Gavai and Justice K Vinod Chandran on Friday, who agreed to hear it and scheduled a hearing on September 15.

Speaking to The Indian Express, DySP Raval said, "According to the FIR, on August 19, the minor was taken to a place called Military Road in Botad town. After accusing him of theft, the accused called Constable Jani on the phone. Jani then went to the spot and picked up the minor and took him to Botad Town police station. The FIR said that the minor was questioned and assaulted in the D-Staff room of the police station." Raval added, "He fell ill during this time and was taken to a hospital in Botad. There the doctors said he was facing the effects of some toxic substance and so, he was referred to a hospital in Ahmedabad." When asked if the alleged thrashing had led to the impact on the boy's kidneys, necessitating the dialysis, DySP Raval said, "We have sought a detailed medical report, asking whether such a condition can occur from the type of assault described by the minor. We will receive that report tomorrow (Sunday).

'One Village, One Library': Gadchiroli Police transform Maoist stronghold with 72nd library

The library is located in Jijgaon, under the Mannerajaram police station in the Bhamragad subdivision, over 7km from Mannerajaram.

The brother and other relatives of Raju Velaji, Divisional Committee Member (DVC) of Gatta Dalam, an active Maoist from Jijgaon, witnessed a transformation in their village as the Gadchiroli Police inaugurated its 72nd public library in Jijgaon on Saturday under the 'One Village, One Library' initiative.

The initiative, conceptualized by Gadchiroli's Superintendent of Police, Neelotpal (IPS), aims to empower school students, educated unemployed youth, and women and men in the district's remote areas. The goal is to integrate them into the mainstream by nurturing their intellectual and creative talents, strengthening their perspectives, fostering a passion for reading, and preparing for competitive exams.

The library is located in Jijgaon, under the Mannerajaram police station in the Bhamragad subdivision, over 7km from Mannerajaram. The construction of this modern library was made possible through

the collaborative efforts of the Gadchiroli Police, CRPF, SRPF officers and personnel, and local residents who contributed both labour and funds.

Over 500 residents living in the areas falling under the Mannerajaram police station's jurisdiction attended the inauguration ceremony. The ceremony began with a book procession attended by all senior officers and villagers. The procession served to raise awareness and instill a sense of respect and fondness for books and reading among students and villagers.

Talking to The Indian Express, SP Neelotpal said, "We opened our first library in March 2023 at Kotgul... The idea came from the fact that many people can't afford to go to the cities, and they don't have a proper study environment at home. Libraries in



Gadchiroli and Nagpur are often very expensive, charging hefty fees. So, we decided to open libraries in or near areas with a police presence."

"We have now established libraries in 72 locations. The first one, in Kotgul, is a state-of-the-art library. All these libraries operate on community participation. The villagers,

Dr. Ambedkar, are provided by former police officers who have tied up with companies in cities like Pune and Kolhapur to send books the libraries need," added Neelotpal.

Since the programme started, 205 students have been selected for various government jobs, both in and outside of Gadchiroli, as

our police station, and SRPF and CRPF personnel who are deployed here for three-month rotations contribute to it. This model ensures that community ownership doesn't fade away. We make the students the custodians of the library, and they all do a fantastic job," said the SP.

Currently, 8,000 students are studying at these libraries across Gadchiroli. "The books, including those for competitive exams and others on figures such as Mahatma Gandhi and

police constables, talathis, and foresters, among others, informed the SP. The Mannerajaram police station was reopened in January 2023 because it was a significant security vacuum. This area, particularly Jijgaon, was a major crossing point for Maoists moving from the National Park Area into Gadchiroli by crossing the Indravati river. While a police post was first created in Mannerajaram in the early 2000s, it couldn't sustain due to Maoist activity, including arson. It had to be closed down, but in January 2023, the post was re-established.

The inauguration was attended by Additional Superintendent of Police (Operations) M. Ramesh, Additional Superintendent of Police (Aheri) Satya Sai Karthik, Assistant Commandant of A/9 Battalion CRPF Amit Sinha, Officer-in-Charge of Manne Rajaram Police Station PSI Shubham Shinde, PSI Prashant Narkhede of SRPF Group 4 Nagpur, along with local sarpanchs, police patils, students, and villagers.

Relentless reformer who made democracy accountable

I first met Professor Jagdeep S Chhokar in 2006, when I was the youngest in the Election Commission of India. At that time, the relationship between the Election Commission (EC) and the Association for Democratic Reforms (ADR)—the organisation he co-founded—was marked by caution, even suspicion. ADR had begun to make waves with its landmark petitions in the courts, demanding greater transparency in elections. From within the EC, we were instinctively wary: here was an organisation holding up a mirror to the system we were constitutionally sworn to safeguard. But the more we engaged with Jagdeep, the more we realised that we were fighting the same battle—to make India’s democracy not just participatory, but truly informed. It was the beginning of a professional partnership and a personal friendship that endured through the years.

A Shared Haryana Connection
The fact that Jagdeep belonged to Haryana—which was my own cadre—brought us personally closer. He was born in Patti Kalyana, a well-known village in Panipat, which was earlier part of Karnal district, where I underwent my IAS training.

That coincidence alone would have been enough to give us a sense of kinship, but our connections went even deeper. As a student, I used to attend German classes at Max Mueller Bhavan, where his sister, Binla Chhokar—who later became Binla Bhalla—was also a fellow student. These ties made it feel natural for us to look upon each other almost as family. Our conversations often ranged from electoral law to personal anecdotes, and just a few months ago he told me—with characteristic candor—that for the last 15 years he has been quoting me on a subject close to both our hearts: electoral rolls. I had once said that “electoral rolls are the soft underbelly of the Election Commission”. Jagdeep said he had repeated that line hundreds of times in his writings and speeches. Now, with the controversy around the Special Intensive Revision of rolls in Bihar at its peak, that observation seems more relevant than ever.

From IIM to ADR: A Scholar Who Chose The Battlefield

Professor Chhokar was not a career activist. A distinguished academic and former dean of IIM-Ahmedabad, he could have chosen a quiet, comfortable life in the cloisters of academia. Instead, he brought the same intellectual rigour that defined his scholarship to the contested arena of electoral reform. ADR’s origin story is now the stuff of democratic legend: a group of IIM-A professors—including Chhokar—filed a PIL in the Delhi High Court in 1999 seeking mandatory disclosure of criminal, financial, and educational background of candidates contesting elections. The case eventually reached the Supreme Court, and in 2002, the landmark judgment mandated that such disclosures be made public. This was a watershed moment in Indian democracy. It was Jagdeep who became the public face of this movement, taking ADR’s mission beyond courtrooms to civil society, media platforms, and public debates. He combined the empiricism of a researcher with the passion of a reformer, often presenting data that embarrassed political parties but empowered the citizenry.

ADR As The ‘Eyes and Ears’ Of Reform
In the years that followed, ADR became indispensable to the cause of electoral reform. Its painstaking work of compiling and analysing candidate affidavits, publishing reports on criminalisation of politics, and tracking campaign finance violations provided an evidence base that no one could ignore—not even the political class. ADR’s data is now the gold standard for anyone studying the state of Indian democracy.

Nepal upheaval has lessons for India

THE GREAT GAME: South Asia must return to being both front and centre of New Delhi’s attention

THE revolution in Nepal earlier this week was so sudden, so swift and so dramatic, that even India was caught flat-footed. As former Nepali Prime Minister KP Oli’s armed police shot young student protestors in cold blood, including children in school uniform, Indian officials realised quickly that the ancien regime was collapsing. They had been preparing for Oli’s visit to India, beginning September 16. They were gobsmacked that the dam had burst on its eve. Thing about the India-Nepal relationship is that it is so intimate, so deep-seated, so profound that it is like no other tie that India has. Former External Affairs Minister Sushma Swaraj brought this “roti-beti rishta”, between the Terai and India’s northern borderlands, to the startled attention of Delhi’s elite some years ago, but the phrase is as true for the rest of Nepal and India. The Nepali elite as well as the proletariat — the ‘Bahun’ and ‘Chettris’, Brahmins and Kshatriyas in the hills, as well as people of other castes in the lowlands and the plains — marry, live and work in India and vice-versa. Ties of kinship reinvent the generations. If you drive from Patna to Janakpur, no one looks twice when you cross the open border.

