

Ram Rahim Has The Entire System In His Grip!

New Delhi, 27th May: The repeated parole granted to controversial Dera Sacha Sauda chief Gurmeet Ram Rahim Singh has once again triggered sharp reactions from sections of the Sikh community and human rights voices across the country. Ram Rahim, who is serving a jail sentence in serious criminal cases including rape and murder, has reportedly received parole for the 16th time, leading to widespread criticism and debate over the functioning of the justice system and alleged political influence in high-profile cases. Leaders from various Sikh organizations have expressed deep resentment, claiming that while a convicted criminal repeatedly receives relief and

special treatment, several Sikh prisoners, commonly referred to as "Bandi Sikhs," continue to remain behind bars despite allegedly completing their sentences years ago. Prominent Sikh social activist and President of All India Sikh Conference Babbar, Gurcharan Singh Babbar strongly criticized the government's approach and said that the repeated paroles to Ram Rahim have hurt the sentiments of the Sikh community across India and abroad. Speaking to media persons, Babbar alleged that Ram Rahim enjoys extraordinary influence in political corridors and that this



influence has weakened the fear of

law and accountability in the country. He said the situation has created a perception that powerful individuals can receive exceptional treatment while ordinary prisoners and minority communities continue to struggle for justice. He further stated that thousands of Sikhs, intellectuals, human rights supporters and justice-loving citizens have been continuously demanding the release of Sikh prisoners who have already completed their jail terms. However, according to him, the government has failed to respond positively to these appeals. Babbar said the issue is no longer limited to legal debate but has now become an emotional and humanitarian matter deeply connected with the sentiments of

the Sikh community worldwide. He warned that ignoring these concerns while repeatedly granting parole to controversial convicts could further increase anger and frustration among Sikhs. Raising questions over the judicial and administrative process, he demanded that the Supreme Court should take suo motu notice of the repeated paroles being granted to Ram Rahim. He also appealed to the Supreme Court Bar Association to intervene and examine the matter independently in the larger interest of justice and constitutional equality. According to Sikh organizations, the continuing delay in resolving the issue of Bandi Sikhs is creating disappointment among the community, especially among younger generations who see unequal standards being applied in

matters related to justice and parole. Political observers believe the controversy could once again ignite a national debate on prison reforms, parole policies, equal treatment under law and the handling of sensitive religious and community-related issues by governments and judicial institutions. Sikh leaders have urged the Government of India to understand the emotions and concerns of the Sikh community and take immediate humanitarian steps regarding the release of Sikh prisoners who have completed their legal sentences. They emphasized that justice must not only be done but must also be seen to be done equally for all citizens, irrespective of political influence, religion or social standing.

Karnataka power deal? Siddaramaiah's son in Cabinet, aide as Congress chief

Speculation has intensified that the Congress high command may replace Siddaramaiah with DK Shivakumar in Karnataka. The buzz has shifted attention to power-sharing talks, including roles for Satish Jarkiholi and Siddaramaiah's son Dr Yathindra.

With intense speculation that the Congress high command has finally settled the leadership tussle in Karnataka, deciding to replace Chief Minister Siddaramaiah with DK Shivakumar, the focus has now turned to backroom bargaining in the state. With Siddaramaiah pushing hard to keep the balance of power, sources said his close aide Satish Jarkiholi was the frontrunner to be the state Congress president and his son, Dr Yathindra, might be accommodated in the new Shivakumar Cabinet.

The formula is being seen as Congress's attempt to strike a balance within the Karnataka unit, with Siddaramaiah likely to get a national role. Sources said Siddaramaiah, one of Karnataka's tallest OBC leaders, has been offered a Rajya Sabha seat. He is also likely to get a larger organisational role in Delhi ahead of the 2029



Lok Sabha elections. CONGRESS'S KARNATAKA BALANCING ACT

To keep him in good stead, the Congress is likely to hand his loyalists plum posts. Sources said Shivakumar may resign as Karnataka Congress president, and Jarkiholi, a close aide of Siddaramaiah, may get the post. It will also keep

the caste equation in play as Jarkiholi belongs to the Scheduled Tribe (ST) community. Moreover, Dr Yathindra Siddaramaiah, who is presently an MLC, may be given a key post in the Shivakumar Cabinet, sources said. Siddaramaiah, a mass leader with strong public support, is likely to resign as Chief Minister as early as Thursday. To ensure a smooth transition of power, Shivakumar is scheduled to attend a breakfast meeting with Siddaramaiah at his residence in Kaveri on May 28 at 9 am. This way, the optics will be taken care of. According to sources, the formula was finalised during a marathon meeting of the Congress high command held in Delhi on Tuesday. It is believed that Rahul Gandhi, who held a one-on-one meeting with Siddaramaiah, conveyed the message to him. However, both Siddaramaiah and Shivakumar are tight-lipped on the developments.

