

India to have strategic petroleum stock in UAE. A massive 30 million barrels

Calling the UAE an 'important partner in India's energy security,' the MEA said both sides agreed to pursue 'new initiatives for a comprehensive energy partnership' covering crude oil, LNG and LPG supplies.

New Delhi.(Agency)

India and the United Arab Emirates have agreed to significantly deepen their energy partnership, with the UAE set to store up to 30 million barrels of crude oil in India's Strategic Petroleum Reserve, the Ministry of External Affairs said on Friday after Prime Minister Narendra Modi's short visit to Abu Dhabi.

The agreement emerged from wide-ranging talks between Prime Minister Modi and UAE President Sheikh Mohamed bin Zayed Al Nahyan, with both leaders also stressing the importance of 'safe transit passage and unimpeded navigation through the Strait of Hormuz' amid rising regional tensions. In a statement, the MEA

said the two leaders 'welcomed the conclusion of a Strategic Collaboration Agreement between Indian Strategic Petroleum Reserves Limited and Abu Dhabi National Oil Company to enhance UAE's

West Asia. The two countries also agreed to work together on setting up strategic gas reserves in India and welcomed a separate arrangement between Indian Oil Corporation and ADNOC for long-term LPG supplies.

Calling the UAE an 'important partner in India's energy security,' the MEA said both sides agreed to pursue 'new initiatives for a comprehensive energy partnership' covering crude oil, LNG and LPG supplies.



Beyond energy, the visit also saw the announcement of USD 5 billion in UAE investments into India across banking, infrastructure and finance sectors, alongside new agreements in defence, maritime cooperation, shipbuilding and advanced computing.

Bihar: Samrat Choudhary govt's first 30 days bring reform push, execution challenge

One month after Samrat Choudhary took oath as Bihar Chief Minister on April 15, his government has moved quickly to announce a series of decisions aimed at improving infrastructure, education, public services, women's safety and law and order across the state. The first 30 days of the government have been marked by policy announcements and administrative reforms, though the real test will lie in effective implementation and delivery on the ground.



Among the government's major development initiatives is a plan to build 11 satellite townships across 10 districts of Bihar. The proposed townships are expected to include planned

residential zones, commercial markets, wider roads, parks and green spaces, with the aim of easing pressure on existing urban centres while improving living standards.

In an effort to strengthen women's safety, the government has introduced the Police Didi scheme. Under the initiative, 1,500 scooters will be purchased for women police personnel who will patrol areas near schools and colleges to prevent harassment and crimes against women.

FIR against Abhishek Banerjee over 'provocative' poll speeches

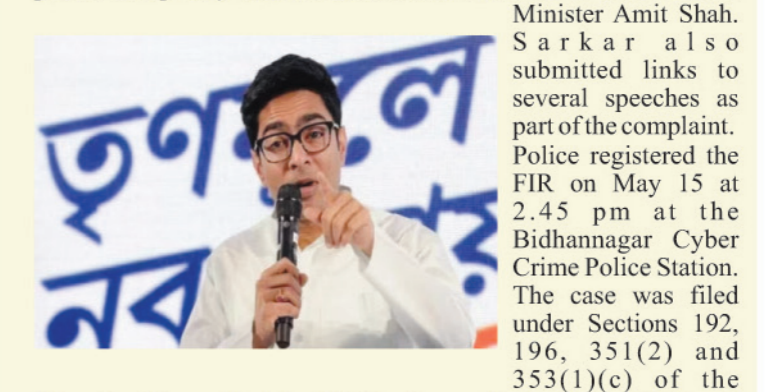
Police have registered an FIR against Abhishek Banerjee over alleged provocative election speeches. The case follows a complaint alleging inflammatory remarks and a threat to Amit Shah.

An FIR has been registered against Abhishek Banerjee at the Bidhannagar Cyber Crime Police Station over alleged provocative speeches made during the 2026 West Bengal Assembly election campaign.

According to the FIR, social activist Rajib Sarkar filed the complaint on May 5, a day after the election results were announced. Sarkar lodged the complaint at Baguiati Police Station and alleged that Abhishek Banerjee made inflammatory remarks during multiple campaign events held between April 27 and May 3.

The complaint alleged that the speeches promoted enmity, disturbed public tranquillity and included threats directed at Union Home



Minister Amit Shah. Sarkar also submitted links to several speeches as part of the complaint.

Police registered the FIR on May 15 at 2.45 pm at the Bidhannagar Cyber Crime Police Station. The case was filed under Sections 192, 196, 351(2) and 353(1)(c) of the

Bharatiya Nyaya Sanhita (BNS), along with Sections 123(2) and 125 of the Representation of the People Act. The FIR said that the speeches allegedly contained provocative, threatening and inflammatory content capable of creating public disorder and disturbing communal harmony. Police also alleged that the accused used aggressive language against opposition workers during public events. Sub-Inspector Somnath Singha Roy has been directed to take up the investigation.

Talking about the FIR, BJP leader and Minister of Panchayat and Rural Development, Dilip Ghosh, said, 'Mamata Banerjee, Abhishek Banerjee and their leaders have acted tyrannically. People did not complain at that time because of fear. However, they are now ready to complain, and the police are ready to act on it, so justice will be served.'

Made-in-India C295 aircraft to fly out soon; used by US to rescue pilots from Iran

The first India-made C295 is expected to be rolled out from Tata's Vadodara facility soon. The production of the aircraft marks a major shift in India's defence manufacturing ecosystem, breaking HAL's decades-long monopoly and signalling the rise of private-sector military aircraft production.

For decades, India's military aircraft manufacturing revolved around just one state-run giant, the Hindustan Aeronautics Limited (HAL). But that equation is beginning to change. The Airbus C295 military transport aircraft, now being assembled at Tata Advanced Systems Limited's (TASL) Final Assembly Line in Vadodara, is expected to be rolled out soon.

The rollout of the first of the 40 aircraft would mark a watershed moment in India's private aerospace sector. This is the first time a private Indian company has established and operationalised a full-scale military aircraft production line, ending the decades-long monopoly of state-owned HAL in this strategic sector.

Notably, the C295 is the same aircraft model that the US Air Force deployed in its combat search-and-rescue mission to extract pilots from Iran.

A video showing an Airbus C295 aircraft being pulled out of the hangar at Tata Advanced Systems' facility in Vadodara recently went viral



on social media. However, there has been no official confirmation from Tata Advanced Systems, Airbus, or the Indian government regarding the aircraft's operational readiness or exact rollout timeline.

However, External Affairs Minister S Jaishankar had stated in January 2026 that the first 'Made in India' C295 aircraft was expected to roll out before September this year. The recent viral video appears to show an early rollout, possibly indicating that the programme could have progressed ahead of the announced schedule.

On Friday, Deputy Chief of the Air Staff, Air Marshal AK Bharti, visited the C295 Final Assembly Line at TASL, where the first aircraft is preparing for its maiden flight. Under the Rs 21,935 crore contract signed in 2021, India is acquiring 56 C295s for the Indian Air Force (IAF) — the aircraft's largest fleet globally. While the initial 16 arrived in fly-away condition from Spain, the remaining 40 are being manufactured domestically, with over 85% of structural work and final assembly performed in India. This includes production of 13,000 detail parts and sub-assemblies.

Depressed over NEET exam cancellation, 22-year-old student dies by suicide in Sikar

Pradeep Meghwal, a NEET aspirant, had appeared for the May 3 exam which was cancelled after a paper leak. His family said that he was under severe mental stress post the cancellation.

A 22-year-old NEET aspirant allegedly died by suicide in Rajasthan's Sikar on Friday, days after the National Testing Agency (NTA) cancelled the May 3 NEET-UG 2026 examination over a paper leak. The incident came on the same day the government announced June 21 as the date for the re-examination, even as a CBI probe into the leak continues. The student's family has linked his death to distress caused by the cancellation of the exam in which they said he was expected to score well.

The victim was identified as Pradeep Meghwal, a resident of Rajasthan's Jhunjhunu district. Police said he had been living in a rented room in Sikar's Jaldhari Nagar area along with his sisters



and had been preparing for NEET for the past three years. According to Udyog Nagar SHO Rajesh Kumar, Pradeep allegedly hanged himself from a ceiling fan using a scarf

belonging to his sister.

"At the time of the incident, one sister had gone for coaching classes while another was in the bathroom.

His sister later found him hanging, brought him down, and informed the landlord and police," he said. "The body has been kept in the mortuary at SK Hospital. Postmortem has not yet been conducted".

Pradeep's father, Rajesh Kumar Meghwal, told police that his son had performed well in the May 3 exam and was expected to score around 650 out of 720 marks. He said the family had been hopeful that Pradeep would secure admission to a medical college this year after years of preparation.

Head of criminals: RG Kar victim's mother slams Mamata Banerjee after cops' suspensions

After three officers were suspended in the RG Kar Medical College and Hospital case, Ratna Debnath renewed attacks on Mamata Banerjee as the family sought more arrests and the probe intensified.

Samajwadi Party (SP) president Akhilesh Yadav demanded on Saturday that elections in India be held through ballot papers and appealed forms government," he added.

The mother of the RG Kar Medical College rape and murder victim, now BJP MLA Ratna Debnath, launched a blistering attack on former West Bengal chief minister Mamata Banerjee after the new state government suspended three senior police officers over alleged mishandling of the case. Debnath, MLA from Panihati, said Banerjee

is the 'head of criminals' and claimed that if she is jailed, the truth behind the case and the identities of others involved would come out.

Speaking to reporters after the suspensions, Debnath alleged a larger conspiracy behind the crime and the subsequent investigation. "There are many criminals, and the head of them is Mamata Banerjee. If she is caught and jailed, then the names of all the criminals will come out," news agency ANI quoted her as saying.

"The people who had dinner with my



daughter that night have not been investigated yet. Only the principal is in jail," she added.

The remarks come a day after West Bengal Chief Minister Suwendu

Adhikari announced disciplinary action against former Kolkata Police Commissioner Vineet Kumar Goyal, former Deputy Commissioner of Police (North) Abhishek Gupta and Deputy Commissioner of Police (Central) Indira Mukherjee over alleged lapses in the investigation into the August 2024 rape and murder at RG Kar Medical College and Hospital.

The state government has also ordered departmental proceedings

against the officers.

Ratna Debnath also directly accused the Trinamool Congress president and senior health officials of being responsible for the incident.

"College authorities, including Mamata Banerjee, are responsible for this incident. Also, our then Health Secretary Narayanswaroop Nigam is also involved in the murder of my daughter," she alleged.

Her husband, Sekharranjan Debnath, echoed the accusations, alleging that the case was deliberately covered up from the beginning.

Man strangled after confronting neighbour over daughter's harassment in Faridabad

A 50-year-old man was allegedly murdered by his neighbour in Faridabad on Thursday after he objected to the harassment of his daughter. The accused allegedly strangled the victim and dumped the body in a forest area, police said, adding that he has been arrested.

The victim, Mukesh Kumar, a native of Meerut in UP, lived with his family in a rented house in Faridabad's Thakur Mohalla area near Sarang Chowk and worked at a private company. According to the victim's family, the accused, Karan, lived nearby on rent and had allegedly been harassing Mukesh's daughter for a long time. They alleged that he would stop her on the way and harass her despite repeated objections from the family and other residents. Police said the situation escalated on Thursday when the accused allegedly created a disturbance outside the family's house. Mukesh and some neighbours tried to calm him down, but an argument broke out during which the accused allegedly abused and misbehaved with people before leaving the house. Police said Karan returned between 4pm and 5pm and allegedly called Mukesh outside on the pretext of settling the dispute through conversation. Mukesh left with him but did not return home. As the night progressed, family members began searching for him. Neighbours informed them that Mukesh was last seen with Karan. When confronted, the accused allegedly avoided answering questions, following which the family approached the police. During interrogation, the accused allegedly confessed to strangling Mukesh and dumping the body in a forest area, police said.

Acting on his statement, police recovered the body around 2am from a forest stretch between Nangla and Nekpur. "A murder case has been registered against the accused. He is being questioned and further investigation is underway," police spokesperson Yashpal Singh said.

Chief census officer warns of strict action against negligence in survey work

MCG commissioner and chief census officer Pradeep Dahiya on Friday warned against negligence in census duties, saying laxity and delays could lead to action against employees. During a review meeting at the MCG office, Dahiya went over the progress of field surveys, employee attendance and pace of the exercise. He instructed departments to register FIRs against employees found not adhering to deadlines and urged the field staff to conduct census duties with "full responsibility and seriousness." The official has sought regular progress reports to help formulate frameworks for more such projects in the future. Joint commissioners have been told to conduct regular inspections and visit sites to assess the status of the census operations, stressing that the inspections should focus on the quality of work, employee attendance and communication with residents. Recently, MCG recommended filing FIRs against 13 employees under Section 11 of the Census Act, 1948, for performing their duties negligently and remaining absent from training programmes.

Under provisions of this act, if any person refuses to conduct census duties or obstructs govt work, punitive action can be taken against them. If found guilty, the concerned person may also be sentenced to imprisonment extendable up to 3 years.

Fire guts record room at Faridabad govt school, files destroyed

A fire broke out in the record room of a govt school in Faridabad on Thursday, destroying several documents and damaging furniture and equipment stored inside.

The incident took place at Govt Model Sanskriti Senior Secondary School in Nangla Gujran area. Fire department officials said smoke was noticed coming from the record room during school hours, following which they were alerted.

Firefighters reached the spot and controlled the blaze before it could spread to classrooms and other parts of the building. No injuries were reported.

School authorities said old admission records, students' transfer certificates, attendance registers, examination-related files, salary records, service books and other administrative documents were destroyed in the fire. Chairs, tables, cupboards and electronic items kept in the room were also damaged. Officials said preliminary investigation suggests the fire may have been caused by a short circuit, though the exact cause is yet to be confirmed. "Most of the material stored in the room consisted of paper files, due to which the fire spread rapidly," an official said.

Officials from the education department visited the school to assess the extent of the damage and verify whether backup copies of the records were available. Staff members were seen sorting through partially burnt files and documents after the fire was brought under control. The incident has raised concerns over fire safety arrangements and the storage of records in govt schools. Residents said schools should conduct regular inspections of electrical wiring and ensure proper fire safety systems are in place. "Important documents should be digitised and stored safely so that such losses can be prevented in future," a resident said.

'Operation Lagam': Haryana Police targets social media hooliganism, road rowdies

Palwal Police on Friday launched a crackdown on gangster-style social media content and reckless road behaviour under a district-wide campaign titled "Operation Lagam - Na Reel Mein Gundagardi, Na Road Par Manmani", registering FIRs in six cases, counselling dozens of social media users and taking action against more than 8,000 traffic violators in the past 40 days. According to DSP Traffic Manoj Verma, the campaign has been launched under the direction of SP Nitish Agarwal to curb hooliganism on roads, online glorification of violence and improve road safety across the district.

In a major push against road indiscipline, Palwal Police has constituted five special teams, including SWAT units, to crack down on stunt driving, rash behaviour and traffic violations. Police said stringent action is also being taken at police station and police post

levels. Data shared by the district police revealed that action has been taken against 8,050 violators for offences including drunk driving, illegal red-blue lights, black films, pressure horns, modified "bullet pataka" silencers and driving without number plates.