You could argue that this is true for every neighbour of India, that ethnicity, religion and culture transcend both geography and sovereignty. Certainly, this is especially true for each of the three nations whose people have asserted their will in the face of democratic capture these last few years — Sri Lanka in 2022, Bangladesh in 2024 and now Nepal. Despite the small and big differences in each of these revolutions, the fundamental similarity is inescapable. The people rose because they were simply fed up of being led by the noose, by people they had voted in and who were now treating them like so much cattle.

In Kathmandu things have moved fast. Nepal’s former Chief Justice Sushila Karki has been sworn in as the country’s interim Prime Minister and Parliament has been dissolved. Still, the power tussle is not over. There are signs that Nepali Army chief Ashok Raj Sigdel — who, because of the aforesaid special India-Nepal tie, was awarded the honorary rank of a “brother general” in the Indian Army by the President of India last December — wants to assert himself and may be leaning in favour of the pro-monarchist politicians. Never forget that for decades when the King of Nepal was on top of the heap,

the erstwhile Royal Nepal Army’s first slogan every morning was, “Shri Panch ko sarkar jai ho!” The pushback has come from the most unusual of quarters. It is said that the Army chief wanted President Ram Chandra Poudel to resign to pave the way for a Naya Nepal, but Poudel responded, in words to the effect, that “you can shoot me, but I won’t stop being a democrat.”



Along with other political leaders like former PMs KP Oli and Sher Bahadur Deuba, Poudel was taken under Army protection for some days, but he has since been returned to Sheetal Niwas, his official home. Then there are the nameless, faceless Gen Z leaders, whose factions may have been squabbling among each other these last few days, but they have held firm on the most important next step : No return to monarchy. And that the Constitution of Nepal, forged in the aftermath of a previous revolution, the jana andolan of 2006, which finally came into being in 2015 — cannot be gutted. Equally significant is what India and China, Nepal’s two most important neighbours, are thinking. China hasn’t said a word so far. India’s Ministry of External Affairs has said it is “closely monitoring” the situation and PM Modi has described the violence that wracked Kathmandu as “heart-wrenching.” Note, though, the silence from any other political outfit in Delhi — they have all been told to keep quiet, which is as it should be. India is playing this hugely important moment in the region very carefully.

No law can be above a fair due process

One must question the Public Safety Act’s relevance when it imparts pre-emptive punishment without the rigour of trial and undermines human rights and democratic ethos

The recent arrest of the Aam Aadmi Party’s lone MLA in Jammu and Kashmir under the Public Safety Act (PSA), a preventive detention law that allows authorities to hold individuals without trial for up to two years, after he allegedly used unparliamentary language against an official over a compensation issue, raises the question: should a democracy retain such a sweeping law? In sensitive J&K, the State often asserts its need for extraordinary powers—authority above and beyond routine legal processes—to tackle terrorism supported from across the border. However, the draconian PSA—enacted in 1978 to counter timber smuggling—is now invoked not only for national security threats, but also for disturbances to public order.

Preventive detention can appear to be an instrument of political convenience if political or civil society leaders are booked under such laws, apart from terrorists or participants in orchestrated disruptions. The PSA also risks being viewed as an informal justice system; it allows the same individuals to be detained multiple times. Numerous cases have reached the courts in J&K against



the application of this law in situations that are not security threats. The law also helped detain J&K’s top political leadership for protesting the abrogation of Article 370. One must question the PSA’s relevance when it imparts pre-emptive punishment without the rigour of trial and undermines human rights and democratic ethos. If a sitting

Word is, that India will continue to back the progressive, secular and constitutional forces in Nepal, as it has always done in the past. During the 2006 jana andolan as well, India’s then Foreign Secretary Shyam Saran — and a columnist with The Tribune — broke from traditional policy to announce that India would support the egalitarian protest that had gone on for 19 long days and nights. That midnight in April 2006, I witnessed the incredible joy on the streets of Kathmandu as India made the right choice. It spelt the end of Nepal’s monarchy that had held Nepal and itself together since 1768 when Prithvi Narayan Shah united the warring kingdoms.

Another such moment is upon us today and we must learn several lessons from the past to deal with the present. First, the upheaval in Nepal must remind New Delhi of the importance of being even closer in touch with its neighbours. Second, India’s elite foreign service may prefer the watering holes of the West, but there’s nothing like the waters of the Bagmati or the Kosi and Mahakali from which to drink deep and imbibe both knowledge and culture. And third, as the largest democracy not just in the region but in the world, India is a role model — Sushila Karki, the interim PM, like many other Nepali politicians before her, has studied at Banaras Hindu University — and must continue to be seen as such.

Nepal as well as the rest of South Asia must return to being both front and centre of India’s attention. It doesn’t matter if India is the fourth largest economy in the world and that these far smaller nations are small or smaller than India’s provinces. The simple truth is that India must return to the “all boats must rise” maxim and connect with these sovereign nations as equals, who have much to give as well as to get. There is a fourth reason. India’s political class has also forgotten South Asia. There was a time when people like former PM Chandra Shekhar, Congress leaders like DP Tripathi and Left leaders like Sitaram Yechury and Prakash Karat together put their weight behind the democratic polity in Nepal. Today’s politicians, though, would rather look elsewhere. Fortunately, the India-Nepal glue is so tight that the relationship is still safe. But if the disinterest continues, as it sometimes threatens to do, the danger is that some of the glue may start to come unstuck.

MLA can be detained without bail or trial, citizens are entitled to wonder who decides what constitutes a threat, on what evidence, and under whose oversight. The governance context adds complexity. Omar Abdullah, the elected chief minister, accused the “unelected government”—the lieutenant governor’s administration—of raising the matter of blurred accountability structures. The inference is that, unlike an elected government, the LG administration does not face the people or derive legitimacy from them. Even without the PSA, J&K’s security arsenal has enough legal tools to tackle genuine threats. Long detention, under any law, is never the default option. Prosecution through regular courts is a transparent alternative that is available. Importantly, the powers of policing and security should be in the hands of elected leaders, so that political decisions, including the use of extraordinary laws, remain accountable. A confident democracy can easily secure both national security and individual liberty.

Paper to pixels: Know your candidate digitally

It’s baffling that Indian students require so many printed certificates in this digital age. The use of DigiLocker and blockchain in storing and accessing records securely should be expanded. An easier KYC is the need of the hour

What is the true meaning of a certificate? I found asking myself the question while reading about some Andhra Pradesh colleges withholding certificates from nursing students and asking them to work for a “service period” of a year in an affiliated hospital before being “released”. A nurse quoted in the story was planning to apply for a job in her home state, Kerala, using the certificate. The coercive clause delayed her life plan.

It’s baffling how such a modern form of bonded labour exists, under which apart from paying college fees one has to work for a stipulated period too. No wonder the legal validity of such a contract is facing public interest litigation now.

But I do understand collaterals. The talk of an ‘original certificate’ brought back memories of thick papers signed by calligraphic hands, with stamps of approval that made faking difficult. One carefully saved a ‘provisional’ certificate, followed by its ‘original’. Employers usually returned the original after inspection of copies duly attested by a government officer or an equivalent. But then, there were some nasty employers who held back the originals as collaterals to prevent employees from leaving. Legally, a certification is proof of qualification that the dictionary defines as “action or process of providing someone or something with an official document attesting to a status or level of achievement”. By that yardstick, the Supreme Court has clarified that Aadhaar is sufficient as a certificate of residency to enable a voter identity, but not as a proof of citizenship. The prime minister’s postgraduation certificate has been a

subject of legal banter over its verification. All such questions, however, should be buried in the sands of time with new technologies that enable easy, foolproof verification and transmission. We know about the biometrics that go with Aadhaar, whose project leader Nandan Nilekani pointed out that it is a “number, and not a card”. What is often touted as an Aadhaar card is a printout reporting the unique identification number. This essentially means that an Aadhaar number is associated with a person with certifiable features, including a proof of residency. What we are waiting for now is the Aadhaar revolution’s equivalent in certificates concerning education, academic credits and experience, and evolve from the current know your customer framework to another KYC—know your candidate. We have the DigiLocker model cutting across educational institutions and domains to stop the exploitation of students and job-seekers and reduce bureaucratic red tape, but progress has been slow. It needs to be adopted the way we have done with land records. As India marks 50 years of the cult classic Sholay, I recall visiting Ramanagara, the film’s hilly shooting site that is also a pioneering area for digitisation of farm records. I was taken on the pleasant drive outside Bengaluru by Rajeev Chawla, the IAS officer who led Karnataka’s Bhoomi project, which became a case study on e-governance at Princeton University. Chawla showed me how digitisation, once done, meant that a farmer could get a bank loan against a printout directly verifiable with government records, and

bypass corrupt local record-keepers (patwaris) who could harass them. Last year, the Union government reported that 95 percent of India’s rural land records have now been digitised—after early struggles by the likes of Chawla, who had to train people, forge technology partnerships and build processes that made it all possible.