'I Was Thrown Out': Shashi Tharoor Exposes Breach Candy Club's 'Racist' Europeans-Only Provision

Congress leader Shashi Tharoor was thrown out of Breach Candy Club in the 1960's, adding that there was no place for such 'racist' provision.

Mumbai's ultra-exclusive Breach Candy Club is facing heavy scrutiny over a controversial 'racist' policy that restricts trust membership solely to European passport holders. Amid rising public backlash, an old blog post by Congress leader Shashi Tharoor has resurfaced online. In the post, the former diplomat recalls a deeply discriminatory experience from the 1960s, detailing exactly how he was abruptly thrown out of the elite venue.

"I myself was thrown out of Breach Candy Club in Bombay in the mid '60s when an American classmate hoped he could ignore the whites and take an Indian friend along. That was India 20 years after Independence," wrote Tharoor.



Founded in 1878 as a European-only enclave in Bombay, the Breach Candy Club did not admit Indian members until the 1960s. Despite this

shift, governance remained unequal. Today, the club's constitution still restricts Trust Committee membership exclusively to European residents of Mumbai, barring Indians from leadership roles. As the tale of Tharoor's exclusion went viral, the Thiruvananthapuram MP, in a social media post, highlighted that there was no 'justification' for such a racist provision in India, especially on government land. "There is absolutely no acceptable justification for a racist provision to survive on government land. To say the club's constitution requires it is ridiculous. What about our country's constitution?" wrote Tharoor on X (formerly Twitter).

Trinamool MLA, absconding for weeks, arrested from Odisha's Puri in threats case

Trinamool MLA Dilip Mondal was arrested by the West Bengal STF from Odisha's Puri after remaining absconding for several weeks, police sources said. Mondal had been on the run since allegations surfaced against him for allegedly threatening political opponents. Police had earlier conducted raids at two properties linked to the Trinamool MLA in the Pailan area on May 14 as part of the investigation.

The arrest comes days after Mondal's son, Arghya Mondal, was arrested along with five others from the Bakkhali-Fraserganj area in South 24 Parganas on May 18 for allegedly possessing firearms. According to police, a joint team of West Bengal Police and Diamond Harbour district police carried out the operation late on Sunday. Officials said two pistols and six mobile phones were seized from the accused during the raid. All six were later brought to Diamond Harbour police station for questioning. Police also alleged that Arghya Mondal had been threatening BJP workers and supporters in the area.

Investigators had earlier described Dilip Mondal as "absconding" and said efforts were underway to trace him following complaints related to intimidation and threats against political rivals.

BACKGROUND: CRACKDOWN ON TRINAMOOL LEADERS

The arrest of Dilip Mondal comes amid an intensified crackdown by the newly formed BJP government in West Bengal on Trinamool leaders and functionaries over alleged corruption, extortion and recruitment irregularities.

In recent weeks, several Trinamool leaders, councillors and civic body officials have either been arrested or questioned by central and state agencies, triggering growing unease within the ruling All India Trinamool Congress. Former Trinamool minister Sujit Bose was arrested by the Enforcement Directorate on May 11 in connection with an alleged recruitment scam linked to the South Dum Dum Municipality. The ED booked him under provisions of the Prevention of Money Laundering Act (PMLA). The agency has also questioned former South Dum Dum Municipality chairperson Panchu Roy over alleged irregularities in civic recruitment.

Sponsoring terrorism will have consequences: India tears into Pak at UN

Speaking at the UNSC Open Debate in New York, India's Permanent Representative to the UN, Ambassador Harish Parvathaneni, accused Pakistan of decades-long support for terrorism, religious extremism and violent radicalism.

India launched a scathing attack on Pakistan at the UN Security Council (UNSC), declaring that Islamabad "will have to accept that there are consequences for sponsoring cross-border terrorism" and accusing it of decades-long support for terrorism, religious extremism and violent radicalism.