The violations included 872 cases of drink-and-drive, 2,238 challans for black films, 27 cases involving illegal red-blue lights, 209 modified silencers, 2,469 vehicles without number plates, 2,021 without prescribed pattern number plates and 214 pressure horn violations. The campaign has also intensified its focus on social media platforms where videos promoting gangster culture, weapon display and intimidation tactics are being circulated. Police said a dedicated Social Media Monitoring Cell has been



constituted for 24x7 surveillance of objectionable online content. So far, FIRs have been registered in six cases related to promotion of gangster culture and weapon flashing on social media. Around 38 social media users were

counselled, while nearly 1,000 objectionable reels and posts were deleted. Officials said several users voluntarily removed such videos during counselling sessions after being warned about legal consequences and the negative influence such content could have on youngsters. SP Nitish Agarwal issued a stern warning, saying Palwal Police would not tolerate any attempt to spread fear or glorify violence through social media or public behaviour. "Any person displaying weapons, showing firing scenes or spreading fear on Instagram, Facebook or any other platform will not be spared. Operation Lagam will continue relentlessly," he said.

Breaking point: City will need Rs 3,500 crore to keep pace with its growth

Gurgaon.(Agency)

The city's breakneck growth is now colliding with the limits of its civic backbone. As new housing clusters rise, vehicle numbers swell and denser construction reshapes neighbourhoods, officials have estimated that the city will need nearly Rs 3,499 crore over the next five years to build infrastructure capable of supporting its expanding population. The pressure is already visible — from waterlogged roads in the monsoon and overflowing garbage to traffic snarls, parking chaos, sewer overflows and erratic water supply in several colonies.

The estimate, shared by officials in the department of town and country planning (DTCP), lays bare the scale of the challenge. Of the projected requirement, Rs 1,083 crore is expected to go towards strengthening the master sewerage network, nearly Rs 374 crore towards expanding and improving water supply, and Rs 2,041 crore towards road infrastructure and traffic management.

The city's civic capacity has come under renewed scrutiny after the govt's still-

plus-four policy was challenged in high court. Officials said vertical growth and four-floor housing, especially in licensed colonies and residential sectors, have sharply increased population density in



areas where infrastructure was originally designed for far fewer residents.

"The demand for infrastructure upgrades has risen significantly in many parts of the city. Road widening, sewer augmentation and traffic management projects are being planned with future growth in mind," a

DTCP official said. The strain is most acute in fast-growing belts such as Southern Peripheral Road, Golf Course Extension Road and sectors 58 to 115, where residential development has accelerated. Officials said these areas will need substantial support through new sewer lines, upgraded water systems and road reconstruction. "These sectors have been seeing rapid residential growth. Infrastructure planning is being aligned with projected demand," the official said. Several such projects are already underway, including flyovers, underpasses, junction redesign, internal road widening and other measures to ease congestion on key corridors. DTCP officials said GMDA has spent more than Rs 493 crore on road strengthening and traffic management works since 2021-22, while projects worth nearly Rs 175 crore are proposed in the next phase. Even so, residents across several colonies continue to flag worsening congestion, inadequate parking, sewer overflow and irregular water supply during peak demand.

House listing starts in only 72% of Gurgaon census blocks

Noida.(Agency)

Fifteen days into the census exercise, house-listing work has started in only 3,427 of Gurgaon's 4,756 blocks, with officials attributing the slow progress largely to lack of cooperation from residents in several areas. The house-listing phase of the census is scheduled to conclude on May 30. Officials said the administration is closely monitoring progress and has set up a control room to assist enumerators facing difficulties during field visits. Enumerators, particularly in upscale localities, have reported challenges in conducting surveys and collecting information.

Deputy commissioner Uttam Singh said the census exercise is being carried out "with full responsibility and in an organised

manner".

"All charge officers are regularly visiting the field to inspect house-listing work. Officers are interacting with enumerators in various areas to review survey progress and issue necessary directions," he said. He added that both the pace and quality of the exercise are being continuously reviewed to ensure timely completion. The DC also appealed to RWAs and residents to cooperate with enumerators and provide accurate information, stressing that the census plays a key role in national planning and development.

According to the latest progress report, work has commenced in 73% of areas in MCG Gurgaon zone 1, 48% in zone 2, 58% in zone 3, and 75% in zone 4. In Manesar Municipal Corporation, work

has begun in 87% of areas.

Among other regions, Sohna tehsil has recorded 94% coverage, while Sohna MCI stands at 77%. Pataudi tehsil and Pataudi Mandi MCI have each reached 99%, while Manesar tehsil has also achieved 99% coverage. Wazirabad tehsil is currently leading, with work initiated across all areas. Farrukhnagar tehsil has recorded 91% coverage and Farrukhnagar MC 96%. Officials said several regions are nearing full coverage and efforts are being intensified in the remaining blocks to complete the exercise swiftly.

The DC has directed enumerators to immediately begin work in areas where the exercise has not yet started and warned that negligence at any level would invite action as per rules.

Act against builders on groundwater misuse, CGWA tells UP

Central Groundwater Authority has asked UP groundwater department to act against alleged over-extraction and wastage of groundwater by real estate developers in Noida, following a complaint by an environmental activist.

In a letter to the state department, CGWA administrator VK Dhaundiyal said groundwater development and management in UP was being regulated by the state and requested its intervention, asking it to report back on action taken. The letter was accompanied by the complaints received by the authority.

Environmental activist Vikrant Tongad had filed a complaint with the CGWA, the UP govt, and Noida Authority, flagging rampant groundwater extraction at construction sites in sectors 145 and 153. He said water being pumped out during basement excavation was being discharged into sewage pipelines and drains, accelerating the decline of the local water table.

"We have been receiving regular complaints from local villagers, social activists, and nearby residents about hundreds of pumps deployed at construction sites running round the clock. Despite complaints, no effective



action has been taken by Noida Authority or the groundwater department," Tongad's complaint stated.

Earlier this week, the state groundwater department had separately directed the Gautam Buddha Nagar district magistrate to act against groundwater wastage in Greater Noida.

While acknowledging that de-watering was necessary for basement construction, Tongad told TOI that builders should restrict excavation depth once water aquifers are reached rather than continuing to pump out and drain the water. He also noted that the National Green Tribunal has prohibited the use of

groundwater in construction projects, requiring builders to use treated water from sewage treatment plants instead.

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Gang of fake police officers busted, 2 held

New Delhi: The Delhi Police claimed to have busted a gang of fake police officers and recovered Rs 33.50 lakh in cash from their possession. Two persons have been arrested and a juvenile has been apprehended, officials said on Monday. The accused allegedly posed as police officials, intercepted a person and fled with a bag containing cash after threatening and deceiving him. The incident came to light on Saturday when complainant Savaram, a resident of Sirohi district in Rajasthan, approached the Mangolpuri police station. The complainant stated that he had come to Pitampura along with his friend with cash handed over by his employer. When they got down from an auto near the Vardhman Plaza bus stand and started walking towards Tarun Enclave, two men claiming to be police officers stopped them. The police said the accused allegedly interrogated the complainant, took away his bag containing cash. They told him to wait as "senior officers" were also arriving there, before fleeing on a motorcycle with the money. The complainant managed to note down some numerals of the motorcycle registration number. Initially, the complainant informed the police that the bag contained Rs 9 lakh. During further questioning, he stated that he concealed the figure earlier out of fear and the bag actual-

ly contained Rs 50 lakh. His supplementary statement was later recorded. Following the complaint, the police registered a case under Sections 204, 319(2), 318(4) and 3(5) of the Bharatiya Nyaya Sanhita (BNS) at the Mangolpuri police station and launched an investigation. Based on inputs from informers, the

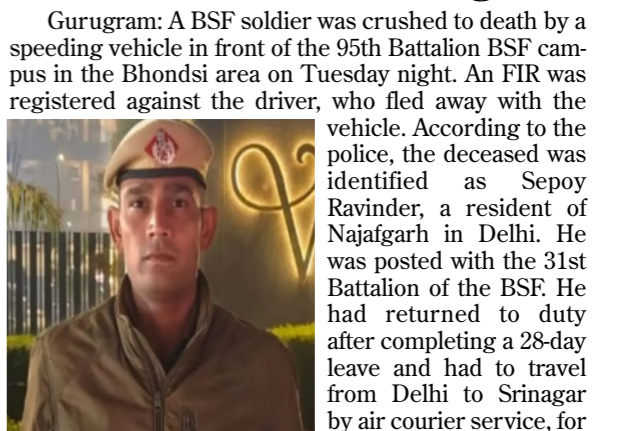

Faridabad man kills 6-yr-old son, dies by suicide

Faridabad: A father allegedly strangled his six-year-old son to death, tied the boy's body to his chest and then hanged himself in Dayalpur village, Faridabad. The police said preliminary investigations pointed to the father's gambling and alcohol addiction, compounded by financial difficulties. The deceased were identified as Sagar, 32 and his son Lakshit, 6, both residents of Dayalpur village. Sagar, a gambling and alcohol addict, lived alone in the family home after his wife moved to neighbouring Machhagar village with Lakshit and her in-laws. On Sunday, Sagar went to Machhagar and brought Lakshit back to Dayalpur. That night, he strangled the boy to death, tied the body to his chest and hanged himself from a ceiling fan. A neighbour discovered the bodies. "On Sunday, Sagar brought Lakshit back to the village at 12.00 pm. Around 3.00 pm, I could hear Lakshit playing and jumping, but then the sounds stopped," the neighbour said. Police took custody of the bodies and sent them for post-mortem examination. A senior officer said Sagar appeared to have taken the extreme step due to loneliness and financial difficulties, though the matter remains under investigation.

Speeding vehicle crushes BSF soldier to death in Gurugram



Gurugram: A BSF soldier was crushed to death by a speeding vehicle in front of the 95th Battalion BSF campus in the Bhandosi area on Tuesday night. An FIR was registered against the driver, who fled away with the vehicle. According to the police, the deceased was identified as Sepoy Ravinder, a resident of Najafgarh in Delhi. He was posted with the 31st Battalion of the BSF. He had returned to duty after completing a 28-day leave and had to travel from Delhi to Srinagar by air courier service, for which he reported to the 95th Battalion's transit camp on May 11. At around 10:40 pm, he was crossing the Sohna-Gurugram road just 200 metres from Gate No 1 of the campus, when an unknown vehicle struck him. He suffered serious head and chest injuries. A civilian alerted the sentry posted at the gate about the accident. The battalion's Quick Reaction Team, Adjutant, and medical staff immediately arrived with an ambulance. Police from Bhandosi police station also arrived at the scene. The soldier was immediately taken to the Civil Hospital in Sector 10, where doctors declared him brought dead. The medical report stated fatal injuries to the head and chest. Following the complaint by the commandant office, an FIR was registered against the unknown vehicle driver at Bhandosi police station. "We are searching for the unidentified vehicle and its driver based on a CCTV footage and other evidence from the area. The accused driver will be arrested soon," said a senior police officer.

Man arrested for abducting, assaulting Excise official

Mob attacks Ghamroj toll plaza, six injured

Gurugram: A minor dispute at the Ghamroj toll plaza near Sohna escalated into violence on Tuesday morning when more than 10 youths vandalised the toll office and assaulted employees. Six toll workers were injured in the attack. The police registered an FIR against the accused at Bhandosi police station. The injured workers were first taken to Sohna Civil Hospital and later



referred to Gurugram after receiving first aid. CCTV cameras installed at the toll plaza captured the incident. According to the police, the incident took place around 11 am when a man from Sohna was travelling to Gurugram by car. A dispute reportedly broke out with a security guard over parking while he was trying to obtain a monthly toll pass. The police said the man later informed his relatives, following which a group attacked the toll plaza. Half a dozen toll workers suffered serious injuries in the clash, while the attackers also vandalised the toll office. CCTV footage reportedly showed the accused carrying sticks, damaging the office and assaulting toll workers. "Following the complaint of an injured toll worker, an FIR has been registered under relevant sections against unknown accused. We are investigating the matter and trying to identify the accused with the help of CCTV footage. The accused will be arrested soon," said Inspector Surender Singh, SHO of Bhandosi police station.

Rapido rider, passenger die in Gurugram road mishap

Gurugram: The police said the deceased were identified as Rohit Kumar Gupta (29), a resident of Lucknow, and Jaipal (24), a native of Auraiya in Uttar Pradesh. Rohit worked as a tenant in Shanti Vihar, Sector 95, and worked at a Delhi-based private company. Rohit had booked a Rapido bike to travel to his office on Tuesday morning. He was traveling from Sector 95 to Delhi with bike rider Jaipal. When they crossed the Sati Chowk, a truck coming from behind hit their bike. They fell onto the road and suffered serious injuries. Passersby rushed them to a private hospital in Sector 90, where Rohit and later Jaipal succumbed to their injuries. Rohit's father Vinod Kumar Gupta reached Gurugram from Lucknow on Tuesday and filed a complaint with the police, alleging negligence on part of the truck driver. The police handed over the bodies to the family members after autopsy. "A case was registered against the unidentified truck driver at the Kherki Daula police station.

Constable Naveen Kumar got a tip-off regarding the movement of the accused from Dhaula Kuan towards Khatu Shyam. Acting on the input, the police laid a trap near the Dhaula Kuan bus stand and arrested the accused around 10:30 am, said Deputy Commissioner of Police (Crime Branch) Aditya Gautam. During investigation, the police found that Sahab Singh played an active role in assaulting and abducting the complainant, along with his associates. The victim was allegedly taken to a liquor warehouse in Bahalgarh where the assault continued, Gautam mentioned. The police further stated that Sahab Singh is a habitual offender with involvement in five criminal cases registered in Delhi and Haryana. His criminal record reportedly includes cases related to human trafficking, rape, kidnapping, assault, and excise violations. The accused was produced before a court which sent him to judicial custody, the DCP said.

Education Department issues show-cause notice to Janakpuri school

New Delhi: The Directorate of Education (DoE), Delhi Government, has issued a show-cause notice to SS Mota Singh Senior Secondary Model School, Janakpuri, after allegations that a nursery student was allegedly molested within the school premises during the school hours. The notice, issued by the Deputy Director of Education (District West-B), described the matter as a serious failure on part of the school administration to ensure the safety and security of children.

measures for students were not in place. Calling the matter serious, the department said the school's conduct amount-



care." The Education Department also observed alleged deficiencies in surveillance and monitoring mechanisms, including the absence of CCTV cameras at critical locations. The notice further stated that adequate safety and preventive

ed to "gross negligence and dereliction of duty, endangering the physical and psychological safety of students." In another observation, the department alleged that nursery and pre-primary classes were being run from a separate private premises located nearly one km from the main recognised campus without approval

from the competent authorities. It said students were allegedly shifted there without permission, raising concerns regarding safety, legality and compliance with education norms. The department stated that such actions may amount to "unauthorised use of unapproved premises," violation of DDA lease conditions, non-compliance with fire safety norms and "running educational activities from unrecognised premises." It also referred to earlier complaints regarding the school's administration, finances and functioning that allegedly remained unresolved. Seeking a response from the school management, the Directorate of Education asked why action should not be initiated under Rule 24(4) of the DSEAR, including takeover of the school's

management. It has also sought an explanation on why recognition should not be withdrawn and why a recommendation should not be made to the Delhi Development Authority (DDA) for the cancellation of land allotment. The notice has directed the school to submit complete records related to the incident, including CCTV footage, child safety compliance records, FIR or police complaint details, staff duty information, fire and building safety certificates and documents related to permission for operating classes outside the main campus.

"Thought He Could Hide": Trump Says Top ISIS Leader Abu-Bilal Killed

WASHINGTON. (Agency)

US President Donald Trump said Friday that American and Nigerian forces had killed a senior Islamic State group leader. "Tonight, at my direction, brave American forces and the Armed Forces of Nigeria flawlessly executed a meticulously planned and very complex mission to eliminate the most active terrorist in the world from the battlefield," Trump said on Truth Social. "Abu-Bilal al-Minuki, second in command of ISIS globally, thought he could hide in Africa, but little did he know we had sources who kept us informed on what he was doing," he added. Al-Minuki had been placed under US sanctions in 2023 for ties to the Islamic State group. "He will no longer terrorize the people of Africa, or help plan operations to target Americans," Trump said. "With his removal, ISIS's global operation is greatly diminished."