In certification, DigiLocker holds promise as a



secure, cloud-based platform allowing citizens to store, access, and share digital copies of their official documents including Aadhaar, driving licences, and educational certificates. This allows real-time document verification, secure sharing with unique document codes, and user-controlled access. The verification works through digitally signed and secure QR codes on documents so that details are authenticated against the signature and

data stored by the issuer in the DigiLocker system. People like the harassed nursing student in Andhra Pradesh should embrace this, and the government needs to loudly advertise it.

Under India’s IT laws, universities must accept documents from DigiLocker National Academic Depository (NAD) as legally valid alternatives to physical copies. However, they are not mandatorily bound to join the system—and that is a loophole impeding faster adoption. The government has been setting deadlines for institutions to join the NAD, and the University Grants Commission has also been stepping up pressure on affiliated bodies. The DigiLocker scheme was launched in 2015 and the NAD in 2017. Evidently, the pace of progress has not matched that of Aadhaar usage. Both state-level universities and private institutions need to be pressured to embrace the NAD.

The arrival of blockchain as a technology to store records in a foolproof way strengthens the system. The NAD already uses blockchain for storing degrees from many accredited institutions. Blockchain stores certificates with unique digital footprints in an immutable, decentralised ledger to prevent forgery at any level. What we could do is not only legally and administratively push private institutions to make the DigiLocker system as ubiquitous as Aadhaar, and add digitally-signed contracts to it. This might save people from falling prey to dubious private contracts that often fail to withstand legal scrutiny.

Kids stuck in traffic for two hours daily in Bengaluru: Parents

Over 25,000 children bear the brunt of bad infrastructure in the Bengaluru East City Corporation that houses a significant number of IT companies.

Over 1,500 parents in and around Sarjapur, Varthur, Panathur and Bellandur have petitioned the traffic police chief to save their wards from the pain of getting stuck in traffic for two hours every day. This comes after a day after a school bus sank in a ditch near Panathur and 20 students had to be pulled out. The parents have now expressed a grave concern over 15 locations that are infamous for traffic gridlocks and potholes on the stretch.

Over 25,000 children bear the brunt of bad infrastructure in the Bengaluru East City Corporation that houses a significant number of IT companies. Parents said the bad stretch extends from Sarjapur Road to Varthur Road, covering Bellandur, Panathur, Thubarahalli, and Balagere. They complain that their children are stuck in traffic on this road for over two hours every day. Maneka Reddy, whose child is studying at Inventure Academy, approached Joint Commissioner of Police (Traffic) Karthik Reddy and requested him to address the issue.



"Our children are stuck in traffic between 2.30 and 4.30 pm every day. School buses are taking a long time to traverse because of potholes, construction vehicles parked on the roadside, vehicles coming from the opposite side and others. The issues were taken up

transport system of each school and bus timings to arrive at a data-driven solution. But the biggest issue remains with the corporation.

"Earlier during the Bruhat Bengaluru Mahanagara Palike (BBMP) administration, officials used to give the lame excuse of monsoon to delay the road work, like asphaltting and filling up of potholes. During the non-rainy season, they would delay fixing potholes," said Pavithra Holla, a parent from Balagere-Panathur Road. She hoped that the new corporation would fix the Balagere-Panathur Road from the Railway Under Bridge side.

Recently, Additional Chief Secretary of Urban Development Department Tushar Girinath directed Greater Bengaluru Authority officials and other parastatals to address the pothole issue. The traffic department has identified 4,822 potholes on major roads in the city and asked GBA to fix them.

Karthik Reddy said he will analyse data from each school in the area and stagger school bus timings. This, he hoped, would bring some improvement in traffic in the area. He also urged GBA to fix potholes.

Man, daughter killed as lorry crushes auto near Sumanahalli Junction in Bengaluru

In a horrific accident, a 45-year-old autorickshaw driver and his 24-year-old daughter were killed on the spot after a speeding lorry ran over several vehicles near Sumanahalli Junction under Kamakshipalya traffic police station limits on Saturday morning. The father-daughter duo was on their way to church. Another biker was injured, while a couple and their minor child travelling in a car narrowly escaped.

The deceased Yesu D and his daughter Mariya Jennifer were residents of Harohalli. According to the police, the duo was heading to church after Jennifer's recent engagement. The lorry, which was coming from an industrial area, lost control owing to suspected brake failure and ploughed into a bike, an autorickshaw, and a car at the junction.

The impact was so severe that the autorickshaw was crushed, killing Yesu and Mariya on the spot. While the car and the bike were completely damaged, the occupants of the car escaped unharmed, and the biker sustained serious injuries.

Kamakshipalya traffic police rushed to the spot, seized the lorry, and registered a case of death due to negligence and rash driving against the driver, who is absconding.

NIA chargesheets 3 in Amritsar temple grenade attack case

The National Investigation Agency (NIA) Friday filed a chargesheet against three people implicated in the grenade attack on Thakurdwara Sanatan Temple in Chheharta, Amritsar, on March 15, marking a significant step in unravelling a terror conspiracy aimed at disrupting communal harmony in Punjab.

The chargesheet, presented before the special NIA court in Mohali, Punjab, names Vishal Gill alias Chuchi, Bhagwant Singh alias Manna Bhatti, and Diwan Singh alias Sunny for their alleged roles in the attack's planning and execution.

Vishal Gill, one of two bike-borne assailants who hurled the grenade in the early hours of March 15, was charged for his direct involvement. The second assailant, Gursidak Singh alias Sidki, was killed in a police encounter two days later. Bhagwant Singh is accused of providing critical



logistical support, including shelter, grenades, and motorcycles for reconnaissance, while Diwan Singh faces charges for harbouring co-accused individuals and destroying evidence.

The NIA's investigation into the case has revealed a broader conspiracy involving terror operatives in India and abroad. The agency stated that it has uncovered the transfer of terror funds through UPI and MTSS channels, with ongoing investigations to trace these financial networks. On September 5, 2025, another key accused, Sharanjeet Kumar, was arrested in Gaya, Bihar, while investigations continue against Kumar and the absconding foreign-based operative Badalpreet Singh.

The attack, part of an alleged plot to instil fear and incite communal disharmony, has prompted the NIA to intensify efforts to identify other absconders and dismantle the terror module's international linkages. The agency said it remains committed to ensuring justice and preventing further threats to national security.