Speaking at the UNSC Open Debate in New York, India's Permanent Representative to the UN, Ambassador Harish Parvathaneni, delivered a blistering rebuttal and said, "I am compelled to respond to baseless and unwarranted remarks made by Pakistan today. India would like to set the facts straight."



The Indian envoy said Pakistan's record since Independence had been marked by aggression against India and continued sponsorship of terrorism "Independent India began its life battling with cross-border aggression by Pakistan, which coveted Indian territories that had become a part of India as a

result of their complete, legal and irrevocable accession," he said.

Parvathaneni accused Pakistan of repeatedly violating the principles of sovereignty, territorial integrity and peaceful coexistence through wars, unprovoked aggression and terror activities directed against India.

"The use of cross-border terrorism by Pakistan and its doctrine of 'bleeding India by a thousand cuts' exposes its hollow rhetoric of commitment to the UN Charter," he said.

The envoy strongly asserted that "India has every right to defend itself from such cross-border terrorism. Pakistan will have to accept that there are consequences of its sponsorship of cross-border terrorism" across the border. He also accused Pakistan of systematically

fostering extremist forces since its creation.

"Pakistan's harnessing of the malevolent forces of terrorism, religious extremism, violent radicalism, and anti-India rhetoric has continued unabated since its creation," Parvathaneni said.

"The facts in this regard are on public record and need no further elucidation. Pakistan must credibly and irrevocably end its support for all forms of terrorism," he added. The envoy's latest remarks come barely a week after the envoy had rebuked Pakistan at another UNSC debate on the protection of civilians in armed conflict. During that debate as well, Pakistan had attempted to raise Jammu and Kashmir, prompting a forceful response from the Indian side.

Trader out to buy food injured in hit & run in Gurgaon

GURGAON.(Agency)

A 26-year-old grocery shop owner suffered severe head injuries after an unidentified speeding vehicle hit his moped near Sector 37 late on May 21 and fled the spot.

The victim, Laxman Mandal, a native of Bihar who runs a grocery shop in Anjana Colony, has remained unconscious since the accident and is undergoing treatment at Safdarjung Hospital in Delhi.

According to a complaint filed by his cousin Shankar Kumar at Sector 10A police station, Laxman had left around 11.30 pm on his TVS moped to bring food from Sector 37. While returning near Plot No. 368, an unidentified vehicle allegedly rammed into his two-wheeler, throwing him onto the road. "The unknown vehicle driver was driving at high speed and negligently. After causing the accident, he fled from the spot," the complainant stated in the FIR.

Shankar said he rushed to the spot after receiving information and took his cousin to Govt Hospital, Sector 10, where doctors provided initial treatment before referring him to a higher medical centre due to the severity of his injuries. He was later shifted to Safdarjung Hospital. Police said the medico-legal report prepared at the hospital documented three major injuries. A case was registered under Sections 281 (rash driving) and 125(a) of the BNS, and police are examining CCTV footage to identify the offending vehicle. In another case, Prashant, a 22-year-old electrician from Jharsa, remains critical after his motorcycle crashed into a car allegedly parked without warning indicators on NH-48 near Narsinghpur around 1 am on Sunday.

According to his father Subhash Singh, Prashant was returning from IMT Manesar when the accident occurred. Police found the Tata electric vehicle parked

Respite from warm nights, but heatwave alert stays

The city continued to reel under intense heat on Tuesday, with the maximum temperature rising to 43.4°C, up from 41.6°C recorded a day earlier, as heatwave conditions persisted across Haryana.

Despite a sharp rise in daytime temperature, the city witnessed comparatively cooler nights. The minimum temperature dropped to 24.2°C on Tuesday, seven notches below 31.2°C recorded on Monday.

IMD said heatwave conditions were observed at isolated places across Haryana, with Sirsa recording the state's highest maximum temperature at 46°C. Warm night conditions were also reported from some pockets.

District-wise warnings issued by the weather department placed Gurgaon under a "be prepared" heat alert for May 26 and 27, indicating the likelihood of continued heatwave-like conditions over the next two days.

However, IMD forecast a change in weather from May 28 under the influence of a western disturbance. Thunderstorms accompanied by lightning and gusty winds are likely in Gurgaon and several other districts between May 28 and May 30, which may lead to a gradual fall in temperatures.