Boeing Confirms China Is Buying 200 Planes

Aerospace giant Boeing on Friday confirmed that China had committed to purchasing 200 aircraft, as previously announced by US President Donald Trump during his visit to Beijing. "We had a very successful trip to China and accomplished our major goal of reopening the China market to orders for Boeing aircraft," the company, whose CEO Kelly Ortberg was part of the US delegation to China, said in a statement. "This included an initial commitment for 200 aircraft and we expect further commitments will follow after this initial tranche," Boeing said, thanking the Trump administration "for making this milestone happen." "We now look forward to continually addressing China's aircraft demand," it said. China's last order from Boeing dates back to 2017, when Trump went to Beijing at the start of his first White House term. At that time, it ordered 300 single-aisle and wide-body planes -- a mega-deal valued at \$37 billion.

On Thursday, Trump had referred to the new Boeing commitment, telling Fox News host Sean Hannity in an interview: "I think it was a commitment."

"That's a lot of jobs," the president added.

Speaking to reporters aboard Air Force One as he flew home from China, Trump said the deal included "a promise of 750 planes, which will be by far the largest order ever, if they do a good job with the 200." US media have reported for several months that Beijing was poised to make a major order from Boeing that would include 500 single-aisle 737 MAXs and about 100 larger 787 Dreamliners and 777s.

Lil Tjay sparks backlash after exposing private messages linked to Kai Cenat's ex-girlfriend

The latest online drama involving Lil Tjay and Kai Cenat has once again blurred the line between entertainment and personal privacy. What began as subtle tension between two internet personalities quickly exploded after Lil Tjay briefly posted screenshots of private messages connected to Cenat's former girlfriend, Gigi Alayah.

Although the posts disappeared within hours, the internet had already captured everything. Screenshots spread rapidly across X and Instagram, sparking fierce arguments among fans over whether the rapper crossed a line or simply added another chapter to an already public feud.

Lil Tjay sparks backlash after sharing Kai Cenat-related messages

The controversy began after Lil Tjay uploaded screenshots of direct messages allegedly involving Gigi Alayah. Some of the conversations reportedly dated back several years, while one message from May 12 read, "Don't just open my shit crazy."

The deleted uploads instantly triggered heavy criticism online. Many fans accused the rapper of unnecessarily dragging private conversations into public view, especially since Kai Cenat had recently stepped away from livestreaming following news of his breakup. Social media reactions became sharply divided. Some users called the move immature and attention-seeking, while others defended Lil Tjay's right to share interactions tied to ongoing public tension. The situation intensified because the rapper and Cenat have exchanged indirect shots before. Even though neither side publicly escalated the issue immediately afterward, online communities quickly turned the incident into another major celebrity internet debate. At the same time, observers pointed out that Lil Tjay has remained surrounded by controversy throughout recent months. Alongside releasing new music and making talk-show appearances, the rapper has also been linked to public disputes involving other artists, including Real Boston Richey. Kai Cenat remains silent as Lil Tjay controversy fuels speculation while Lil Tjay briefly controlled the online conversation, Kai Cenat chose not to respond publicly.

Israel, Lebanon say extending ceasefire despite new strikes

WASHINGTON. (Agency)

Israel and Lebanon agreed to extend a ceasefire and hold expanded talks on a political settlement, the United States announced Friday, even as Israel carried out new strikes that it insists are not subject to the truce. Israel has been pounding Lebanon and invaded its south in response to fire from Hezbollah, the Iranian-backed Shia movement that is not part of the ceasefire diplomacy. Envoys from Israel and Lebanon's government, which has struggled to restrain Hezbollah, met for two days in Washington and said they would extend the ceasefire that was set to expire Sunday. The cessation of hostilities "will be extended by 45 days to enable further progress," State Department spokesman Tommy Pigott said.

He said that the State Department would hold negotiations aimed at reaching a permanent political agreement on June 2 and 3 and that the Pentagon would bring together delegations from the countries' militaries on May 29. Lebanon's delegation said in a

statement that the ceasefire extension and opening of military talks would offer "critical breathing room for our citizens" with a goal of "lasting stability." In an implicit rebuke to Hezbollah, Lebanese Prime Minister Nawaf Salam told an NGO dinner in Beirut that his country has had "enough of these reckless adventures serving foreign projects or interests."

The latest brought "a war we did not choose but was forced upon us, which led to Israel occupying 68 towns and villages," he said.

The United States steadfastly backs Israel, with which it launched attacks on Iran on February 28, but has also gently voiced unease about Israeli troops' encroachments into southern Lebanon. Israel's ambassador to Washington, Yechiel Leiter, who led his country's delegation, said after the talks that the priority was ensuring Israel's security. "There will be ups and downs, but the potential for success is great," Leiter wrote on X. Iran's clerical state, Hezbollah's

patron, has demanded a lasting ceasefire in Lebanon before any peace agreement with US President Donald Trump, who has been frustrated by Tehran's refusal to an accord on his terms.

Truce met with violence



Hundreds of people have died in Israeli strikes despite the truce announced on April 17. Moments after the ceasefire renewal was announced, an Israeli strike hit a center of the Hezbollah-linked Islamic Health Committee in the southern town of Hanuf, authorities said. Six people died,

including three paramedics, according to the Lebanese health ministry. Israel also carried out strikes in the southern city of Tyre after issuing evacuation orders, and Hezbollah said it targeted Israeli barracks in the northern city of Kiryat Shmona with drones. Lebanon's health ministry said strikes in the Tyre district also wounded at least 37 people, including six hospital personnel, nine women and four children.

Hafez Ramadan, a resident near the building targeted by the airstrike, said it had housed people who had fled their towns due to the war and was adjacent to a hotel where more displaced were staying. "There are only women, children and the elderly here," he said.

"Because of this strike, people have been displaced again." The Israeli military said another of its soldiers was killed in southern Lebanon, bringing the number of Israeli soldiers killed in clashes with Hezbollah since early March to 19. A civilian contractor was also killed.

Four killed, one injured in two bridge collapse incidents in Pakistan's Sindh

Four people were killed and one was injured in two separate bridge collapse incidents in Pakistan's Sindh province on Friday, according to ARY News.

In one of the incidents, a section of the under-construction Ghotki-Kandhot Bridge collapsed after a heavy portion of the structure gave way and fell, ARY News reported, citing local sources. The incident triggered concern among residents, who questioned the quality of construction material used in the project and raised allegations of possible corruption.

Meanwhile, in another incident, four labourers were killed while one was left injured in Sindh's Karampur when a section of the dilapidated old bridge over Naseer canal collapsed, as per ARY News. As per locals, the construction work on the new bridge was underway when the old bridge collapsed and delay in rescue operations was also reported after emergency teams failed to reach the incident spot for several hours after

the incident. The rescue teams confirmed recovery of four bodies from rubble of the bridge; meanwhile, the other labourer was admitted to the hospital for treatment. Apart from the bridge collapse incident, Karachi is



also grappling with a worsening infrastructure crisis, with severely damaged roads across the city exposing what residents describe as years of official neglect and administrative failure. The arrival of

sacrificial animals has already begun in several areas, but the city's crumbling road network is struggling to cope even before Eid-related activity reaches its peak, as reported by The Express Tribune.

According to The Express Tribune, instead of smooth roads supporting the transportation of livestock and easing public movement during the festive season, Karachi's streets are riddled with potholes, broken asphalt and incomplete excavation sites.

Citizens fear the situation will spiral further once temporary cattle markets expand, animal movement increases, and post-slaughter waste starts accumulating on already damaged roads. Residents across multiple districts say the city's infrastructure has worsened to an alarming level.

Major roads and inner streets in North Karachi, North Nazimabad, Nazimabad, Liaquatabad, Gulberg and the Federal B Area have become nearly impassable due to long-neglected maintenance and repeated digging by utility agencies.

ISIS second in command Abu-Bilal al-Minuki killed by US forces in Nigeria, says Trump

BEIJING. (Agency)

US President Donald Trump announced on Friday (local time) that American forces, along with the Nigerian armed forces, had eliminated Abu-Bilal al-Minuki, the second-in-command of ISIS globally, in Nigeria. In his Truth Social post, Trump wrote, "Tonight, at my direction, brave American forces and the Armed Forces of Nigeria flawlessly executed a meticulously planned and very complex mission to eliminate the most active terrorist in the world from the battlefield. Abu-Bilal al-Minuki, second in command of ISIS globally, thought he could hide in Africa, but little did he know we had sources who kept us informed on what he was doing." Trump welcomed the killing of Al-Minuki, stating that he

would "no longer terrorize the people of Africa, or help plan operations to target Americans."

Trump further added, "He will no longer



terrorize the people of Africa, or help plan operations to target Americans. With his removal, ISIS's global operation is greatly diminished. Thank you to the Government of Nigeria for

your partnership on this operation. GOD BLESS AMERICA!" Who was ISIS No. 2 Abu-Bilal al-Minuki?

Abu-Bilal al-Minuki was an alleged senior ISIS operative who reportedly served as the terror group's global second-in-command. He was also said to be known by the name Abu Bakr ibn Muhammad ibn Ali al-Mainuki. According to a report by the Counter Extremism Project, Al-Mainuki primarily operated in Africa's Sahel region, which stretches across 12 countries. The Sahel is a semi-arid transitional belt extending nearly 5,900 kilometres from the Atlantic Ocean to the Red Sea, separating the Sahara Desert in the north from the Sudanian savannas in the south.

Trump-Xi talks dominated by Taiwan, Iran; China pitches 'strategic stability' framework

For three days in China, President Donald Trump was unusually quiet, not speaking to reporters much and even mostly staying off social media. Then he got on his plane home and unloaded. Trump's trip was unexpectedly dominated by discussions about Taiwan and the notion that Washington and Beijing could adopt a new framework for managing their complicated relationship. Chinese President Xi Jinping kicked off the whirlwind visit with a warning: If Washington mishandles its relations with the self-governing island of Taiwan, the U.S. and China could end up clashing or even in open conflict.

Trump did not respond publicly, refraining from mentioning Taiwan while in Beijing. But he suggested aboard Air Force One on his way home that Xi's staunch opposition might make him rethink a planned U.S. arms sale to Taipei. Among the other topics of discussion were trade and the U.S. and Israel's war in Iran, which had been expected to take up most of the attention.

Trump spent the trip overtly flattering China's leader, despite Xi not reciprocating. And the president did not push back publicly on China's characterization that he and Xi had agreed to a "constructive" new vision for dealing with their relationship issues. Trump held his tongue on Taiwan — until he was headed home. Before the trip, Trump demonstrated greater ambivalence toward Taiwan in his second term, raising questions about whether he might be open to dialing back support for the island democracy that Beijing views as its breakaway province. Secretary of State Marco Rubio insisted there was no change in the U.S. approach to Taiwan. But there was always a risk that Trump — not known for diplomatic nuance — might make an off-the-cuff

remark that could have mammoth ramifications for Taiwan. In the end, Trump said nothing publicly about Taiwan, even as his Chinese counterpart suggested the island was the most important aspect of



U.S.-China relations. But then, pressed by reporters after leaving China, Trump said he had not yet made a decision on whether to carry through with a major arms package

sale he previously approved for Taiwan after hearing Xi's objections.

Trump's Republican administration in December authorized an \$11 billion weapons package for Taipei, but it has yet to move forward. Lawmakers also approved a \$14 billion arms sale to Taiwan in January, but the sale cannot advance until Trump formally sends it to Congress.

"President Xi and I talked a lot about Taiwan," Trump told reporters on the presidential plane. He said China's leader "does not want to see a fight for independence because that would be a very strong confrontation."

"I heard him out," Trump said. But "I didn't make a comment." Trump appeared to struggle to recall the name of Taiwanese President Lai Ching-te and noted of Washington's policy toward the island, "The last thing we need right now is a war that's 9,500 miles away."

Protest erupts after police stop namaz on road in Kolkata locality

Kolkata. (Agency)

Tension prevailed in Kolkata's Rajabazar area on Friday when a group tried to offer namaz on the road despite a recent ban by the new Suwendu Adhikari-led government on such activities at public places.

The situation spiralled out of control when police personnel arrived to vacate the road and there was resistance. The protesters argued that this was a tradition, whereas the administration insisted that keeping public thoroughfares clear was mandatory for maintaining law and order.

The road was later cleared and traffic movement resumed. Officials said the situation in the locality is currently under control. The administration deployed a large number of police and Central Reserve Police Force (CRPF) personnel in the area. Police officers said individuals attempting to disturb law and order were being identified and legal action would be taken against them.

However, police are yet to give an official statement on the incident. During the previous Mamata Banerjee government, namaz and other religious activities on the streets were allowed, but the new government has taken a tough stance against the inconvenience they caused to the public. According to BJP sources, the CM had given clear instructions in the Cabinet meeting that namaz should be offered only inside mosques and no such activity will be tolerated on the road.

Set up libraries, reading rooms in each block:

Bhubaneswar MP Aparajita to BDOs

Bhubaneswar. (Agency)

Bhubaneswar MP Aparajita Sarangi on Friday directed all block development officers (BDOs) to establish libraries and reading rooms in blocks and ensure their regular functioning. Stating that libraries should support youth preparing for competitive examinations, she also instructed officials to develop at least five model water bodies in every block under the Amrit Sarovar scheme through combined MP and MLA funds. The ponds are to include seating arrangements, lighting and plantation facilities.

Reviewing 101 central government schemes across 37 departments at the District Development Coordination and Monitoring Committee (DISHA) meeting of Khurda, Sarangi stressed coordinated functioning between public representatives and the administration for effective implementation of welfare schemes with transparency and public service.

During the review, officials informed that under the Pradhan Mantri Gram Sadak Yojana, 27 projects worth Rs 71 crore were proposed for tender during 2025-26. The MP also reviewed bypass works at Tapang and Nirakarapur on the Howrah-Chennai railway line and directed authorities to minimise land acquisition. She also directed officials to expedite all pending works including the Rs 8,306-crore Rameswar-Tangi road project.

Fire breaks out at IT firm godown in Chennai, doused after hours

CHENNAI. (Agency)

A massive fire broke out at a godown at the Tech Mahindra campus in Sholinganallur on Friday evening. No casualty was reported.

Sources said thick black smoke began billowing from the godown shortly after the fire broke out, followed by intense flames within seconds. Employees inside the campus were immediately evacuated after emergency alarm went off. Initial firefighting efforts used extinguishers available on the premises.

The Fire and Rescue Services personnel rushed to the spot from Tambaram, Thiruvanniyur, Thoraipakkam, Medavakkam and Guindy fire stations. Private firefighting vehicles from nearby companies were also deployed to assist in the operation.

The police said the godown housed discarded electrical items, including old air-conditioners and damaged electric vehicles, all of which were gutted in the blaze. Thick smoke from the warehouse spread across the locality, posing a major challenge for firefighters.

More than 50 firefighters engaged in operations for several hours to bring the blaze under control. Private water tankers were also brought to the spot to support the operation. The warehouse is located inside the Tamil Nadu Electronics Corporation (ELCOT) Special Economic Zone on Chennai's Old Mahabalipuram Road.

Chandigarh Police uses water cannons, tear gas to disperse farmers marching towards Punjab Lok Bhavan

Chandigarh. (Agency)

The Chandigarh Police on Friday used water cannons and fired tear gas shells near Burail Jail to stop a large number of protesting farmers marching towards Punjab Lok Bhavan after a massive gathering held at Nature Park in Mohali's Phase 8 under the banner of the Samyukt Kisan Morcha Punjab.

Police said the protesting farmers tried to break barricades and march towards the Lok Bhavan "without authorities' permission". However, tension prevailed in the area as police attempted to prevent the farmers from entering Chandigarh.