PM to lay the foundation stone and inaugurate multiple development projects worth over Rs 36,000 Cr. in Bihar

Maligaon, 14th September: The Prime Minister, Shri Narendra Modi, will visit Bihar on 15th September, 2025 to dedicate and inaugurate a wide range of development projects worth around Rs 36,000 crore, giving a major boost to infrastructure and connectivity in the state. A major focus of the visit will be on the railway projects, which will mark a historic step in strengthening Bihar's transport network. The Prime Minister will inaugurate the Araria-Galgolia (Thakurganj) New Railway Line, fulfilling a long-pending demand for direct connectivity between Araria and Kishanganj districts. The project is a landmark initiative executed by N.F. Railway on behalf of Indian Railways, with expenditure of over Rs 4,410 crore. Covering nearly 111 km and comprising several major & minor bridges and 15 stations, this project after inauguration will provide a vital boost to passenger and freight connectivity in the Seemanchal region. It will also open up enhanced cross-border trade opportunities with Nepal, thereby

contributing to the socio-economic develop-

ment of Bihar. The Prime Minister will also lay the foundation stone for the Bikramshila - Kataraah Rail Line project, worth over Rs 2,170 crore, which will provide a new rail link across the river Ganga. Alongside these projects, the Prime Minister will flag off four new train services that will open up new avenues of connectivity and convenience. The regular services of these trains include train No. 15701 (Katihar - Siliguri) Express via the Araria-Galgolia New Line, that will depart from Katihar daily at 05:00 hrs from 17-09-2025 to reach Siliguri at 10:15 hrs, same day. Similarly, train No. 26301 (Jogbani-Danapur) Vande Bharat Express will depart from Jogbani from 18-09-2025, daily (except Wednesday) at 3:25 hrs to reach Danapur at 11:30 hrs same day. Two Amrit



Bharat Express trains - one between Jogbani -

Erode and the other between Saharsa - Chheharta (Amritsar) will also be flagged off. Together, these projects and services will significantly enhance both regional and long-distance rail travel for the people of Bihar. Beyond the railway sector, the Prime Minister

Moving away from traditional crops, Hisar farmer transitions to horticulture profits

Parbhuwala (hisar) (Agency)

A farmer from Parbhuwala village in Haryana's Hisar, in 2024, earned Rs 25 lakh from just bell peppers cultivated in one out of four acres of net house farming. The remaining three acres had a mix of other vegetables and fruits.

Encouraged by this success, "This year, I have planted bell peppers across all four acres, which will be sold in Delhi's Azadpur market just like previous years," says Shiv Shankar Khowal (49).

His journey with cultivating fruits — which then later transitioned to English vegetables — started in 2005, prior to which he cultivated traditional crops including paddy and cotton. Since then, he has continued expanding the area under fruits and

vegetables.

Khowal, in 2005, began cultivating guava (amrud) on two acres of land, which earned him an impressive profit of Rs 2.5 lakh per acre. In the later years, he expanded guava cultivation to four acres. However, three years ago, he stopped cultivating guava altogether. He transitioned to other fruits, finding them more profitable than guava.

Through time he expanded his horticulture ventures to 21 acres. Currently, his 21-acre fruit farm includes kinnow, lemon, jujube, sweet lime and date palm, all supported by drip irrigation. In 2020, Khowal purchased an additional five acres of land, with him owning 25 acres of land in total now, and significantly improved his financial condition.

From taunts to triumph: Pakhowal woman leads zero-budget natural farming with her husband

Jalandhar. (Agency)

To save herself from slipping into depression, Rupinder Kaur and her family in 2017 took back two acres of their land — on lease — which grew only wheat and paddy, in Punjab's Pakhowal village.

Rupinder, with an MA and B.Ed., decided to go ahead with natural farming instead. She planted apple saplings in one acre, and dragon fruit, papaya and pomegranate on the other.

"Nobody had tried apple or dragon fruit here in our area," she recalls. And she decided to take the challenge owing to the lack of organic fruits in the local market.

And while her husband supported her natural farming, many in her village scoffed. "Why is she experimenting with crops that don't even belong to Punjab?" People taunted, "Why is she

working in the fields despite having a comfortable life?" But what began with taunts soon turned into community leadership. Rupinder — with her husband, Major Singh — set up Kulraj Natural Farm.



Together, they also formed several women's groups and merged them into the Pakhowal Farm Producer Company, with 300 members as of today. "We want to ensure that farmers, especially women, get better markets and recognition," she says.

Natural farming, however, didn't give much results in the initial three-four years.

Major Singh explains that the soil used to rely on chemicals for a long time takes time to adapt to natural farming. Rupinder says, "In the beginning, some virus attacked our apple crops and we lost the first batch during the initial years. But we didn't give up and slowly found our way. We succeeded and have been growing apples successfully for the past five years."

"Our income is two to three times more than what a farmer earns from wheat-paddy in the entire year," she says, adding that their expenditure is almost zero. "Natural farming is like zero-budget farming, which the Centre had once promoted in its annual budget."

Accidents turn attention to min's vow on KSRTC night services to airports

Kochi. (Agency)

A shocking early-morning accident two weeks ago, which claimed the lives of three members of a family who were returning home after seeing off a relative at Kochi airport, has served to further highlight the increased risk posed by driving at night.

The tragedy has also given rise to increased demands for deploying night services to airports using luxury sleeper buses being acquired by the Kerala State Road Transport Corporation (KSRTC), as previously promised by Transport Minister K B Ganesh Kumar.

"Currently, there is no connectivity to airports and back at night or early morning, when most of the international flights operate. Deploying luxury semi-sleeper buses will greatly benefit travellers from central and north Kerala.

The services will also attract commuters as people are willing to pay more for comfort and convenience. Look at the case of Kochi Metro's feeder buses operating to the airport during the day," said Ramesh Mathew, a frequent flyer who largely depends on public transport system for first- and last-mile connectivity. In an interview to , the minister promised AC semi-sleeper night services to airports. "KSRTC will operate AC sleeper buses with sufficient luggage space for the benefit of passengers on red-night flights.

The buses won't have scheduled services and will leave only after flights arrive," he said last November, when KSRTC initiated the process of introducing luxury buses as part of fleet modernisation. Manufacturers have started handing



over the vehicles, including Volvo 9600s, premium AC coaches and sleeper buses. Ganesh Kumar also talked about placing orders for 30 buses, with services from Kochi airport to Malabar and Central Travancore regions.

When contacted, a senior KSRTC official said priority is on deploying the new additions on inter-state routes and to replace revenue-earning take over services.

"We're examining the feasibility of proposed night services. Day services have not been generating the expected revenue as passengers continue to depend on private vehicles/taxis. Airport authorities are also promoting taxi services," the official pointed out. Last Thursday, a man and his two children died after their sport-utility vehicle (SUV) collided head-on with a KSRTC bus in Ochira, Kollam. According to police, the victims were returning home from Kochi airport when the accident happened.

In another incident in the wee hours of last December 15, four members of a family, including a newly-wed couple, lost their lives while on their way from Thiruvananthapuram airport. Their car collided with a bus at Murinjakkal in Pathanamthitta district.

The police initially assessed that both accidents happened as drivers fell asleep at the wheel. "In the first incident, the father, a businessman from Tevalakkara, was driving the vehicle. He drove for over 180km to the airport, waited there for three to four hours before driving back.

Often in such cases, drivers are overcome by microsleep — the brief, uncontrollable episodes of sleep lasting a few seconds — induced by fatigue and sleep deprivation. Travelling during wee hours is very dangerous.

Petition Sought Regular Special Intensive Revision. Poll Body's Response

►The Election Commission said it has the "complete discretion" over the policy of revision of voter lists

Agency New Delhi. The Election Commission (EC) has told the Supreme Court that any direction to conduct special intensive revision (SIR) of electoral rolls at regular intervals throughout the country would "encroach" upon the exclusive jurisdiction of the poll panel.In a counter-affidavit filed in the apex court, the EC said it has the "complete discretion" over the policy of revision to the

exclusion of any other authority. It said through its July 5, 2025, letter addressed to all chief electoral officers (CEOs) of states and Union Territories, except Bihar, the commission has directed the initiation of immediate pre-revision activities for SIR of electoral rolls with reference to January 1, 2026, as the qualifying date.The affidavit said the EC is vested with constitutional as well as statutory powers to oversee the preparation and revision of electoral rolls.

"Any direction to conduct a 'SIR' at regular intervals throughout the country would encroach upon the exclusive jurisdiction of the EC," it said.The affidavit was filed on a plea by advocate Ashwini Kumar Upadhyay, who has sought a direction to the EC to conduct SIR of electoral rolls at regular intervals throughout India, particularly before elections, to ensure that only Indian citizens



decide the polity and policy of the country.On September 8, the apex court had directed that the Aadhaar card "must" be included as an identity proof of voters in the SIR exercise of electoral rolls in Bihar and asked the EC to implement the direction by September 9.

In its counter affidavit, the poll panel said under Article 324 of the Constitution, the superintendence, direction and control of

the preparation of electoral rolls for, and the conduct of, all elections to parliament and to the legislature of every state are vested in the EC.

"The said constitutional provision forms the bedrock of the Election Commission's plenary authority in all matters relating to the preparation of electoral rolls and conduct of elections," it said.It said Article 324 has been consistently interpreted by the apex court to confer plenary powers upon the EC in relation to the preparation of the electoral roll and conduct of free and fair elections, including in matters where the statutory framework may be silent or insufficient.The affidavit said the enabling provisions under the Representation of the People Act, 1950, and the Registration of Electors Rules, 1960, provide EC powers to decide whether an intensive or summary revision is appropriate, based on prevailing circumstances.

My brain worth Rs 200 crore, I earn honestly: Nitin Gadkari amid E20 petrol row

Agency Nagpur. Amid the controversy over the government's push for ethanol-blended petrol, with critics alleging personal gain for him, Union Minister for Road Transport and Highways Nitin Gadkari dismissed the charges, saying that his "brain is worth 200 crore a month" and he earns honestly without resorting to fraud."My brain is worth 200 crore per month. I know how to earn honestly," Gadkari said at an event in Nagpur, adding that he has no shortage of money.While the government promotes ethanol as a cleaner and cheaper alternative fuel, concerns have been raised over its impact on food and water security, vehicle safety, and consumer choice. Critics have also claimed that two leading ethanol companies are run by Gadkari's sons. Gadkari, without directly mentioning the row, explained how he guides his sons in legitimate business ventures. "I give ideas to my sons, but I do not resort to fraud.""Recently, my son imported 800 containers of apples from Iran and exported 1,000 containers of bananas from India to Iran. There are no monetary dealings with Iran. My son is engaged in import and export. I also own a sugar factory, a distillery, and a power plant. I am not experimenting with agriculture for personal gain," the minister said. Gadkari also highlighted his efforts to encourage local entrepreneurship, mentioning how he advised vegetable vendors to establish fruit malls across Nagpur. According to him, such initiatives empower traders and farmers by enabling direct sales at prime city locations.

Nepal Gen Z protest sign of vibrant democracy, not anarchy: Ex-poll body chief

Agency New Delhi. Developments in Nepal are a sign of a "vibrant democracy" and not anarchy, says former chief election commissioner S Y Quraishi, asserting that governments must be very careful in regulating social media as it has become an integral part of everyone's life.Quraishi also said that India has to take the lead in the SAARC region for hand-holding democracies "which are still struggling" by providing support to them but must do so as an "elder brother" and not as a "big brother".In an interview with PTI ahead of the launch of his book 'Democracy's Heartland' in which he tracks the democratic journey of the countries in South Asia, Quraishi said he sees the developments in Nepal as a sign of democracy taking root because the movement there was a "democratic" one and things settled down in a few days time.

"This is a sign of a very living and vibrant democracy and not anarchy. Of course there was corruption and there was political instability. There have been five prime ministers in as many years and seven Constitutions in the last 70 years. So, political instability has been the hallmark of Nepal but at the same time, their latest Constitution of 2015 is a very good one because it gave a lot of power to women," he said.

"Students coming to the streets, for me, is democracy not anarchy - they want more democracy, genuine and honest democracy," he said.

His remarks came days after Nepal's Prime Minister KP Sharma Oli was forced to resign after the 'Gen Z' group launched a massive protest. The major demands of the protesters included checking corruption, ending favouritism and lifting ban on social media sites.Talking about the developments, Quraishi said he doesn't think the intention of the Nepalese government was to suppress the voice of the people.

"In fact perhaps the measure was against the independence of these (social media) platforms because they had not registered themselves in Nepal and could not be subjected to any discipline of Nepal. So they refused to comply and the government banned them all, not realising that they have become part of every one's life in Nepal," he said.Quraishi pointed out that 10 per cent of the Nepalese are abroad and their only communication with the family is through social media and that is why many came out on the streets.

NIA arrests banned PFI's Bihar unit chief in 2022 terror conspiracy case

Agency New Delhi. The National Investigation Agency (NIA) on Saturday arrested Mahboob Alam, the Bihar unit president of the banned Popular Front of India (PFI) in connection with the 2022 Phulwarisharif terror conspiracy case.

Alam, a resident of Katihar district, was caught from Kishanganj. He is the 19th accused to be arrested and chargesheeted in the case, which was initially registered by the local police against 26 people.

The case involved PFI associates allegedly involved in unlawful and anti-national activities aimed at creating an atmosphere of terror by spreading religious enmity between

members of different religions and groups. The case is related to activities prejudicial to peace and



harmony, and intended to disrupt public tranquility and cause disaffection against India, justifying the use of criminal force.

According to the NIA, the PFI members had indulged in spreading fear among

the people through the promotion of the PFI ideology, which seeks to establish the rule of Islam in India as envisaged in the outfit's seized vision document titled "India 2047 Towards Rule of Islam in India, Internal Document: Not for circulation".

The accused was found to be part of the PFI conspiracy as stated in the said document, seized from Ahmad Palace, Phulwarisharif, Patna on July 11, 2022.Along with co-accused persons, he was engaged in recruitment, training, meetings and anti-national activities of PFI, as per the NIA investigations. He had also raised funds and provided the same to the co-accused persons and PFI cadres.

Opposition including Congress may boycott JPC on bill to sack tainted PM, Cms

Agency New Delhi. The Opposition parties including Congress are likely to boycott the Joint Parliamentary Committee (JPC) that will scrutinize the three bills on the removal of the Prime Minister, Chief Ministers, and Ministers arrested on serious criminal charges for 30 days, according to sources. The government is yet to constitute the 31-member JPC to which the Lok Sabha referred the three bills during the recently concluded Monsoon session of Parliament.The Congress, principal opposition party in the INDIA bloc, after dilly-dallying on its decision to nominate members for the committee, decided to join forces with key allies Trinamool Congress (TMC), Samajwadi Party (TMC),



Aam Aadmi Party (AAP), and Shiv Sena (UBT), which have already announced their decision not to join the panel, said sources.

The committee has been mandated to submit its report in the winter session, which is likely to be convened in the third week of November.Reliable sources told that the Congress decided to jump on the bandwagon for the sake of Opposition unity ahead of

the Bihar election and to keep up the momentum that was built on the issue of 'Vote theft' during the Monsoon session.Earlier, the Congress, DMK and the CPI (M) were of the strong view that the Opposition should nominate members to the JPC and oppose the bill, which is deemed anti-constitutional and undermines the country's federal structure. According to sources, Congress, DMK, and CPM were of the view that the TMC, which first made the announcement not to join the panel, took the decision without consulting with other parties. "Though the TMC wanted the opposition to boycott the JPC, there was a dominant view that the government would bulldoze the bill without any dissenting voices.

EC should have ordered probe instead of 'shouting' at Rahul Gandhi: Ex-CEC Quraishi on 'vote theft' charges

The former election commissioner slammed EC for its handling of the Special Intensive Revision of electoral rolls in Bihar, saying it has 'opened a pandora's box' and 'put its hand in a hornet's nest' that will backfire.

Agency New Delhi. Coming down hard on the Election Commission for its response on "vote theft" allegations, former chief election commissioner S Y Quraishi on Sunday said the poll body should have ordered a probe into Leader of Opposition Rahul Gandhi's charges instead of "shouting" at him in a language that was "objectionable and offensive".

In an interview with PTI, Quraishi said much of the terms used by Gandhi while making the allegations such as likening them to a "hydrogen bomb" were "political rhetoric" but asserted that the complaints which he was raising need to be investigated in detail.The former chief election commissioner slammed the Election Commission (EC) over the manner in which it carried out the Special Intensive Revision of electoral

rolls in Bihar, and said it is not only "opening a pandora's box" but the poll body has put its hand in the "hornet's nest" which will hurt it.