Police said the administration had earlier granted permission for only 32 representatives from farmers' unions to meet and submit a memorandum of their demands to the Punjab Governor and Chandigarh Administrator Gulab Chand Kataria. However, the administration did not permit the march involving a large number of farmers. Police said the Governor waited for

the representatives to meet as per the earlier schedule. Still, at the Chandigarh-Mohali borders, farmers were adamant about marching in large numbers to the Bhavan, with some even scuffling with the police.



Chandigarh's Senior Superintendent of Police Kanwardeep Kaur told reporters, "Farmers lacked permission for the march. We held a meeting with farmers' outfits recently, but they did not inform us about the march. Their programme was only to submit a memorandum to the Governor. The Governor also gave time to 32 representatives and

waited for them."

The SSP said police stopped the farmers when they marched and crossed barricades. "We only used minor force to stop them," she said. Police said they briefly detained some farmers who were later released. They claimed that four to five jawans sustained injuries in the police-farmers scuffle. A brief scuffle also broke out between protesters and security personnel during the confrontation. Eyewitnesses claimed that some tear gas shells landed inside a nearby housing society, triggering panic among residents. Several farmers reportedly sustained minor injuries during the police action, while many turbans were dislodged amid the chaos. Despite the crackdown, protesting farmers continued raising slogans against the Central Government and the Chandigarh administration. Earlier in the day, hundreds of farmers from across Punjab gathered at Nature Park to protest against issues related to Punjab's river waters, Punjab University Chandigarh, the Bhakra Beas.

In Dang village, Rs 25,000 fine if found drunk: Panchayat resolution to help residents kick alcohol habit

Ahmedabad. (Agency)

Gujarat's only total tribal-district, Dang, saw an entire village support a resolution to ban consumption and sale of any kind of liquor that also imposes heavy penalties, going as far as "ostracization" of involved families.

The gram panchayat of Garudiya village with a population of nearly 1,500 passed a resolution on Thursday banning the "sale of IMFL (Indian Made Foreign Liquor) or country-brewed liquor," which is already banned under the state's strict prohibition law. Garudiya is a village of Subir taluka and shares its border with Nandurbar district in Maharashtra, a wet state.

On Thursday, sarpanch K M Kamri convened a gram panchayat meeting and proposed banning the sale and consumption of liquor in the village. The proposal was approved by all panchayat members. A copy of the resolution was submitted to the Subir police



station. After the resolution passed, the village sarpanch convened a meeting of villagers and announced the details in it. The sarpanch has formed a five-member 'Dekh Rekha' (supervision) committee to monitor liquor-related activities in the village.

The resolution states: "The 'Dekh Rekha' committee, formed by the Gram Panchayat and headed by the village sarpanch, will ensure that no person in the village manufactures, sells, or consumes country-made liquor or IMFL. If anyone is found in a

drunken condition, a penalty of Rs 25,000 will be recovered from them and they will also be subject to a police case. No one from the village will support the accused in obtaining bail during the police procedure. If anybody from the village or outside gives a tip-off to the Dekh Rekha committee about the sale or consumption of IMFL/country-made liquor, they will be rewarded with Rs 10,000 recovered from the accused, and the remaining Rs 15,000 (from the penalty) will be deposited in the Gram Panchayat fund. The village's primary occupation is agriculture, but alcohol consumption is common among the people. The resolution also states, "If anybody enters the village in an inebriated state and is caught by the villagers or the committee, he/she will also have to pay a penalty of Rs 10,000. Apart from this, if anyone violates the resolution even after being caught once, their family will be barred from social contact and other religious functions in the village."

After fake birth certificate scandal, BMC turns to AI to secure civic records

Weeks after an internal probe exposed over 87,000 fake birth certificates issued by the Brihanmumbai Municipal Corporation (BMC), the civic body has rolled out an Artificial Intelligence-backed system to digitally preserve and retrieve key citizen records, beginning with E ward in Byculla.

The initiative, titled Vision AI Vault, comes amid heightened scrutiny of the BMC's birth registration system after the civic administration revealed that 87,347 fake birth certificates were issued between 2024 and 2026. Of these, 5,505 certificates were traced to E ward

alone.

Civic officials said the pilot project was launched following directions from Mumbai Municipal



Commissioner Ashwini Bhide to integrate AI-based mapping across the civic database.

The new system aims to digitise decades-old records — including

birth, death and marriage certificates — many of which have deteriorated due to Mumbai's humid weather and ageing storage conditions. Officials said records that earlier took nearly a month to retrieve could now be accessed within minutes.

Unlike conventional scanning systems, the AI-powered platform can reportedly read handwritten English, Marathi and Hindi documents, restore faded text and correct distortions caused by damaged paper and ink smudges, including in pre-Independence era records. Officials said users will be able to retrieve documents by entering a name, following which digitally signed certificates.

Thiruvananthapuram. (Agency)

Eight months after its inauguration, the Rs 10-crore modern abattoir at Kunukuzhy is finally set to commence full-scale operations, with the city corporation conducting the first trial run of the facility on Thursday.

The modernised slaughterhouse, expected to become fully operational next week, has the capacity to slaughter and process 50 to 75 animals in a single shift. Mayor V V Rajesh said the formal launch of operations would be held next week. He said that the civic body will put an end to all illegal slaughtering happening in the capital.

"We will launch a large-scale crackdown on illegal slaughtering across the capital. Our aim is to eliminate unauthorised slaughtering in the city. The abattoir will play a key role in curbing environmental pollution. At present, slaughter waste is being dumped into water bodies and public spaces, contributing to the stray dog menace," the mayor said.

He said the inauguration had to be rescheduled because of the swearing-in ceremony of the new chief minister on Monday. The abattoir is expected not only to ensure the availability of hygienic and safe meat to consumers but also to generate revenue for the corporation.

Corporation veterinary surgeon Dr Sreerag Jayan said processing around 100 animals a day could generate the civic body nearly Rs 2 lakh in monthly revenue.

Malerkotla low intensity blast under probe; 'due to potash dumped at garbage site': police

Ludhiana. (Agency)

A low-intensity blast occurred Friday evening near a garbage dumping site in Punjab's Malerkotla, leaving a buffalo severely injured and triggering a police investigation. The animal reportedly lost one of its legs in the explosion. The incident took place close to the residence of former Punjab DGP Mohammad Mustafa and his wife, former Cabinet Minister Razia Sultana. Officials said forensic teams from Bathinda have been called to examine the site and ascertain the exact cause of the blast.

Mohammed Hamza, a dairy farmer whose buffalo was injured in the explosion, said the incident occurred when the animal approached a pile of garbage near the dumping point. "My buffalo went near the

garbage and stepped over a polythene bag... The impact was so strong that the animal was thrown several feet into the air. I was standing nearby and was also knocked down."

He also said when he regained his senses, he found the buffalo critically injured, with one leg blown off and severe injuries to its stomach. "For some time, I could not hear anything. Soon, local residents gathered at the spot and offered me water."

Hamza said the injured buffalo was a milch animal and its condition had severely affected his livelihood. Senior Superintendent of Police (SSP) Malerkotla Gurmeet Singh said preliminary investigations indicate that the blast may have been caused by potash

material allegedly dumped at the site.

"Initial investigation suggests that the incident appears to have occurred due to



potash dumped in the garbage disposal area. The buffalo got injured after entering the site," the SSP told the media.

He also said police had learnt that some

families living nearby were engaged in work involving potash, which is commonly associated with firecracker manufacturing. "One local resident informed us that a similar blast-like sound had been heard from the same disposal area in May last year, after which garbage at the site had caught fire. The sequence of events appears similar, though all angles are being investigated."

The incident comes days after low-intensity blast incidents were reported in Jalandhar and Amritsar on May 5, which sparked a political controversy in Punjab. Punjab Chief Minister Bhagwant Mann had then alleged that the incidents reflected the BJP's "style of preparation" ahead of elections.

RWAs, community representatives in Hyderabad seek stronger residential security measures

Resident Welfare Associations (RWAs) and community representatives in Hyderabad have submitted a series of recommendations to the Secunderabad police to strengthen residential security and improve safeguards related to domestic workers and service personnel.

The associations proposed a standard registration system for domestic workers with secure uploading of details on a police portal, along with a clear data privacy framework. They also recommended mandatory police verification for long-term domestic workers, drivers, security guards and other household service providers.

Among the major suggestions were strict digital gate management systems in gated communities to maintain check-in and check-out records, verified databases of workers and vendors maintained by RWAs, and annual security audits in coordination with local police.

The representatives also stressed the need for CCTV surveillance only in common areas to protect privacy, regular awareness sessions for residents on safe hiring practices and cyber safety, and special emergency protocols for women and senior citizens.

Calling for a balanced approach, the RWAs sought a transparent grievance redressal mechanism for domestic workers to prevent exploitation, harassment and misunderstandings.

Community representatives said the proposed measures could improve residential safety while ensuring dignity and fairness for domestic workers, and assured full cooperation with police in implementing effective security mechanisms.

Heed warning bells sounded by sliding rupee

There are moments when a currency tells a story more honestly than official statements do. The Indian rupee is doing exactly that. It has lost more than 12 percent against the US dollar in 12 months and has been sliding relentlessly even though India's macroeconomic fundamentals are not in obvious crisis territory. Growth is still respectable. Inflation is not runaway. The current account deficit, at least in headline terms, is manageable. Forex reserves remain robust. This is not 1991. But that is precisely why the rupee's fall is worrying. If a currency weakens sharply despite decent growth and contained inflation, it is telling us that the problem lies elsewhere: in the balance of payments, capital flows, investor confidence, oil vulnerability and the structure of India's external dependence.

India's chief economic advisor has argued that the rupee's depreciation is not justified by fundamentals. He points to strong growth, moderate inflation, low external debt and a manageable current account deficit. He also argues that global capital has been sucked into the artificial intelligence investment boom and dollar assets, leaving otherwise sound emerging markets under pressure.

That is a fair point. Exchange rates often reflect capital flows more than textbook fundamentals. But saying that the rupee is mispriced is not enough. A mispriced currency can still bankrupt balance sheets, raise import costs, hurt confidence and trigger defensive behaviour. Markets may be irrational for a long time, but countries must still pay their import bills in real dollars. The real danger is that India's external account is no longer getting the capital cushion it once did. For decades, India has run a current account deficit, but financed it through capital inflows. That bargain is fraying. Net foreign direct investment has been falling for several years. Gross inflows may still look impressive, but repatriation and outbound FDI have reduced net FDI close to negligible levels. Besides, foreign portfolio investors have pulled out close to \$40 billion in the past two years. The outflow this year has been the worst in almost 15 years.

This is the heart of the matter. India's current account deficit may be below 2 percent of GDP, but the capital account is weak. The balance of payments will be sharply negative this year. When the BoP turns negative, either the rupee weakens or the RBI sells dollars to defend it. Both are now happening. The oil shock makes this worse. The CEA has called the West Asia crisis a live "balance of payments stress test", with direct consequences for inflation, the current account and the exchange rate. Almost half of India's crude imports transit through or near the Strait of Hormuz. That means an oil shock is not merely a petrol pump problem. It is a macroeconomic problem. When oil prices spike, three things happen at once. First, the import bill rises and the current account worsens. Second, inflation creeps up because fuel enters transport, fertilisers, plastics, food distribution and almost every other supply chain. Third, the fiscal deficit worsens if the government tries to shield consumers through LPG, fertiliser or petroleum subsidies. If pump prices are not raised, oil marketing companies take the hit. If they are raised, consumers suffer. If subsidies absorb the shock, taxpayers suffer. In reality, the three groups overlap: the taxpayer, the consumer and the shareholder are often the same Indian household wearing different hats. There is no choice but to raise pump prices. Many prominent voices are sounding this chorus. Else the fiscal deficit worsens adding to macro stress.

One year after Op Sindoor, India's new normal faces Pakistan's new abnormal — putting a fragile truce at risk

ON the anniversary of the 2025 summer skirmish with Pakistan, India can claim to have forged a credible new doctrine of counterterrorism and controlled escalation in a nuclear neighbourhood. The 88-hour conflict, triggered by the Pahalgam terror attack and carried out under Operation Sindoor, marked the culmination of a decade-long shift towards assured kinetic responses to cross-border terror and served as a stress test for the subcontinent's nuclear architecture.

The conflict followed a now-familiar script. As in 2016 and 2019, India retaliated after a terrorist attack in Kashmir that it attributed to Pakistani state-backed actors. What set Sindoor apart was the depth and precision of the response. Nine terrorist base camps were struck on May 7, 2025. Three days later, India hit eleven Pakistani airfields after suppressing Pakistani air defences. India's indigenous air-defence systems also proved highly effective against Pakistani drones and missiles. Over the past year, most global analysts reviewing satellite imagery and competing claims have concluded that the military advantage lay overwhelmingly with India — despite documented evidence of Chinese technical personnel operating Pakistani systems, a significant detail that drew too little international scrutiny.

India's diplomacy secured broad acceptance of its right to defend itself against terrorism. Where it fell short was in the information battle. Television and social media often amplified jingoistic claims unsupported by facts, while the government was slow to present credible evidence to a global audience against a propaganda state flooding the zone with half-truths. That gap is now being addressed.

India's five commandments

In July 2025, the Modi government codified its counterterror doctrine before Parliament in five explicit tenets: cross-border attacks will invite direct responses; terrorists and their state backers will be treated alike; talks and terror cannot go together, though talks about terror may still be possible; nuclear blackmail will not alter India's calculus; and blood and water will not flow together. The last tenet carries particular weight. India placed the 1960 Indus Waters Treaty 'in abeyance', even though it had survived two full-scale wars and multiple crises. For policymakers, it was the last major non-kinetic lever available to deter terror. Suspending such a consequential treaty signalled that India's tolerance for terrorism — whether sponsored from within or beyond its borders — had sharply diminished. In February 2026,

India unveiled Prahaar, the first comprehensive national counterterrorism doctrine, aimed at disrupting terror networks at home and abroad. The message was clear: the era of strategic restraint was formally over.

A ladder of consequences

In the longer view, Operation Sindoor was the third rung on an escalation ladder India had been building for a decade. As its military posture shifted towards progressively harder kinetic action against terrorist havens, its diplomatic posture hardened as well. After Uri in 2016, surgical strikes across the Line of Control were accompanied by a policy of no talks with terror. After Pulwama in 2019, the Balakot airstrikes were preceded by punitive tariffs on Pakistani imports, adding "no trade with terror". After Pahalgam in 2025, India



suspended the Indus Waters Treaty days before kinetic operations began, adding a third layer: no water for terror.

Each provocation has drawn a qualitatively higher response. India has built a visible cost architecture in which the price of future provocations is, in principle, known in advance. Whether that visibility deters or instead invites calibrated brinkmanship is now South Asia's central strategic question.

The end of Operation Sindoor deserves equal attention. India entered the operation with defined political objectives, demonstrated overwhelming capability and disengaged on its own terms — before exhaustion or external pressure forced an off-ramp. In the fifth year of the Ukraine conflict and the third year of horizontal escalation in West Asia, Vladimir Putin, Benjamin Netanyahu and Donald Trump would do well to study

the Sindoor playbook.

Pakistan's new abnormal

The sharpest escalation of the past year has been Asim Munir's rise. He entered the spring of 2025 as perhaps the most vulnerable Pakistani army chief in a generation — presiding over a contracting economy, the jailing of a former prime minister and deep public resentment. He emerged from Sindoor dramatically stronger. Promoted to Field Marshal in May 2025, appointed Chief of Defence Forces in December and granted lifelong legal immunity under the 27th Constitutional Amendment, he now wields a degree of formal personal power without recent precedent in Pakistan.