"You know when I hear any criticism of the EC, I feel very concerned and very hurt not only as a citizen of India but also because having been the CEC myself, I have also laid a brick or two in that institution," he told PTI ahead of the launch of his new book 'Democracy's Heartland' published by Juggernaut Books."When I see that institution under attack or weakened in any way I feel concerned and the EC itself has to do introspection and has to feel concerned. It is up to them to stand up to all the forces and the pressures that may be influencing their decisions," said Quraishi, who was the Chief Election Commissioner (CEC) between 2010 and



2012.

"They have to win the confidence of the people - you need the confidence of the opposition parties. For me, I always gave preference to the opposition parties because they are the underdogs," he said. Quraishi opined that the party in power doesn't need as much pampering as the opposition does because the latter is out

Woman Jumps To Death With Mentally-Ill Son, Leaves "Sorry" Note For Husband

Agency New Delhi. Upset over her son's prolonged mental illness, a 37-year-old woman jumped to death along with her 11-year-old son from their 13th-floor flat in Greater Noida yesterday.

Sakshi Chawla had been living with her husband, Darpan Chawla, and their son, Daksh, at Greater Noida's Ace City. Daksh, it is learnt, had been undergoing treatment for mental health issues for over a decade and Sakshi was stressed over his condition.Darpan Chawla, a chartered accountant by profession, was at home when the tragic incident took place. He has told police that he was in another room and heard a scream. On reaching the balcony, he saw his wife and son on the ground.Police reached the spot, recovered the bodies and sent them for autopsy. They later recovered a note from the Chawlas' home. In the note addressed to her husband, Sakshi Chawla wrote, "We are leaving this world... Sorry. We do not want to trouble you anymore. Your life should not be ruined because of us. No one is responsible for our death."Police officers have said the tragedy had shaken neighbours. While they suspect that mental stress drove the woman to the edge, a detailed investigation is on.

Shakti Avasthy, Deputy Commissioner of Police for central Noida, said, "A police team found a suicide note and learnt that the son was unwell for some time. We are taking necessary steps," he said.

Most reservoirs become ineffective due to sedimentation, says study

Agency New Delhi. Most of the dams in the country are facing severe siltation, which reduces their effectiveness in flood control and water storage, a new study by the Indian Institute of Science Education and Research (IISER) has said, highlighting that Himalayan and Indo-Gangetic plain rivers are classified as highly vulnerable and require immediate attention.

The study analysed data from the Central Water Commission's recent report, 'Compendium on Sedimentation of Reservoirs in India', and found that a majority of the dams have lost over 50% of their total reservoir capacity.

"By 2050, 10 reservoirs in east-flowing rivers and 7 in west-flowing rivers are projected to surpass 50% storage capacity loss, posing a severe threat to water security," said the study, 'Sedimentation-induced vulnerabilities of large reservoirs in India', published in the journal 'Stochastic Environmental Research and Risk Assessment'.

Researchers Uma Madhuri Mogili and Somil Swarnkar from the IISER, Bhopal looked at nearly 370 large reservoirs —capacity of over 100 million cubic metres—in seven regions, including the Himalayan and Indo-Gangetic plains.

Most of the analysed reservoirs were found to have become operational between 1939 and 1991.East-flowing rivers beyond Godavari, having nearly 160reservoirs, are a critical zone in meeting south India's agricultural and industrial water needs, the researchers added. However, west-flowing rivers up to the Narmada were noted to have fewer, but larger reservoirs.

According to the research, several reservoirs in the Himalayan and Indo-Gangetic plains rivers are classified as high or very high vulnerability, requiring immediate attention and management interventions."The limited number of reservoirs on rivers in the Himalayan region and Indo-Gangetic plains highlight terrain-related challenges in mountains in the former and a heavy reliance on natural river flows in the latter," the study said.

India vs Pakistan: A cricketing mismatch, but one Asia Cup number could shock us all

India might dominate on the field, Pakistan might struggle to keep up, but in the aftermath of the Pahalgam terror attack and Operation Sindoor, the real uncertainty of this Asia Cup isn't the scoreline. It could be the numbers off the screens—how many actually tune in to watch the rivalry unfold.

Cricket is a game of glorious uncertainties. But when it comes to India vs Pakistan, there is one certainty: people watch. They watch in droves, in numbers that dwarf every other sporting spectacle in this part of the world. Yet, as Asia Cup 2025 looms in Dubai, a strange paradox is at play. The cricketing contest feels increasingly one-sided, the rivalry dulled by class imbalance between the two teams, and yet, the debate isn't about whether India will win. It's about whether people will watch in the same dizzying

numbers – because, for the first time in years, the off-field context may tip the scales.Gone are the days when the on-field battle alone pulled in the crowds. Imran Khan vs Kapil Dev, Wasim Akram vs Sachin Tendulkar, Waqar Younis vs Sourav Ganguly, and even Misbah-ul-Haq vs MS Dhoni made people skip work, cancel meetings, and postpone family outings – all just to be glued to their television screens.Today, Pakistan have unfortunately fallen to newer lows. The gap is glaring, even in T20Is: while India rolls out a conveyor belt of batting stars and deep bowling options, Pakistan are still riding bullock carts in an era of Lamborghinis. Birthday battle for Suryakumar Yadav: Can India skipper rise against Pakistan

India captain Suryakumar Yadav will have a lot riding on his shoulders as he leads his men against arch-rivals Pakistan in the Asia Cup 2025 on Sunday, September 14, at Dubai International Cricket Stadium, Dubai. The fixture is taking place under controversial circumstances, with the Board of Control for Cricket in India (BCCI) facing a nationwide backlash for agreeing to play with the arch-rivals in the aftermath of the Pahalgam terrorist attack.The widespread protests are only going to add to the pressure on the India skipper, who will be playing his first match against Pakistan as captain. In cricket-crazy India, defeats against most teams are grudgingly accepted, but a loss to Pakistan is rarely forgiven.As a result, Suryakumar will be under immense scrutiny during the blockbuster clash, with both his on-field decisions and runs from his willow expected to be dissected closely, as has been the case with every India captain facing Pakistan. Heading into the fixture, his record against the rivals also doesn't paint a promising picture as the India T20I captain is yet to cross the 20-run mark against Pakistan.While India's own Mr



360 has good numbers to show against every top side, his five innings against Pakistan have only yielded 64 runs at an average of 12.80 with a highest score of 18. In addition, Suryakumar's recent form has also seen a massive dip ever since he was appointed India's full-time T20I captain in July 2024.

Is Suryakumar feeling the heat of captaincy?

After being given the responsibility of leading the side ahead of the Sri Lanka tour in 2024, he has scored 265 runs from 15 innings at an average of 18.92 with just two half-centuries to show for himself. While his record as captain has been unblemished so far, as India are yet to lose a series under Suryakumar's leadership, his diminishing returns with the bat are a major concern heading into next year's T20 World Cup.

Asia Cup 2025: Pakistan appear to be following India's spin-heavy blueprint, with both teams' star spinners set to play a key role in what promises to be a high-stakes, spin-dominated encounter.

Pakistan appear to be following India's spin-heavy blueprint ahead of their Asia Cup 2025 group-stage clash in Dubai on Saturday, September 13. Under head coach Mike Hesson, they have revamped their bowling attack to mirror India's successful strategy in the UAE and now appear to be aiming to exploit slow, turning wickets and test their historic rivals. Both teams have started their campaigns with a win each, and with a win almost guaranteeing a Super 4 spot, the stakes are sky-high.

Kuldeep Yadav, Varun Chakravarthy, and Axar Patel form the core of India's spin

attack. Kuldeep, a key figure in India's recent white-ball triumphs, including the T20 World Cup 2024 and the Champions Trophy, has 73 wickets in 41 games at an economy rate of 6.72. Varun, whose IPL resurgence earned him a national



comeback, was part of the Champions Trophy-winning side, taking 34 wickets in 19 games at an average of 6.87. Axar, a reliable all-rounder, adds balance and flexibility, with 72 wickets in 72 T20Is at 7.2 runs per over. Their experience and proven record make them one of the most feared spin combinations in white-ball cricket.To understand why Pakistan are

taking this path, one only needs to look across the border. India's spin trio has become a weapon of choice in crunch tournaments, blending variety with control to dominate in the middle overs.

PAKISTAN'S SPIN HEAVY APPROACH MIRRORS INDIA

Since Hesson took charge in May 2025, Pakistan shifted from a pace-heavy attack of Shaheen Afridi, Haris Rauf, and Naseem Shah to a spin-centric setup, closely mirroring India's blueprint. Recent results suggest progress – wins over Bangladesh, West Indies, and a tri-series triumph against Afghanistan and the UAE.

Spin has become central. Saim Ayub has bowled 34 overs in 15 matches for 10 wickets at 6.73, Abrar

Ahmad with 25.4 overs in seven games, and Mohammad Nawaz bowling 35.4 overs in 12 matches for 21 wickets, since Hesson took charge. Pakistan now fields a left-arm wrist-spinner in Sufiyan Muqeem akin to Kuldeep, a mystery-spinner in Abrar like Varun, and a dependable all-rounder in Nawaz similar to Axar.

Market Outlook: Fed Rate Decision, Trade Talks, FII Flows Likely To Drive Sensex, Nifty Next Week

The coming week is expected to be crucial for Indian stock markets as investors look ahead to key global and domestic developments. The US Federal Reserve’s policy meeting, progress on India’s trade deals with the US and the EU, and the trend of foreign institutional investors (FIIs) will likely set the tone for market movements.
Market experts believe that the US Fed may cut interest rates by 25 basis points in its upcoming meeting. A deeper cut of 50 basis points, however, would be a surprise and could boost sentiment in global markets, including India. Updates on India’s trade negotiations will also be closely tracked. Last week, Commerce and Industry Minister Piyush Goyal said that discussions on an India-US trade deal are ongoing and that the first phase could be finalised by November.He also noted that talks on the India-EU trade deal are at an advanced stage. FII activity will be another key driver for the markets. Out of the last five trading sessions, FIIs were net buyers in two, with inflows worth Rs 129.58 crore on Friday alone. This indicates that the FII trend is slowly turning positive.
The previous week was strong for Indian equities. The Nifty gained 373 points, or 1.51 per cent, to close at 25,114, while the Sensex climbed 1,193.94 points, or 1.48 per cent, to end at 81,904.70. Looking ahead, experts maintain a positive stance on equities. They suggest focusing on domestic cyclical such as autos, metals, and consumer discretionary, while keeping a balance with defensives like select FMCG and pharma stocks.On the technical front, analysts at Religare Broking said the Nifty has tested its previous swing high near 25,150. “While some consolidation cannot be ruled out, the outlook remains positive with the next upside target seen in the 25,250–25,500 range,” Ajit Mishra said.

On Govt table: How to help exporters not lose market share due to 50% US tariff

New Delhi.(Agency)
TO PREVENT loss of market share following the high 50% US tariffs, the government is ready to extend a series of mitigating measures such as subsidised interest rates, collateral-free loans and credit guarantee, to labour-intensive exporters. Exporters also want government support in facilitating access to big domestic buyers — both public like the Railways, and private like Reliance Retail and Aditya Birla Group.
In the first half of this year, and just weeks before the 25% reciprocal US tariffs kicked-in on August 7, India managed a 12% growth in shipments of textiles and apparels to the US. This was, however, far lower than the export growth clocked by competitors Vietnam, Bangladesh, Indonesia and Cambodia.With the additional 25% secondary tariffs for Russian oil purchases becoming effective August 27, there is little doubt the comparative advantage has reversed sharply for India, impacting shipments of leather and shrimps, apart from textiles and apparel.In New Delhi, policy makers had multiple rounds of deliberations with affected exporters, and a constant refrain in these meetings is: Shore up market share, whatever it takes... Losing market share will make it really difficult to recover it back as and when the tariff situation normalises.The message has been distilled down by government officials, who have tried to impress this upon exporters in their meetings. This exhortation, of course, has been alongside an assurance that the government is formulating a broad-based plan to mitigate, at least in part, the loss of competitiveness of exporters.This assertion is borne out of the implicit calculation within sections of the Central government that the 25 per cent secondary tariffs on account of Russian oil imports would be drawn down at some point, sooner than later.

Centre notifies new rules for UPS: What are they; check details here

Unified Pension Scheme, or UPS, guarantees a minimum pension for the employees of the Central government. It was approved by the Centre on August 24 last year and rolled out from April 1 this year. However, it has triggered less than lukewarm response among the intended beneficiaries so far.

The Unified Pension Scheme, or UPS, guarantees a minimum pension for the employees of the Central government. It also guaranteed a monthly pension that is half of the last drawn salary of an employee. The government thought that it would attract a large number of its

employees but was surprised to find only a handful responding to the new scheme. Central government employees under the NPS will now get one-time option for inclusion under the UPS and a one-time, One-way switch from UPS to NPS. That was one of the reasons that motivated the notification.UPS is an alternative to the National Pension System which has been in operation for the past several years. Apart from having the provision of assured pension, it is indexed to the inflation, is predictable and benefits continue for the survivors of the employee after his/her death.
The Department of Pension and Pensioners’ Welfare has notified in the official Gazette on the Central Civil Services (Implementation of the Unified Pension Scheme under the National Pension System) Rules, 2025 for regulating the service matters relating to benefits under the Unified Pension Scheme in respect of Central Government employees opting for UPS as an option under the NPS,” the Ministry of Personnel, Public Grievances and

Pensions said in a statement on September 4.
What does the rules encompass
The Ministry said that the Central Civil Services (Implementation of the Unified



Pension Scheme under the National Pension System) Rules, 2025 will cover: Enrolment under Unified Pension Scheme Switch facility form UPS to NPS one year before the date of retirement or three months before the VRSCContributions by the employee and the

What is the real fiscal cost of GST reforms

NEW DELHI: When the Finance Ministry embarked on the GST rate rationalisation exercise, it emphasised that the move was aimed at easing the burden on the common man rather than focusing on potential revenue loss. Yet, analysts and economists continue to huddle over the ‘rea’ fiscal cost of the move.While the Finance Ministry has projected a revenue impact of ₹48,000 crore, several economists and research firms estimate the actual cost could be far higher — in the range of ₹1.5–2 lakh crore.As per the government estimate, the gross revenue loss would be ₹93,000 crore, which will be partially offset by additional revenue of ₹45,000 crore due to shift in goods from 28% slab to 40%. The finance ministry’s assessment is based on the FY24 consumption basket, keeping static assumptions.However, even government officials do sound too sanguine about these estimates. Officials in the finance ministry maintained that their figures are conservative and based on historical data, though they acknowledged reforms aim at bringing relief to the masses and not to enhance revenue collection of the government. “It is very difficult to precisely say that how

much will be the impact and anyway our experience says that whenever there is a rate consumption goes up and ultimately there is no revenue loss and one thing I would say that whether it is



48,000 (crore) or 93,000 (crore), this money is going to remain in the hands of common man,” said a senior official. Former finance and economic affairs secretary Subhash Chandra Garg dismissed these numbers as “gross under-estimation.” He argued that the 2023-24 consumption-based loss of ₹93,000 crore, when adjusted to 2025-26 prices, works out to nearly ₹1.1 lakh crore annually. On top of that, the Centre will forgo the GST compensation cess, which yielded around ₹1.4 lakh crore a year. Even

after accounting for recovery of about ₹50,000 crore from items in the 40% GST slab, Garg believes the net shortfall would still hover around ₹2 lakh crore.Most economists TNIE spoke to said how the government arrived at the revenue loss estimate is not very clear, and therefore, they do not entirely agree with the figure.
Reports from Emkay Global, HSBC and Bernstein suggest the total revenue loss will likely be around ₹1.5 lakh crore once the new rate structure is fully implemented.Bernstein’s research highlights that the merging of the 12% slab into 5% alone could wipe out ₹79,600 crore, while scrapping the 28% slab could cost another ₹1.12 lakh crore. Gains from shifting some items into higher slabs — ₹700 crore (12% to 18%) and ₹15,000 crore (28% to 40%)—would only marginally offset the damage, leaving an estimated net loss of ₹1.57 trillion for both Centre and states. HSBC estimates a net revenue loss of ₹7000 crore for half a year.Gaura Sengupta, chief economist at IDFC First Bank.