Yet this political rebirth rests on structural weakness: Pakistan's polycrisis of economic decline, security failures and political tension. Munir now accumulates roles — military supremo, chief economic planner, chief regional peacemaker — that in a functioning state would be distributed across accountable institutions. As Pakistan's chief diplomat charged with brokering a deal to resolve the Iran crisis, Munir's army claims he has skilfully made Pakistan relevant again to its three principal benefactors: the US, China and Saudi Arabia. On the anniversary of Operation Sindoor, he also cast himself as Pakistan's chief spokesman, again claiming victory against India and defining Pakistan's new posture as one of conventional strength, multi-domain operational capability and the ability to strike India 'in depth' with high-tech weaponry.

Unpeace equilibrium

There has been no Pahalgam-scale attack in the year since the May 10 ceasefire. That pause is real, but it should be read carefully. The incentives that reward controlled provocation from Pakistan remain intact. Munir's political survival depends on maintaining calibrated tension with India — enough to justify the army's primacy, but not enough yet to trigger another Sindoor.

South Asia has reached a new equilibrium: more stable on the surface, more dangerous underneath. Pakistan has a more powerful army chief, a temporarily suppressed terrorist infrastructure and a deepening fiscal hole. A hard state built on military dominance, without economic foundations or democratic legitimacy, is ultimately brittle. The danger of future conflict still lies within that weakness. What deserves debate now is a more creative approach to mitigating that risk and managing the next crisis, and a doctrine better suited to dealing with an abnormal neighbour.

Kerala breakthrough : Congress balances state & national interests

In choosing Satheesan, the party appears to have rewarded political performance over hierarchy

THE Congress seems to have got so used to losing elections that it struggles to be decisive after it actually wins. The remarkable victory in Kerala was the face-saver for the party in the recent Assembly elections. Yet, the Congress took no less than 10 days to appoint VD Satheesan as the chief minister. It's true that the high command was spoilt for choice — experienced leaders such as KC Venugopal and Ramesh Chennithala were also in contention for the top post — but the inordinate delay in naming the CM exposed the Congress' familiar struggle with internal consensus-building. In choosing Satheesan, the party appears to have rewarded political performance over hierarchy. Over the past five years, he emerged as one of Kerala's most prominent Opposition voices, consistently challenging the Left government on corruption and misgovernance. His sharp legislative interventions and energetic campaigning helped revitalise the



Congress-led United Democratic Front (UDF) after its 2021 defeat. More importantly, he succeeded in

projecting a younger and more assertive image of the party in the southern state. Venugopal, who is close to Rahul Gandhi, has "humbly accepted" the top brass' decision, which aims to balance the party's state and national interests. His continued organisational role at the central level is vital for the Congress in view of the 2027-28 Assembly elections and the 2029 Lok Sabha polls. The party will expect Venugopal and Chennithala to provide tangible support to Satheesan, who has his work cut out. The new government must address youth unemployment (which prevails despite a high literacy rate), rising debt, infrastructure concerns and social welfare expectations, while maintaining unity among UDF allies. The Congress should make the most of this opportunity to assert its southern dominance through good governance.

Is India becoming one big exam centre

Educating a child has to be India's goal, not testing whether she is capable of being educated.

This article is being penned as much in anguish as in hope. The anguish is nationwide and stems from the enormous distress and demoralisation that has affected a large segment of our youth whose hopes and expectations of success were dashed just a couple of days back when a "guess paper" linked to the NEET examination was leaked, and the exam subsequently cancelled. The torment that prospective examinees face is easy to understand but very hard to alleviate. After all, when someone decides to enrol for an exam, she invests an important part of the formative years of her life to the tortuous process of preparing for it. In addition, she incurs significant expenses for coaching as she knows that that is a key element to success. And what are the odds of her succeeding? Given that there were 22,750,11 candidates who were scheduled to take the NEET examination this year and only 1,29,000 MBBS seats, it follows that her chances of success were a mere 6 per cent. In other words, for every one hundred candidates, less than six would be selected. Imagine what goes on in the mind of a youngster who gambles so much of her intellectual and economic capital for so little?

By all accounts, a large number of the candidates were from the not so well-off segments of society. The anguish is exacerbated when you know that this is not the first time such a leak has happened — nor are they confined to the NEET examination alone. A cursory examination of the data related to the history of question paper leaks in India will disabuse the reader of any such notion. This brings us to a larger issue, which is that we are examining our students

right out of their minds. A child is subjected to exams since she starts school — tests for kindergarten are not unheard of in the big metros. But the genuine torment must be reserved for the time the child begins to approach high school and coaching classes become the norm. Coaching centres thrive on the fears of middle-class parents driven by the belief that the path to success lies through the portals of institutions like IIT or an



AIIMS. Coaching centres are perceived as necessary gateways for enabling schoolchildren to succeed at the various entrance examinations that are being conducted by our worthy institutions of knowledge. The list of such examinations is countless; there's NEET, of course, but also CUET and JEE, plus GATE and CAT. The day is not

far off when viewed from outer space India shall appear as one big exam centre. This business of inflicting one exam after another on young and impressionable minds flies in the face of the 2020 National Education Policy (NEP). The policy advocates a much more enlightened approach that advocates testing as means of enabling a student to gain knowledge and not for disabling the mind of the student.

To imbue a bit of fresh air into the discussion at hand, I would like to draw attention to an interesting experiment underway for about three years in Jammu and Kashmir.

In keeping with the spirit of the NEP 2020, several prominent universities in J&K have launched an innovative undergraduate degree programme formally known as the Design Your Degree Programme. The main features of this include, exposure to communication and analytical skills, alongside training in the use of data and IT. Learning happens largely through group-based project work. The blackboard plays a substantially diminished role. Extra-curricular and co-curricular activities carry academic credit, as does entrepreneurial activity. Students take part in activities such as riding on a train that gets converted to a College On Wheels, where they work on projects related to any aspect of the journey onboard and where the train halts. As students progress year by year, they begin to realise

their yearnings and interests and specialise accordingly. They have the option of exiting after one year with a certificate that records the credit earned, after two years with a diploma, after three years with an undergraduate degree with specialisation of their choice, or after four years with an Honours degree which has a research

component. Testing happens in enlightened ways where project outcomes are presented and discussed in depth before credit is accorded. But to return to the NEET crisis, let me say here that all is not lost; simple, but powerful ways of re-imagining the NEET exam exist, especially if meticulous planning is paired with shrewd technology. What is puzzling isn't primarily the issue of leaks, but rather our apparent powerlessness in halting the decay. Here is a foolproof way to fix the testing crisis. First, the National Testing Agency (NTA) should invest massively in building a meticulously curated question repository. Foolproof Internet connectivity at every test venue needs dependable power backups and high-speed, sturdy laser printers too. The NTA must develop a sophisticated algorithm capable of instantly generating a flawless question set via unpredictable randomisation. This set would be transmitted securely, in encrypted digital format, to all centres mere hours ahead of exam start time. Centres would then print copies just two hours prior. Every exam room must have clear-recording video surveillance of all proceedings. Papers can thus circulate securely without risk. Ideally, equipping candidates with solid desktops or laptops would allow emailing the paper directly at exam time, with typed responses submitted via secure software to a central grading hub. Alternatively, handwritten answers on paper remain viable. This serves as an initial blueprint to spark a brainstorming drive toward a tamper-proof system that restores candidate confidence. What I have proposed here is not NEET-specific. It is a simple model for conducting any exam without the fear of leakages. Testing is only supposed to be a medium for learning, it cannot be a substitute for it. Educating a child has to be India's goal, not testing whether she is capable of being educated.

Government sanctioned Rs 397 crore for urgent canal restoration works: Minister Nimmala

Water Resources Minister Nimmala Ramanaidu has said that the State government has intensified efforts to restore the irrigation canal network. He charged that the previous YSRCP regime led by former Chief Minister Y S Jagan Mohan Reddy destroyed the irrigation network causing hardships to farmers between 2019 to 2024.

Reviewing the progress of Operation and Maintenance (O&M) works and the Veligonda Project through a video conference with irrigation officials at his Camp Office in Vijayawada on Friday, the Minister announced that the coalition government had allocated Rs



708 crore in two phases for O&M He said a third phase involving Rs 397 crore has now been sanctioned for

urgent canal maintenance works, including weed removal, desilting, and repair works. Ramanaidu stressed that these works must be completed at the earliest by the commencement of the Kharif season.

The Minister alleged that basic maintenance works of canals were ignored during the regime of the YSRCP, resulting in severe hardships and losses for farmers.

He stated that to speed up emergency works, the Cabinet had approved a mechanism allowing short tenders to be called within seven days for projects exceeding Rs 10 lakh.

Out of 6,502 identified works, nearly

5,943 works (about 91 percent) will be executed through Water Users Associations. Ramanaidu directed officials from the Chief Engineer level to field staff to closely monitor the works and ensure timely completion. He also instructed irrigation authorities to submit weekly progress reports and coordinate O&M activities with the Jaladhara programme to improve groundwater levels.

The Minister said a review meeting on Jaladhara would be conducted later this month with the participation of Union Jal Shakti Minister C R Patil, Chief Minister N Chandrababu Naidu, district collectors, and irrigation officials.

Lapses flagged at Kakinada dialysis unit after 15 deaths

KAKINADA. (Agency)

Several lapses have been identified at the Nephroplus dialysis unit on the premises of Kakinada Government General Hospital. These allegedly resulted in multiple deaths over the past three months. Following a PGRS complaint, Dr Pasupuleti Radha Krishna, NTR Vaidya Seva's Kakinada district coordinator, inspected the dialysis records on Friday and flagged the lapses. He told TNIE that the matter will be reported to the Kakinada district collector and the Director of Medical Education (DME).

The government pays Rs 1,136 per dialysis session under the MoU, which mandates a nephrologist and two medical officers. Patient attendants alleged the nephrologist visits only once a month and no duty doctor has attended for three months. In-charge superintendent of Kakinada GGH, Dr Srinivasan, told that the dialysis unit is under DME control, not Kakinada GGH. He said the NTR Vaidya Seva district coordinator monitors the unit, and the PGRS petition will be forwarded to the DME.

NTR Vaidya Seva district coordinator Dr Pasupuleti Radha Krishna stated that many lapses related to the deaths have been found. He said these would be reported to the collector and the DME as soon as possible. T Suresh Kumar, cluster head of the Nephroplus Dialysis company, speaking on the dialysis unit's operations, said the unit doctor has resigned but is still serving the notice period. He added that a manager was recently appointed, and doctors will be appointed to cover three shifts within 10 days.

Kerala HC allows transgender man to preserve eggs; affirms right to parenthood

Hari Devageeth's fight was never just about a medical procedure, it was about preserving the possibility of parenthood while affirming his identity. The 28-year-old transgender man, who was assigned female at birth, finally found relief after the Kerala High Court allowed him to cryopreserve his eggs by approaching an ART bank of his choice.

In a compassionate order, Justice Shoba Annamma Eapen directed that the chosen ART bank should take necessary steps to retrieve and preserve Hari's oocytes (immature egg cells) so they may be used for reproduction in future.

Hari told the court that he is yet to complete his gender-affirmation surgery. Once it is done, he will permanently lose his reproductive capacity, including through the removal of his ovaries and uterus. Before taking that irreversible step, he wanted the opportunity to preserve his gametes, to fulfil his hope of one day having a biological child. The court said the petitioner, being a biological woman, had all the rights to preserve the oocytes since the Supreme Court has held that the right to reproduction is a fundamental right under Article 21 of the Constitution, right to life.

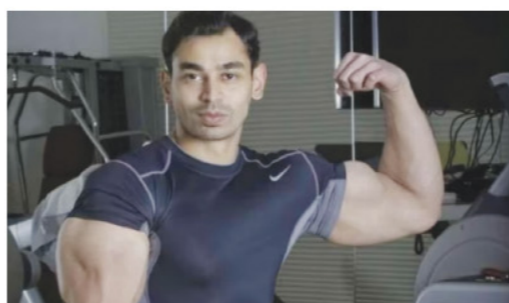
The petitioner also said none of the authorities concerned informed him about the aspect before he obtained the certificate under Section 7 of the Transgender Act or before the removal of breasts. The court said it was the duty of the appropriate government to give proper awareness to transgender persons regarding preservation of their oocytes or sperms before they start treatment to change their gender. No document was produced by authorities to prove that such awareness or counselling was provided to the petitioner, the court said.

Prateek Yadav death: A royal lifestyle, fitness empire and sudden end

Prateek Yadav, the younger son of Samajwadi Party founder and former Uttar Pradesh Chief Minister Mulayam Singh Yadav, passed away at the age of 38 following a cardiac arrest, sending shockwaves through political and business circles in Uttar Pradesh. Though he stayed away from active politics, Prateek had carved out a distinct identity in the world of real estate and fitness, becoming known for his luxury lifestyle, high-end businesses and social media presence. Unlike most members of the Yadav family, Prateek chose not to enter electoral politics. Instead, he built his career around business ventures and fitness entrepreneurship while maintaining a relatively low political profile. Yet, his connection to one of Uttar Pradesh's most influential political families ensured he remained in the public spotlight.

Prateek was often associated with a lavish lifestyle. He reportedly owned a Lamborghini worth nearly Rs 5 crore, purchased through a major bank loan, and



was known for his fascination with luxury cars and premium living. Government records also reflected substantial movable and immovable assets linked to him, including an upscale bungalow in Lucknow's Gautampalli area, residential properties in the cantonment region and commercial establishments in Gomti Nagar.

One of his major business hubs was a large office complex near Fun Mall in Gomti Nagar, from where several of his ventures were reportedly operated. Though investigations reportedly found that no company was directly registered in his own name, multiple real estate and infrastructure businesses were allegedly managed through close associates and relatives.

Sources familiar with the family's business network said companies linked to infrastructure, construction and real estate were operated with the involvement of Aman Singh Bisht, the brother of Aparna Yadav, along with other associates. People close to the family claimed that Prateek maintained effective control over many of these ventures, even if his name did not formally appear in company records. These business dealings occasionally became the subject of disputes and speculation within political and business circles.

Bengal Records Highest-Ever Voter Turnout In Any Assembly Poll, Beats Tripura

West Bengal. (Agency)

West Bengal has surpassed Tripura by registering the highest-ever voter turnout in an assembly election since Independence, latest data shared by the Election Commission shows. At 93.61 per cent voter participation in the 2013 assembly polls, Tripura so far held the distinction of recording the highest turnout in a state poll. But according to the latest EC data as made available on Thursday, West Bengal has recorded a turnout of 93.71 per cent.

Tripura, Nagaland, and Manipur have been witnessing high voter turnouts of 90 per cent and above in assembly polls over the years.

On May 1, West Bengal surpassed



Nagaland and Manipur by registering a 92.67 per cent provisional turnout, the state's highest since Independence, in the April assembly polls. West Bengal's previous highest voter turnout of 84.72 per cent was recorded in the 2013 elections. Tripura recorded a 93.61 per cent turnout in the 2013 polls.

On April 9, Assam and Puducherry surpassed their highest-ever poll participation by recording a voter turnout of 85.38 per cent and 89.83 per cent, respectively.

Tamil Nadu recorded a voter turnout of 84.69 per cent, bettering its previous highest poll participation of 78.29 per cent in 2011. In the state, women's participation was 85.76 per cent against men's 83.57 per cent. In West Bengal, 92.69 per cent of women voters turned up at the polling stations in the first phase, compared to 90.92 per cent of men. Tamil Nadu, where all the 234 seats went to polls on April 23, has 5.73 crore voters.

West Bengal, where polling was held in two phases, has 3.6 crore voters.

Midnight queues continue outside petrol pumps across Odisha despite rise in price

Some fuel stations temporarily ran out of stock for the second consecutive day due to the sudden surge in demand in the last three days.

Even as the Centre hiked petrol and diesel prices by Rs 3 per litre, panic buying fuelled by rumours of fuel shortage sparked heavy rush and long queues at petrol pumps in different parts of the state for the fourth consecutive day on Friday. Despite claims of adequate stocks in the state, people lined up at petrol pumps in Bhubaneswar, Cuttack, Rourkela, Berhampur and other areas till late into the night. Some fuel stations even shut down from the morning, adding to inconvenience of the vehicle owners.

The state capital saw heavy rush of motorists in petrol pumps from midnight on Thursday. At one fuel station in Rasulgarh, police had to drive away motorists at around 3 am and barricade

the premises to prevent a jam. Some fuel stations temporarily ran out of stock for the second consecutive day due to the sudden surge in demand in the last three days. General secretary of All India Petroleum Dealers' Association and Utkal Petroleum Dealers' Association Sanjay Lath reiterated that the situation is largely driven by panic buying and misinformation, while the disruption in supply, despite adequate stock, has made things worse. The oil companies must ensure the supply remains smooth to prevent panic buying, he said.

The representatives of State Truck Owners' and Bus Owners' Associations who met

transport commissioner on the day, said the government has sought 48 hours time



to resolve the issues related to oil supply. "Hundreds of trucks are stranded in different places or waiting at fuel stations. The government must find an immediate solution," general secretary Pranab Parija

told mediapersons.

All Odisha Private Bus Owners' Association (AOPBOA) secretary Debendra Sahoo said the body has demanded dedicated petrol pumps for heavy vehicles, buses in particular, to prevent disruption in public transport service during the ongoing crisis. The heavy rush of two-wheelers and four-wheelers is preventing us from getting fuel on time, he said.

Fuel prices hiked

The Utkal Petroleum Dealers' Association said price of petrol rose by Rs 3.22, while diesel price increased by Rs 3.19 in the state. The regular petrol after price revision now costs around Rs 104.51, while diesel costs Rs 95.99 per litre, Lath said.

35-year-old patient dies after ambulance breaks down, runs out of oxygen near Cuttack

Cuttack. (Agency)

In a tragic incident, a 35-year-old patient died after the ambulance carrying him broke down midway between Cuttack and Bhubaneswar, while oxygen support ran out before a replacement vehicle could arrive, here on Friday.

Prakash Kumar Kandi was being shifted from the SCB Medical College and Hospital in Cuttack to a private hospital in Bhubaneswar when the incident occurred on the bridge over Kathajodi river, just outside Cuttack city. Family members alleged that the ambulance ran out of fuel, but police attributed the incident to a technical snag. The incident came amid reports of panic buying and a fuel crisis, with long queues seen at petrol pumps.

A native of Govindpur village under Derabish police limits in Kendrapara district, Kandi was undergoing treatment after allegedly consuming poison. When his condition became critical, he was being shifted to Bhubaneswar.

Kandi's family members alleged that the ambulance suddenly stopped in the middle of the bridge after running out of fuel. The delay led to the patient's death, they claimed. "Despite requests, no one extended help by sharing fuel from their vehicles. It took around half an hour for another ambulance to reach the spot and, by that time, the oxygen supply had also run out and the patient had died," alleged Jharana Das, Kandi's sister-in-law.

The family members accused the ambulance operator of negligence and demanded stringent action. "The ambulance operator should have ensured that the vehicle was fuelled and oxygen cylinders were adequately stocked before leaving Cuttack for Bhubaneswar," Das alleged.

Chief district medical officer of Cuttack, Dr Prasant Kumar Hota, said an inquiry had been initiated into the incident and a detailed report had been sought from the ambulance operator.

Police, however, ruled out the possibility of the ambulance running out of fuel. "There was sufficient fuel in the vehicle, which broke down due to a mechanical defect in the gearbox," said additional IIC of Cuttack Sadar police station, Sushant Pani. Pani, who conducted a preliminary inquiry, said neither the driver nor the owner of the private ambulance was found near the vehicle.

Robert Vadra granted pre-arrest bail in Shikohpur land deal money laundering case

Robert Vadra appeared before court after summons in the Enforcement Directorate case linked to alleged money laundering in the Shikohpur land deal in Haryana.

New Delhi.(Agency)

In a major setback to the Enforcement Directorate (ED) in the Shikohpur land deal case, Robert Vadra was on Saturday granted bail by Delhi's Rouse Avenue Court after appearing before it in compliance with summons issued earlier while taking cognisance of the investigation agency's chargesheet.

The matter came up before Special Judge Sushant Changotra, who directed Vadra to furnish bail bonds. The court made it clear that no additional conditions were being imposed while granting him relief. "I am asking to file a bail bond, not any other considerations," the judge observed during the hearing.

Vadra appeared before the court after a summons had been issued to him and eight others when the court took cognisance of

the prosecution complaint filed by the ED. The complaint relates to allegations of money laundering arising out of a land transaction in Haryana's Shikohpur village.

During the proceedings, ED counsel Zoheb Hossain appeared virtually and informed the court that the agency was filing a status report in compliance with court directions.

However, he sought two additional weeks to file a detailed report regarding further investigation in the case. He told the court that the agency was still examining certain aspects and needed more time to complete the process. The ED also informed the court that Vadra had



challenged the order taking cognisance of the chargesheet before the Delhi High Court. The trial court then listed the matter for further hearing on July 10.

WHAT'S THE MATTER?

The case stems from an FIR registered in

September 2018 over an alleged irregular land transaction involving a 3.5-acre plot in Gurugram's Shikohpur.

According to the ED, Vadra's company allegedly purchased the land from Omkareshwar Properties in February 2008 for Rs 7.5 crore and later sold it to DLF for Rs 58 crore.

The agency suspects that the transaction generated proceeds that formed part of a money laundering operation and initiated an investigation into the financial trail.

The prosecution complaint filed by the ED in July 2025 named Vadra and several other individuals and entities.

The original FIR also included former

Haryana chief ministers Manohar Lal Khattar and Bhupinder Singh Hooda, along with a property dealer and the real estate company. Charges cited in the case include corruption, forgery and cheating.

ROBERT VADRA ATTACKS ED

Speaking to reporters after the hearing, Vadra launched a sharp attack at the ED and claimed that its integrity was compromised, while also expressing complete faith in the country's judicial system. He said, "I believe in the judicial system of this country. I know that the ED is being managed by the government, and it will keep on working at the behest of it. So, it's not fair from the ED's side. But I believe in the judicial system of the country. So, I am always going to be here and answer all the questions. Whatever the formalities are, I will complete them".

Audit flags former Delhi Medical Council registrar's irregular service extension, losses worth over Rs 10 crore

From expensive Diwali gifts and foreign trips to irregular extension of service and enhancement of retirement age of its registrar, a special audit conducted by the Delhi Health department has flagged financial and administrative irregularities in the functioning of the Delhi Medical Council (DMC), estimating losses worth over Rs 10 crore to the government exchequer.

The audit report observed that the then Registrar Dr Girish Tyagi, in his official capacity, was responsible for the government losing more than Rs 5.57 crore between 2019 and 2025 due to a reduction in renewal fees that doctors had to pay while they renewed their registration with the DMC. In addition, the report recommended that the government should recover monetary benefits exceeding Rs 3.23 crore from Tyagi that he had received in the form of salary, allowances and related expenditures.

Responding to the allegations, Tyagi termed the audit findings "misleading" and maintained that they appeared aimed at "deliberately creating a false public perception of corruption where none has been established".

Alleging that the issue regarding extension of service was being selectively projected, Tyagi said that as the registrar, he was merely an employee of DMC. "An employee cannot grant an extension to himself. The extension of service was approved by a duly constituted 25-member Delhi Medical Council through its competent decision-making process. Significantly, many of the very persons now attempting to raise false allegations were themselves signatories to or participants in those decisions," he added.

He maintained that the matter is sub judice and any attempt to publicly pronounce guilt or create a media narrative was "premature, improper, and contrary to principles of natural justice".

Only electric three-wheelers to be registered from January 2027: CAQM

From mandating electric three-wheelers to restricting fuel for polluting vehicles, the Commission for Air Quality Management (CAQM) on Friday issued a set of directions aimed at tackling key sources of air pollution across the NCR.

At its 28th full Commission meeting, the panel decided to allow only electric three-wheelers (L5 category) — both passenger and goods — to be registered in a phased manner. The rollout will begin in Delhi from January 1, 2027, extend to high vehicle-density districts including Gurugram, Faridabad, Sonapat, Ghaziabad and Gautam Buddha Nagar from January 1, 2028, and cover the remaining NCR districts from January 1, 2029. This also means that existing CNG or diesel three-wheelers would still be allowed to operate until they are gradually phased out.

The Commission also directed to restrict the sale of fuel to vehicles without a valid Pollution Under Control Certificate (PUC) across the NCR from October 1 this year, tightening enforcement against polluting vehicles.

Flagging a spike in crop residue burning, the Commission noted that Punjab recorded 8,986 stubble burning incidents between April 1 and May 14 this year, and directed state authorities to step up enforcement measures to curb such cases.

It is also for the first time that paddy stubble burning will be officially monitored on ground. To implement this, the Commission also directed for the implementation of the Action Plan for prevention and control of paddy stubble burning in 2026 with a target of complete elimination of paddy stubble burning in the NCR states. According to a statement by the Commission, state governments have prepared and updated state-specific action plans for this year's paddy harvest season in line with the broad framework provided by the CAQM.

The Commission also reviewed the expansion of the Continuous Ambient Air Quality Monitoring Stations (CAAQMS) network, noting that 46 additional stations are proposed across the NCR, taking the total to 157. Under revised norms, monitoring density will be one station per 25 sq km in Delhi and contiguous cities, and one per 50 sq km in other districts, with directions issued for faster installation.

Delhi government plans Miyawaki forest plantation at Asola-Bhatti Wildlife Sanctuary

The move comes amid a broader push by the Delhi government to enhance green buffers, particularly in the city's southern ridge areas.

Delhi's Forest department is planning a Miyawaki plantation drive at Asola-Bhatti Wildlife Sanctuary in South Delhi. The department has floated a fresh tender with a proposal to plant and maintain 40,000 saplings and 20,000 shrubs.

According to the tender notice issued by the South Forest Division, the project will be implemented over a one-year period, during 2025-26, focusing on dense, fast-growing Miyawaki forests aimed at improving green cover and local biodiversity.

Officials said the initiative is part of the government's ongoing efforts to strengthen urban afforestation in

ecologically sensitive zones, which are close to the Asola-Bhatti Wildlife Sanctuary and have seen



sustained plantation drives in recent years. The Miyawaki technique is known for creating compact forests with high survival rates. The Forest department has been adopting the

technique for increasing greenery in urban spaces rapidly.

The e-tender, released on May 8 this year, has invited bids from agencies under a two-bid system. A pre-bid meeting is scheduled for May 20, while the deadline for submission is May 29, with technical bids set to be opened the same day.

The project will be overseen by the Deputy Conservator of Forests, South Division.

Noida workers' protest violence: Kin allege custodial torture, Supreme Court asks UP govt to produce before it two arrested men

The Supreme Court on Friday asked the Uttar Pradesh government to produce before it two of the men arrested in connection with the April 13 violence in Noida following a worker's protest after their families alleged that they were tortured in custody.

A bench of Justice B V Nagarathna and Justice Ujjal Bhuyan asked the counsel appearing for the state government to produce Aditya Anand and Rupesh Roy before it on May 18 at 2 pm. The bench was hearing a writ petition filed by Keshav Anand, brother of Aditya. According to the police, Aditya and Rupesh had used WhatsApp groups to instigate violence during the protests.

Appearing for the petitioner, senior advocate Colin Gonsalves said Aditya was an engineer and also operated a children's library. Seeking an independent investigation into the matter, he said Aditya campaigned for workers' rights and his speech recordings were proof of this. The

counsel also claimed that lawyers were not being allowed to effectively assist Aditya.

The counsel appearing for the UP government, however, denied the allegations of torture in police custody. All requirements of arrest were complied with, including supply of grounds of arrest, the counsel said.

Hearing the arguments, the court said, "We direct respondent no.1/State to produce the brother of the petitioner, Aditya Anand, and Rupesh Roy, before this court on 18.05.2026 at 2 pm."

In the meantime, judicial custody of the two will continue, it added. On April 17, Noida Police had identified three persons as the alleged masterminds in the case:

Rupesh Roy, who claimed to be an autorickshaw driver; Manisha Chauhan; and Aditya, a B.Tech graduate from NIT Jamshedpur. A day later, a joint team of Noida Police and the Uttar Pradesh Special Task Force arrested Aditya from Tiruchirappalli railway station. He was carrying a cash reward of Rs 1 lakh for his arrest.



She hoped to clear NEET after 2 failed attempts, found hanging after exam cancelled

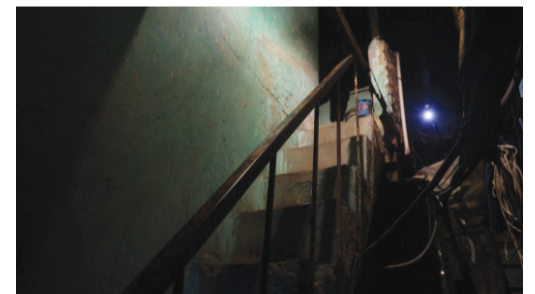

Third time lucky. She had told her family that she finally felt hopeful that this year, she would clear the National Eligibility cum Entrance Test (Undergraduate) after two failed attempts.

After failing to clear the exam by four marks last year, a 20-year-old aspirant from Lal Bagh in North Delhi's Azadpur had returned from this year's exam on May 3 feeling confident about her performance. But soon after, the National Testing Agency would cancel the examination over an alleged paper leak and announce a re-test on June 21. And she would have to appear for the exam a fourth time. On Thursday afternoon, the woman was found hanging inside her room at her home in Azadpur's Lal Bagh in a suspected case of suicide.

The incident came to light when the police found her family at Kewal Park Shamsan Ghat after receiving a PCR call alleging that they were attempting to cremate the body without informing authorities.

According to the woman's relatives, the woman had been preparing for NEET for the last three years. "Last year, she missed by just four marks.



Her father had pinned all his hopes on her," said her maternal aunt.

The woman lived with her parents, twin sister and two brothers in Lal Bagh — a dense cluster of shanties, temporary shops and tangled overhead wires. Located opposite an Atal Canteen, a 3-ft wide lane, hardly wide enough for two people to walk side by side, leads to the family's two-room home through a steep staircase. Her father works as a cab driver, relatives said.

"She was a little stressed for the last few days... her mother had told me. It was because she wanted to get admitted to a medical college for years now," the uncle told mediapersons.

At the time of the incident, the woman's parents were not at home. "I came home yesterday evening, and that's when I got to what had happened," he added.

The dual-use Great Nicobar Island Project

India's most significant port project is a geopolitical project of enormous ramifications.

India's mammoth project to build a transshipment port on the Great Nicobar Island has sparked controversy, with Leader of Opposition Rahul Gandhi calling it "destruction dressed in development language". Defence analysts have questioned the commercial utility of a project 1,400 kilometres away from the Indian mainland.

The Great Nicobar Project seeks to transform the island into a strategic maritime and economic hub by leveraging its proximity (about 40 nautical miles) to the East-West shipping route and reducing India's dependence on foreign transshipment ports.

The core of the project is a 14.2 million twenty-foot equivalent unit (MTEU) International Container Transshipment Terminal (ICTT) at Galathea Bay which will reduce India's reliance on foreign ports like Singapore and Colombo for transshipment. Other elements include a Greenfield International Airport (4,000 Peak Hour Passengers), a 450 MVA gas-solar power plant and a planned township. The first phase of the project is due for completion by 2028.

The Rs 75,000 crore project is located just 40 nautical miles from one of the world's most critical maritime

arteries, carrying 50 per cent of global container traffic and roughly 80 per cent of global seaborne oil trade. It transforms India from being a mere observer



in the Association of South East Asian Nations (ASEAN), into a key participant in the influential economic grouping. This is only one of the reasons that makes the GNI one of the most significant geo-strategic projects ever attempted by India.