GST Exemption On Insurance: Here’s Why You Can’t Claim GST Refund After Sept 22

If you’ve recently paid a multi-year insurance premium, here’s an important update. Starting September 22, 2025, the GST on individual life and health insurance premiums will drop to 0 per cent, a big relief for new buyers. However, if you’ve already paid for a multi-year policy in advance, the 18 per cent GST you paid will not be refunded. This means the tax benefit applies only to premiums paid after the rate cut takes effect.No GST Refund on Prepaid Multi-Year PoliciesEven if your insurance coverage extends beyond September 22, 2025, there is no provision to refund the GST paid for future years. The tax is collected at the time of payment and deposited with the

government, which completes the transaction.GST Rules Apply to All Payment Modes
This applies to all types of payments, whether you pay your premiums in full upfront or in instalments. However, any monthly, quarterly, or semi-annual premium due on or after September 22 will no longer include GST. Premiums due before this date, even if paid later during the grace period, will still carry the 18 per cent GST.//
Start Coverage After GST Cut to Save TaxSome insurers are now letting customers start their policy coverage from September 22, even if the policy was purchased earlier. This allows buyers to lock in the same terms while taking advantage of the 0 per cent

GST.Use the Free-Look Period to Benefit from GST CutIf you’re still in the free-look period usually 15 to 30 days from purchase—you can cancel your policy and get a full refund of the premium and GST, minus any processing fees or charges for the days you were covered. Many policyholders are using this option to cancel recent purchases and reissue them after September 22 to benefit from the GST reduction.
The GST exemption on life and health insurance premiums is a big win for policyholders, lowering the cost of essential financial protection. However, it’s important to understand the details especially if you’ve already prepaid your policy.

CBIC Clears Confusion Over ITC Treatment Of Post-Sale Discounts,

CBIC clarifies buyers need not reverse ITC on discounts via post-sale financial or commercial credit notes.

New Delhi.(Agency)
Dispersing the confusion in regard to input tax credit (ITC) when suppliers issue post-sale financial or commercial credit notes, the Central Board of Indirect Taxes and Customs (CBIC) has clarified that in that scenario, buyers will not be required to reverse ITC even if payments are made at a discount.Even if the buyers pay the less after the discount, they don’t need to reverse ITC. The supplier still pays full GST on the original invoice.In a circular dated September 12, 2025, CBDT said that the issuance of financial/commercial credit notes does not reduce the tax liability on the supplier. “...it is clarified that the recipient will not be required to reverse the Input Tax Credit attributed to



the discount provided on the basis of financial/ commercial Credit notes issued by the supplier, as there is no reduction in the original transaction value of the supply and accordingly the corresponding tax liability would also not get reduced," CBDT said in the circular.There has been confusion among buyers that if they require to reverse ITC, given the supplier issues commercial or financial credit notes post the supply.
Under the GST, the supplier of goods can

issue financial/commercial credit notes. However, these are not considered for tax purpose. Sellers can issue them for various purposes like discounts, incentives, rebates or compensation. Thus they don’t reduce the taxable value or GST liability of the original invoice.
Abhishek Jain, Partner & National Head, Indirect Tax at KPMG in India, said, “it provides much-needed clarity on the GST treatment of various types of discount transactions between manufacturers and

distributors/dealers.“The tax treatment of such discounts has been a subject matter of dispute between the tax authorities and the industry and this circular clarifies the matter in favour of the industry,” argued Karthik Mani, Partner- Indirect tax at BDO India, praising he timing of the circular considering the upcoming festive season, giving the manufacturers clarity for giving support to lower the customer prices.The circular further distinguished between different types of post-sale discounts. Discounts offered by manufacturers to dealers merely for competitive pricing and sales push cannot be treated as consideration for any service. However, if discounts are linked to specific agreements with end customers, such benefits would be considered part of the overall supply consideration.CBDT also mentioned in the circular that these credit notes should not be treated as payment for promotional activities done by dealers, unless there is a clear agreement for distinct services such as advertising, co-branding, or customer support.

How to get Acquired

Bala Parthasarathy, managing partner at seed-stage fund AngelPrime, an early investor in ZipDial, writes about the 7 things they learned from Twitter's acquisition of the Bengaluru-based venture



Fortune favours the survivors -- The first rule in business is to survive. The longer you are around, the higher are your chances of being acquired or good things happening to you. Valerie Wagoner and Amiya Pathak (ZipDial founders) stuck it out through thick and thin. If they had folded their cards at the first hiccup, they would not have made history. Set your horizons for at least seven years. In the case of ZipDial, it happened to them in Year 5. If you want to start something and flip it in two years, you better be extremely lucky!

Traction, not just technology -- Amiya (Pathak) built an amazingly scalable architecture that wowed Twitter. But unlike most technology companies I see, they had 60 million users, a strong sales team, growing revenues and ubiquitous presence. These must have been compelling factors when someone inside Twitter did a build-versus-buy decision.

Armchair matchmaking never works -- At AngelPrime, I hear entrepreneurs telling me why Facebook or Google or some other company would acquire them because of this-that-or-the-other. It never works that way. Based on my own experience in selling Snapfish and being the acquirer of startups, most large companies operate like independent fiefdoms ruled by fiercely protective leaders whose idea of what is best for them and what is

best for the overall company are typically at odds. It is these leaders, not the M&A team, that makes buying decisions, especially in technology.

Sow the seeds and be patient -- You should cultivate a business relationship with the potential acquirer that makes business sense for you and the company. Specifically, you should engage with one or more teams for which your technology or product would be interesting. Think business first, not acquisition first. And focus on why partnering with you helps them. In the process, get to understand the company's internal goals, the people and culture. ZipDial had a two-year business relationship with Twitter where they had worked together on various campaigns, including Bollywood and Indian elections.

People, not companies -- People, not companies, do deals. Valley companies are generally very insular and rarely do deals outside Bay Area, let alone India (Israel is an exception to the rule). They first need to build a relationship with you as a person before they see the value in your technology and business. The ZipDial team had solid relationships at multiple levels with different teams at Twitter, long before the deal was conceived. Luckily, there are plenty of people who can help you connect, if you're not the networking

type. iSpirt M&A Connect is a very well designed programme which can formally help you forge relationships with many Valley companies.

Date many, marry one -- Though there might be one perfect company for you in the end, you should engage with multiple companies. And when I say engage, I mean build a business relationship.

There are so many rational and irrational factors that go into an acquisition decision from the acquirer's end that you'll never know about and thinking that THE ONE will eventually scoop you up, is foolish. Plus, your chances of being acquired are much higher when multiple companies court you. ZipDial had plenty of other business relationships, each of which could have been THE ONE.

Don't sell, be bought -- This cliché is certainly obvious to anyone who has ever bargained in a bazaar. If you're desperately looking to be sold, your chances of being acquired are very, very low. And even if you do get acquired, the price will be pathetic.

Indeed, the best way to be acquired is to go around building a solid business with traction, being patient and cultivating the relationships. And then, let the Gods of Luck play their role!

IT startups to gain from IIT placements

In its bid to promote entrepreneurship in the National Capital Region, the Indian Institute of Technology Delhi's Entrepreneurship Development Cell will be conducting a placement programme for students across disciplines, a move touted as the first such in India.

EDC-IIT Delhi has brought on board some of the country's top startups, a list that includes, News Corp-backed real estate portal PropTiger, TouchTalent, an online marketplace for creative talent, and video-based platform Frankly.me, which could potentially hire close to 300 students during course of the job fair, scheduled to be held later this month at IIT campus.

"Startups are always on the lookout for talent, and this event also helps in fostering the entrepreneurial environment in the Delhi-NCR region," said Navratn

Singh, director of the IIT Delhi cell.

The placement programme could see engineering students from Delhi College of Engineering, often preferred pick of startups looking to build further on technology platforms, duking it out with the best Delhi University has to offer, including students from high-profile colleges, such as Sri Ram College of Commerce, Lady Shri Ram College and Hansraj College.

"This isn't just for engineering students, or those with a tech background. It's for who's looking to join startups in India," pointed out Ravish Ratnam, president, EDC-IIT Delhi. Additionally, SAIF Partners, Accel Partners and Matrix Partners -have signed up to participate in the programme.