THE MALACCA DILEMMA

The 921-square kilometre Great Nicobar Island is India's southernmost territory. It is a third the size of

the state of Goa, and is located near the Six Degree Channel — the primary trade route exiting from the narrow funnel of the Malacca Strait. Nearly 80 per cent of China's energy supplies pass through this critical maritime chokepoint, leading then-Chinese President Hu Jintao to coin the term "Malacca Dilemma" in 2003.

In this Chinese dilemma lies an Indian opportunity. India maintains seven small military bases on the Andaman and Nicobar Islands, including an airstrip, INS Baaz in Campbell Bay on the Great Nicobar Island. A tri-services theatre command established here in 2001 integrates land, air and naval assets. An Indian submarine based in the Andaman Islands would take just five days to arrive at the chokepoints of the Indonesian islands, roughly half the time it would take from Visakhapatnam.

Yet, even after 25 years, India has not based major warships, fighter aircraft, submarines or long-range Anti-Submarine Warfare (ASW) aircraft on these islands. Common reasons include a lack of fuel storage facilities, docking and repair facilities for warships and submarines. It is a chicken and egg conundrum.

Brand Beckham soars: David Beckham becomes UK's first billionaire sportsman

David Beckham, the boy from Leytonstone who once conquered world football with a swing of his right boot, has achieved what no British athlete before him ever could: the ten-figure club. According to the latest iteration of the Sunday Times Rich List, David and Victoria Beckham have officially crossed the threshold into billionaire status, with their collective net worth skyrocketing to a staggering £1.185 billion. The valuation marks a seismic leap from their estimated £500 million fortune last year, making Beckham the UK's first-ever billionaire sportsman. While the "Brand Beckham" machine has been a lucrative global enterprise for three decades, this recent financial surge is rooted firmly in a masterstroke of American sporting real estate and a slice of Argentinian magic.

THE MESSI FACTOR

The crown jewel of Beckham's empire is Inter Miami CF. When Beckham signed for the LA



Galaxy in 2007, his contract included a revolutionary clause allowing him to buy an MLS expansion franchise for just \$25 million. Today, that franchise is valued well north of £1 billion. The catalyst for that exponential valuation jump was the historic signing of Lionel Messi, which sent global merchandise sales, ticket prices, and Apple TV broadcast subscriptions into orbit. Combined with massive real estate developments surrounding the club's upcoming Miami Freedom Park stadium, Beckham's gamble on American soccer has paid off in historic fashion. Yet, it is not a solo victory. The milestone represents a twin-engine financial triumph for Britain's ultimate power couple. Victoria Beckham's luxury fashion and beauty house, which faced well-documented financial headwinds for years, has engineered a dramatic U-turn. The label recently reported revenues breaching the £100 million mark, pivoting into serious profitability and silencing high-fashion skeptics. As diversified as they are deep.

8 sixes in 16 balls: Lack of clarity gets the better of CSK against Lucknow

In two separate instances during the match against Lucknow Super Giants, Chennai Super Kings conceded four sixes in four balls. In a defence of 187 runs at the Ekana Stadium in Lucknow, that proved fatal for the Rituraj Gaikwad-led side, who were chasing a top-four spot in the Indian Premier League's 2026 season. After a slow start to the season, Chennai had finally begun to put together some consistent results. Four wins from their last five games meant that CSK still had an outside chance of qualifying for the playoffs. However, it all came crashing down on Friday when Chennai were blown away by a magnificent 90-run innings from Mitchell Marsh, who looked in imperious touch on May 15. Playing on a deck that had good bounce and carry for the seamers, Marsh slammed seven sixes and nine boundaries before getting run out in the 12th over of the game. But by the time Marsh departed, the damage had already been done. In today's IPL Play of the Day, we look at how a stretch of 16 balls ruined CSK's night at the Ekana Stadium on May 15.

On Friday, Chennai Super Kings' fast bowlers had one clear task: find the length that helped LSG pacers make life miserable for Chennai's top order in the first innings. It seemed to be the hard-length area where Lucknow's pacers operated, extracting enough skid and bounce to hurry multiple batters into mistakes. Young Kartik Sharma and Shivam Dube had played valuable knocks to get CSK to a fighting total of 187. The bowlers simply needed to target the same areas and test the LSG batters early in the innings. But that plan quickly fell apart as Mitchell Marsh took a liking to the CSK pacers and dismantled them on Friday. Marsh's incredible assault began in the fifth over of the match when he took Anshul Kamboj apart with four consecutive sixes.

They funded their own dreams. Now Netherlands women are ready to play a World Cup

← **The Netherlands are all set to make their Women's T20 World Cup debut next month in England and Wales. In an exclusive conversation with IndiaToday.in, Dutch skipper Babette de Leede reflected on the team's remarkable journey, from once struggling for recognition and resources to now stepping onto cricket's biggest stage.**

2014 remains one of the most unforgettable years in Dutch cricket history. Under Peter Borren, the Netherlands men's team scripted a miracle at the T20 World Cup, storming into the Super 10 after chasing 190 against Ireland in just 13.5 overs in Sylhet. More than a decade later, Stephan Myburgh's breathtaking 23-ball 63 still lives vividly in memory, not just as one of their best, but as one of the most astonishing run-chases the tournament has ever witnessed. In that very

World Cup, the Dutch pulled off another remarkable victory, bowling England out for just 88 runs in a stunning display. But while the men were making headlines and inspiring a generation, in the same year, the Dutch women's team was simply trying to survive. They did not even have T20I status then and, instead of earning from the game, many players often dipped into their own pockets just to continue playing the sport they love. There was no full-time head coach either, a painful reminder of how little support surrounded women's cricket in the country at the time. It was amid that uncertainty that a 15-year-old Babette de Leede made her debut for the Netherlands in 2014, carrying little more than hope and a dream. 12 years later, that young girl now stands at the heart of a historic moment, preparing to lead the Netherlands into their maiden Women's T20 World Cup under full-time coach Neil McRae. What once felt distant and fragile has finally turned into something beautifully real for Dutch women's cricket. I made my debut earlier in

2014, but we didn't have T20I status back then. We've come a long, long way since. Back then, we had to pay for our own tours and trips, and our coach wasn't full-time. Gradually, things improved. Around 2019 or 2020, we got our first full-time head coach,



who worked a lot with us and helped us get better," Babette told IndiaToday in an exclusive interview.

"We also started receiving match fees or at least petrol money, so it didn't cost us to play cricket or attend training. Now we're at a stage where we earn match fees on tour, and

some of the girls are on part-time contracts as well," Babette said.

THE HAPPY MOMENT OF SHIVERS

Cricket has always flowed through the veins of the De Leede family. Babette's uncle, Tim de Leede, etched his name into Dutch cricket folklore during the World Cup 2003 when he produced a Player of the Match performance against India and even dismissed the great Sachin Tendulkar as his very first international wicket. Her cousin, Bas de Leede, has already carried the family legacy onto the ODI and T20 World Cup stages. Now, another chapter is ready to be written. Babette is preparing to represent the Netherlands at one of cricket's grandest events in England and Wales, adding her own story to a family that has long served Dutch cricket with pride. Earlier this year in Nepal, the Netherlands women scripted a remarkable run at the Qualifiers, winning five consecutive matches to book their place at the global event alongside Bangladesh.

Pakistan's Fatima Sana scores fastest Women's T20I fifty, smashes Richa Ghosh's record

Fatima Sana etched her name into the record books after smashing the fastest half-century in Women's T20I history during Pakistan's third T20I against Zimbabwe in Karachi. The Pakistan skipper raced to fifty in only 15 deliveries, surpassing the previous benchmark of 18 balls jointly held by Sophie Devine, Phoebe Litchfield and Richa Ghosh. The Indian wicketkeeper scored her fifty off 18 balls during the clash against the West Indies on December 2024. Her breathtaking knock also equalled the fastest fifty recorded in all women's T20 cricket, matching feats achieved by Marie Kelly for Warwickshire in 2022 and Laura Harris for Otago in the 2025 Super Smash. Before Sana's blitz, Pakistan's quickest T20I fifty belonged to Nida Dar, who had reached the landmark in 20 balls against South Africa in 2019.

Batting first in the series finale, Pakistan were already well-placed at 152/4 when

Sana walked in during the 17th over. She wasted little time settling in, collecting a boundary off her opening delivery from Michelle Mavunga before launching a fierce assault on the Zimbabwe bowlers. Kudzai Chigora bore the brunt first as Sana hammered four consecutive boundaries in



one over. The real carnage arrived in the 19th over against Nomvelo Sibanda. Sana unleashed a sequence of 4, 4, 6, 6 and 4, plundering 24 runs from the over and moving to 48 from just 14 balls. At the

opposite end, Saira Jabeen also played a fluent hand. Sana brought up the record-breaking milestone with a couple off the bowling of Zimunu in the final over before finishing unbeaten on a stunning 62 from only 19 deliveries, an innings decorated with 10 fours and two sixes. Jabeen remained not out on 50 from 32 balls as Pakistan piled up 223/4, their second-highest total in Women's T20Is.

Zimbabwe never threatened in reply and were dismissed for 90. Pakistan's bowling unit dominated, with Sadia Iqbal and Nashra Sandhu sharing five wickets, while Sana also chipped in with 1/28.

Sana has enjoyed a sensational run in T20Is this year. She is currently Pakistan's leading run-scorer in the format in 2026, amassing 229 runs in five innings at a strike rate above 206. Earlier this year, she also produced her career-best T20I score — a blistering 90 off 41 balls against South Africa.

MS Dhoni set for CSK return vs SunRisers in Chennai? Ex-teammate drops big hint

The lingering mystery surrounding MS Dhoni's complete absence from the ongoing Indian Premier League season has taken a compelling turn, with veteran Indian spinner Ravichandran Ashwin hinting that the legendary wicketkeeper-batter could finally make his heavily anticipated return in Chennai Super Kings' must-win encounter against SunRisers Hyderabad on Monday. Dhoni, who has not played a single match in Chennai's 12 fixtures so far this season due to a calf injury sustained during pre-season training, left fans crestfallen yet again on Friday night. Despite travel arrangements being made for him to join the squad in Lucknow, the 44-year-old ultimately stayed back in Chennai as CSK fell to a damaging seven-wicket defeat against Lucknow Super Giants. However, speaking on his YouTube channel, Ashwin offered a reassuring assessment of Dhoni's physical state, suggesting that a return to the playing XI at Chepauk on Monday is firmly on the horizon. "Even now, if we talk about a

quality pace hitter, I think it's him," Ashwin said, underscoring Dhoni's enduring value to a middle order that has occasionally lacked late-innings impetus.



"Let's see, I have a feeling that against SunRisers Hyderabad, there is a good chance of him playing. Let's wait and see how it goes." Whether the former captain can provide the fairytale finish to an

otherwise frustrating season remains to be seen, but according to Ashwin, the medical green light is imminent. "As far as I have heard, he has been ready to take the field for the last two-three games," Ashwin said.

ASHWIN DEFENDS CHENNAI AMID INJURY WOES

Addressing the inevitable scrutiny that accompanies the prolonged rehabilitation of a high-profile athlete, Ashwin came to the defence of the Chennai team management. He dismissed the notion that skipper Rituraj Gaikwad or head coach Stephen Fleming could have managed the situation differently, pointing instead to the complex realities of modern sports science.

"I think the more you cut down on training, the chances of getting injured increases. Some, in a bid to avoid injuries, they look at hopping from match to match—that's wrong. But this is another department; it's physiotherapy and sports science. I don't think the coach and the captain can be blamed. They can't do anything," Ashwin explained.

But, Akash then revealed it after the end of the first innings, saying that there was no reason behind and the chit was there to act as motivation for him. "It just gives me motivation. There is no reason behind it. Whatever motivates me during the game, I'll keep backing it," said Akash. It will be interesting to see if the players will now heed to Steyn's advice and look for a new celebration during matches.

"What did he bowl first ball? A short-of-a-length delivery. Against Australians, if you bowl short, they'll punish you badly. Marsh smashed that first ball over covers for six. Remember that shot? After that, Kamboj kept bowling short, trying to get bounce, and Marsh pulled him over square leg for another six."

"From the third ball onwards, if you watch the slow-motion replay carefully, you can notice it in Kamboj's run-up itself. He got scared after those first two sixes. The fear crept in immediately, and from there he kept bowling shorter and shorter," said Srikkanth.

WHAT CSK NEEDED TO DO

Srikkanth agreed with the fact that Kamboj shouldn't have bowled at that time and CSK should have persisted with Mukul Choudhary and Spencer Johnson, who looked impressive early on in the match. The former India selector said that CSK should continued bowling good and Test match lengths and continued with the left-arm pace duo. "Look at Spencer Johnson — even he only got hit in the final over.

Govt revises petrol export tax, cuts diesel, ATF duties

New Delhi, (Agency)

The government has revised export taxes on petroleum products, imposing a special additional excise duty (SAED) of Rs 3 per litre on petrol exports while reducing the duty on diesel to Rs 16.5 per litre, effective from Saturday.

The notification by the Ministry of Finance stated that the entry of Rs 3 per litre shall be substituted for petrol exports, while diesel has been revised to Rs 16.5 per litre. It further said the road and infrastructure cess has been reduced to zero on petrol and diesel exports. The fresh SAED levy on petrol exports marks the first such duty since the outbreak of the West Asia conflict.

While export duties on diesel and ATF have been reduced from higher levels after a series of revisions in recent months. Earlier, export duty on diesel was revised multiple times. It was first set at Rs 21.50 per litre on March 26, then raised to Rs 55.5 per litre on April 11. Later, it was cut to Rs 23 per litre on April 30, and has now been further reduced to Rs 16.5 per litre. Similarly, aviation turbine fuel (ATF) followed a similar pattern. The duty was first Rs 29.5 per litre, then increased to Rs 42 per litre. It was later reduced to Rs 33 per litre and has now been brought down to Rs 16 per litre. The windfall tax framework was introduced to ensure adequate domestic fuel availability and curb exports amid volatile global oil markets triggered by the West Asia crisis. Geopolitical tensions remain elevated after the United States and Iran failed to reach a peace agreement, with US President Donald Trump rejecting Iran's proposal, saying: "I don't like it — TOTALLY UNACCEPTABLE."

NPS annuity exit rules eased for retirees facing financial emergency: Know the details

Kolkata (Agency)

One of the reasons why NPS, or National Pension System, is yet to enlist the desired number of subscribers is often cited to be the rigidity inherent in the structure. PFRDA, or the Pension Fund Regulatory and Development Authority, which regulates the system, has eased one of the rigid rules of annuity. The PFRDA's new rules will make it easier for retirees could find themselves stuck with older annuity contracts. On May 14, PFRDA issued a circular which stipulated that annuity service providers can now permit surrender of annuity policies in select cases. These are specifically instances where the annuitant, or a family member of the annuitant, is critically ill and needs funds quickly on an emergency basis. There is a second category too — NPS subscribers for whom the annuity policy was issued before October 24, 2024 and already carried an explicit surrender clause. While the earlier system almost debarred exiting an annuity, the new PFRDA rule can be viewed as a significant easing of the rigidity.

The significance for NPS subscribers

Under the NPS rules, subscribers are required to retain at least 40% of their retirement corpus to buy annuity. This other portion — 100% minus whatever is retained for annuity — is used for providing monthly pension after retirement. These rules governing the annuity portions are extremely rigid and illiquid. The NPS subscribers could not exit annuities earlier. Needless to say, it was of inconvenience to many NPS subscribers who just couldn't take out the money irrespective of how severe the emergency was.

What changed after the 2024 circular

PFRDA had earlier tightened annuity rules. In October 2024 a circular barred annuity service providers from allowing surrender or cancellation of annuities. The only exception was a free-look period available immediately after policy issuance. The argument at that time for PFRDA was that this rigid rule was required for "long-term old-age income security for subscribers".

India-Brics trade booms to \$416 billion, but deficit keeps rising

NEW YORK, (Agency)

India's trade with Brics countries gathered pace over the past five years, making the bloc a significant part of the country's imports. However, this growing trade also reflects a bigger problem: India is relying more on imports from the bloc, pushing its trade deficit higher.

A report by Rubix Data Sciences said India's bilateral trade with the other 10 Brics countries touched \$416 billion in CY2025, growing at nearly 10% every year between CY2021 and CY2025. But while trade has increased, India's goods trade deficit with the bloc has nearly doubled in the same period, rising from \$117 billion to \$224 billion.

A big reason for this is the sharp jump in imports. India's imports from Brics nations stood at \$320 billion in CY2025, growing at a 12% CAGR over five years. This also pushed Brics' share in India's total imports from 36% in CY2021 to 43% in CY2025. Within Brics, Russia became one of India's fastest-growing import partners, with imports rising at a 61% CAGR, mainly because of crude oil purchases. The UAE and Brazil also remained major trade partners, each recording 12% CAGR growth. Exports, however, have not kept pace.

India's exports to Brics countries reached \$96 billion in CY2025, growing at just 3% CAGR over the same period. Brics accounted for around 22% of India's total exports. Among the bloc, exports to the UAE grew the fastest at 11%, followed by Russia at 8% and Egypt at 5%. This gap between imports and exports has widened India's trade imbalance with several Brics members.

Govt levies windfall gains tax on petrol exports; slashes levy on diesel, jet fuel

New Delhi, (Agency)

The government has imposed windfall gains tax of Rs 3 per litre on the export of petrol. On the other hand, it reduced the levy on diesel to Rs 16.5 per litre and jet fuel or ATF (aviation turbine fuel) to Rs 16 per litre. The new charges will be effective from Saturday, May 16. As the

nomenclature indicates, windfall tax is defined as a temporary tax levied by governments on industries which witness unexpected surges in profitability. These are typically caused by geopolitical crises and/or supply chain bottlenecks. The idea is to earn from the taxes of super-profits or windfall gains during times of higher global prices. This is a tool for governments to regulate the trade deficit. The decision was announced less than 24 hours after the decision to raise retail prices of petrol and diesel.

Special additional excise duty

The windfall tax has come as a Special Additional Excise Duty. It is adjusted every fortnight by the government based on fluctuations in international crude oil prices. The special additional excise duty on petrol at Rs 3 per litre comes for the first time since the hostilities began on February 28 in West Asia when US forces attacked Teheran. The objective of the windfall tax is to rein in exporters from taking undue advantage of the price

differences, as globally crude oil prices have surged from about \$70 a barrel to more than \$110 a barrel.



Export duty on diesel and jet fuel

The duty on export of diesel was Rs 23 per litre, which has now been reduced to Rs 16.5 per litre. The duty on export of jet fuel was Rs 33 per litre but has been reduced to Rs 16 per litre. As the war progressed and prices of crude oil jumped in the global markets, the Centre imposed an export duty on diesel at Rs 21.50 a litre, and on ATF at Rs 29.5 a litre on

March 26. When it was reviewed on April 11, the export duty on diesel was raised to Rs 55.5 per litre and that on jet fuel to Rs 42 per litre. The duties were slashed to Rs 23 per litre on diesel and Rs 33 per litre on jet fuel when the government reviewed the rates on April 30.

Retail prices raised, more can follow

The impact of the US-Iran war was finally felt on the retail prices of petrol and diesel when the oil marketing companies were allowed to raise prices of these two fuels by more than Rs 3 per litre. The price rise happened after a gap of four years. The latest measure in the petroleum domain is the imposition of the windfall tax. In April, the government cut excise duty on petrol and diesel by Rs 10 a litre to provide relief to the oil marketing companies which were getting sandwiched between galloping crude oil prices and an unaltered retail fuel price line.

Sensex, Nifty slide over 2% amid crude surge, geopolitical tensions

New Delhi, (Agency)

Domestic equity markets witnessed another week of sharp correction, with benchmark indices declining over 2 per cent each amid rising crude oil prices and ongoing geopolitical tensions in West Asia. Nifty declined by 2.2 per cent or 532 points during the week to close at 23,643.5 against the previous Friday's closing, while Sensex dropped 2.7 per cent or over 2,000 points to end at 75,238. Meanwhile, broader markets remained under heavier pressure, with the mid-cap index falling over 2 per cent and the small-cap index losing nearly 4 per cent. Sectorally, realty stocks were worst performers, with BSE Realty plunging almost 8 per cent. Meanwhile, IT stocks also remained under pressure, with the BSE IT index falling 5.7 per cent, followed by auto, capital goods and consumer durable shares. In addition, banking and PSU stocks also witnessed selling pressure, with the BSE Bankex and BSE PSU indices declining 3 per cent each. However, few defensive sectors

outperformed, with BSE Metal gaining 1.5 per cent, while healthcare stocks rose 1.4 per cent.

From the 30-scrip basket, Titan Company was the top loser, falling 7.6 per cent, followed by Reliance Industries, Tech Mahindra and Mahindra & Mahindra. According to market experts, investor sentiment remained cautious amid the lack of meaningful de-escalation in West Asia tensions and their impact on crude oil

prices, inflation and the rupee.

They said elevated crude prices, rising global bond yields and sustained strength in the US dollar continued to pressure emerging markets, leading to intermittent foreign fund outflows and currency weakness. Analysts further noted that higher wholesale inflation, fuel price pass-through and elevated bond yields have increased concerns over macroeconomic stability and future monetary policy actions.

In addition, global cues also remained negative as tensions in West Asia continued without any breakthrough.

Moreover, concerns over disruptions in the Strait of Hormuz kept Brent crude oil prices elevated in the USD 105-110 per barrel range. Despite the correction, domestic institutional investors continued to provide support to the market, aided by strong retail participation. Additionally, SIP inflows in April stood at Rs 31,115 crore, helping absorb sustained FII selling.

SEBI relaxes borrowing norms for InvITs above 49% leverage limit

New Delhi, (Agency)

Securities and Exchange Board of India (SEBI) on Friday relaxed borrowing norms for Infrastructure Investment Trusts (InvITs) with leverage exceeding 49 per cent of asset value, a move aimed at expanding financing flexibility for infrastructure projects and improving funding access across the sector. In a circular, the market regulator said InvITs will now be allowed to raise fresh borrowings above the 49 per cent leverage threshold for capital expenditure intended to enhance asset performance or expand project capacity. The regulator has also permitted InvITs to use additional debt for major maintenance expenses related to road infrastructure projects. According to the circular, such expenses will include non-routine maintenance obligations mandated

under concession agreements. "Major maintenance expense shall mean expenditure incurred on maintenance of road project which is not routine maintenance and is in accordance with



the obligations and requirements specified in the concession agreement," SEBI said.

The relaxation is expected to particularly benefit road-focused InvITs that require significant funding for large-scale repairs and periodic maintenance

work. SEBI has also allowed refinancing of existing debt by InvITs, special purpose vehicles and holding companies under specified conditions. The market regulator clarified that refinancing would be restricted only to the principal amount of the original borrowing, while accumulated interest, penalties, fees or other charges cannot be refinanced.

"Only the principal portion of debt is refinanced, that is, any accumulated interest or any charges or fees by whatever name called shall not be refinanced," the regulator said. The revised framework follows amendments introduced to Regulation 20(3)(b)(ii) of the SEBI InvIT Regulations on April 17, 2026, which broadened the permitted use of borrowings beyond the leverage ceiling.

PFRDA's new NPS rules: Retirees can now withdraw up to 80% corpus after retirement

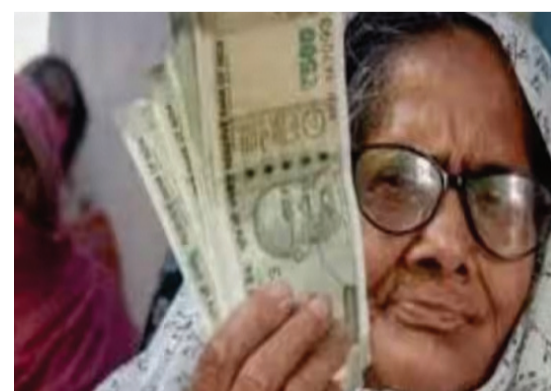
The Pension Fund Regulatory and Development Authority issued a circular on May 15, 2026, formally launching the Retirement Income Scheme alongside several new post-retirement drawdown mechanisms.

New Delhi, (Agency)

India's pension regulator has overhauled the way National Pension System subscribers can access their retirement savings, introducing a set of new options designed to give retirees meaningful control over how and when they draw down their corpus. The Pension Fund Regulatory and Development Authority issued a circular on May 15, 2026, formally launching the Retirement Income Scheme alongside several new post-retirement drawdown mechanisms. The core objective is straightforward: move away from a one-

size-fits-all payout model and allow subscribers to structure withdrawals around their actual financial needs in retirement. The most significant structural shift involves the annuity requirement for private-sector and non-government subscribers. Previously, retirees were required to deploy 40 per cent of their accumulated corpus into an annuity product that pays a fixed income for life, leaving 60 percent available for lump sum withdrawal. That ratio has now been inverted. Under the revised framework, the mandatory annuity floor drops to 20 percent, freeing up to 80 percent of the corpus for lump sum or phased withdrawal. The regulator has been explicit that the new drawdown options sit alongside the annuity requirement rather than replacing it — subscribers must still purchase an annuity with the minimum mandated portion. For subscribers whose total corpus does not exceed Rs 8 lakh, the annuity requirement is waived entirely,

allowing full withdrawal. Those with a corpus between Rs 8 lakh and Rs 12 lakh can withdraw up to Rs 6 lakh as a lump sum, with the remainder channelled into annuity or structured withdrawal products.



New Withdrawal Instruments

Two new withdrawal tools have been introduced to support phased drawdown. The Systematic Lump Sum Withdrawal allows retirees to pull money out in instalments over a defined period rather

than taking the entire available amount at once. The Systematic Unit Redemption operates on a similar principle, enabling periodic redemption of NPS units to generate a regular income stream. Together, these instruments give retirees the kind of cash flow management tools that were previously unavailable within the NPS architecture.

Longer Investment Window

PFRDA has also extended the age limit up to which subscribers can remain invested in NPS from 75 to 85 years. For retirees who do not immediately need their full corpus, this extension provides a longer runway for retirement savings to continue compounding within the system. A new investment option called RIS Steady has been introduced under the Retirement Income Scheme. It operates on a glide path model, automatically reducing equity exposure as the subscriber ages, thereby managing market risk progressively through the retirement years.



impact on retail fuel prices within the country. The differential taxation strategy is expected to boost government revenue from petroleum exports without affecting price stability for Indian consumers. This marks the latest fortnightly revision in export duties, a mechanism introduced after levies were first imposed on March 27, 2026, amid global supply uncertainties stemming from West Asia tensions. The government has periodically calibrated these duties—previously reduced for diesel and ATF effective May 1, to balance domestic availability, discourage excessive exports when international prices are attractive, and prevent windfall gains for exporters at the expense of local supply. Experts note that the adjustment, particularly the introduction of a modest duty on petrol exports (which was previously nil), could moderately impact margins of export-oriented refiners such as Reliance Industries, while public sector oil marketing companies with a stronger domestic focus may see limited effects. The policy continues to prioritise fuel security for Indian consumers by making exports relatively less lucrative.

Officials have maintained that such flexible tools like SAED allow the Centre to respond swiftly to volatile global crude markets

Resistance to antibiotics is making it difficult to treat even milder illnesses like typhoid, the incidence of which has gone up significantly in Delhi over the past few days due to increased consumption of contaminated food and water. Doctors said that while earlier oral drugs could cure most patients, they now needed to give injectable antibiotics to 20-30% of the patients to

treat typhoid symptoms. "In few cases, even the injectable drug doesn't help and we have to give add-on antibiotics to bring down fever, one of the characteristic

symptoms of typhoid," said Dr Rommel Tickoo, senior consultant, internal medicine, at Max Hospital Saket. TOI spoke to doctors at Apollo, Sir Ganga Ram (SGRH) and Safdarjung hospitals who confirmed the trend. Over-the-counter use of antibiotic is a major culprit, said Dr B K Tripathi, professor of medicine at Safdarjung Hospital. "Many patients take

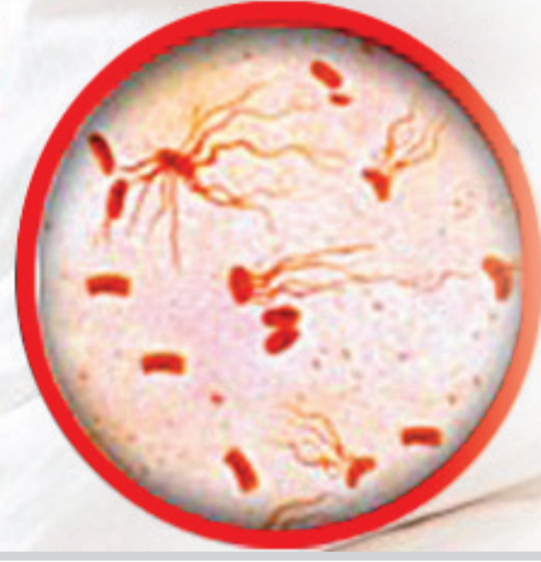
anti-fever drugs and even antibiotics on their own to treat typhoid symptoms. When it doesn't help, they rush to hospital. In many cases, both we have to put patients on both injectable drugs and add-on antibiotics," Dr Tripathi said. Typhoid, a major public health infection, is caused by Salmonella typhi bacteria and leads to symptoms such as persistently high fever, nausea, headache and abdominal pain. Earlier most people could be treated at home, but now more need to be hospitalised, increasing the cost of treatment, said doctors. "In rare cases, treatment failure

can cause severe complications and death even," a doctor said. According to Dr Atul Kakar, vice-chairperson of medicine department at SGRH, multi-drug resistance has become an emerging public health crisis. "When I was a student, we used to give chloramphenicol - a type of antibiotic - to treat typhoid. Its use was discontinued later due to high toxicity. Recently, we have observed that the same drug is sensitive to the typhoid-causing bacteria when new drugs fail. This means that we may have to go back in time and use older drugs with known side-effects if the drug-resistance pattern continues to grow like this," he said.

A research published in Journal of Global Infectious Diseases in 2010 by Safdarjung doctors had pre-empted the problem. Ciprofloxacin, they wrote, has become a norm for treating enteric fever or typhoid, but in future novel molecular substitutions (new antibiotics) may become frequent owing to irrational use of ciprofloxacin in human and veterinary therapeutics, in a population endemic with nalidixic acid-resistant strains. "The therapeutics of ciprofloxacin-resistant enteric fever narrows down to third and fourth generation cephalosporins, azithromycin, tigecycline and penems. The first-line antimicrobials ampicillin, chloramphenicol and cotrimoxazole need to be reconsidered," the microbiologists predicted further.

Preventing infections is equally important. Typhoid, for example, spreads from person to person by food and water that are contaminated with traces of infected faeces or urine. Dr Suranjit Chatterjee, senior consultant (internal medicine) at Apollo Hospital, said improved sanitation, hand hygiene and availability of clean drinking water could reduce infection rates significantly.

Apart from typhoid, medical experts say, drug resistance is also becoming a major problem in treatment of pneumonia, urinary tract infection and tuberculosis. "Over-the-counter use of antibiotics must be stopped. The government must take steps to restrict their sale so that they can be used only when needed," Dr Tickoo said.