The weather department advised residents to avoid direct exposure to the sun during peak afternoon hours, stay hydrated and take precautions against heat-related illnesses, particularly children, elderly people and those with existing health conditions.

3k Haryana students to take ISRO tour for space science sessions

Haryana will send around 3,000 meritorious students from classes 9 to 12 to various centres of Indian Space Research Organisation between Aug and Dec this year, officials said. The visits will be conducted in multiple batches and will provide students exposure to space science, satellite systems and rocket technology. The programme is being implemented under the Samagra Shiksha Haryana scheme to promote scientific learning among school students. Officials said the initiative has been expanded following a pilot programme in 2025-



26, during which 198 students and 12 teachers visited ISRO facilities in Ahmedabad. The state govt bore all expenses for the tour.

Explaining the selection process, the project coordinator (science) of the scheme, Sonali Vohra, said students would be selected district-wise based on academic performance. "The first batch will include district toppers across different schools, followed by second- and third-rank holders in subsequent batches. Around 88 students from each district, along with teachers, are expected to participate, taking the total close to 3,000," she said. Vohra added that the programme includes toppers from classes 8 to 11 who are now studying in classes 9 to 12, particularly in the science stream, to ensure continuity in scientific exposure.

Meanwhile, four Haryana students are currently visiting Japan under the Sakura Science Exchange Program. Officials said the students — all Class 12 state toppers — include two from Fatehabad and one each from Bhiwani and Mahendragarh. They left India on May 24 and are scheduled to return on May 30. "These students are getting exposure to Japan's advanced science education and innovation ecosystem, which is a valuable learning experience," Vohra said. Swapnil Rajender Patil, state project director of the scheme, said such programmes help improve scientific temperament and broaden students' global outlook.

Doorstep waste pickup still erratic as Gurgaon readies for Swachh survey

A team from the Swachh Survekshan has begun a cleanliness survey in the city to assess sanitation and waste management systems ahead of the national rankings.

In 2025, the city jumped from 140th position in 2024 to 41st rank nationally in the category of cities with populations between three lakh and 10 lakh.

Despite the improvement, persistent gaps in the city's waste management system continue to raise concerns. Gurgaon currently does not have a dedicated long-term agency handling door-to-door waste collection across the city, leading to repeated disruptions in sanitation services. Residents across several sectors and colonies have complained of irregular garbage collection, delayed lifting of waste, and poor monitoring of sanitation operations. During the coming surveys, teams that will cover all 36 wards commenced from Ward 1, comprising Nathupur village, DLF Phase 3, National Media Centre, Ambience Island, Garden Estate, DLF

Corporate Park, Sikanderpur Ghosi, Blocks J and Q of DLF Phase 2, and Belvedere Towers, among other areas.

MCG officials said the inspection exercise is expected to continue for at least a week, during which survey teams will conduct field inspections, interact with residents and sanitation workers, and assess the condition of public spaces, waste collection systems and sanitation infrastructure.

"We have submitted a report to the team, which they will verify during their field assessment. Their assessment will include doorstep waste collection, sewerage system, besides other sanitation works," said a senior MCG official. Gurgaon will be assessed on parameters carrying a total of 10,500 marks. The survey will evaluate visible cleanliness across roads, markets and



residential colonies, segregation, collection and transportation of waste, solid waste management practices, access to sanitation facilities, used water management, mechanisation of desludging services, advocacy and awareness campaigns related to

cleanliness, institutional strengthening, welfare of sanitation workers, and citizen feedback and grievance redressal. The assessment will also focus on garbage vulnerable points, scientific processing of waste, upkeep of public toilets, and public participation in cleanliness drives. According to the city's Swachh Survekshan report card in 2025, door-to-door waste collection coverage fell sharply from 85% in 2024 to 59% in 2025, highlighting the impact of the

administrative transition and operational gaps. Concerns over unsegregated waste, overflowing garbage points, and inadequate monitoring continue to persist despite repeated assurances from the civic body.

How to ease IGI travel? GMDA proposes longer NH-8 bypass

As congestion on NH8 and roads leading to IGI Airport only gets worse, agencies in the city are examining the possibility of extending a proposed Gurgaon-Delhi connector through Mahipalpur to Ghata Chowk on Southern Peripheral Road (SPR). The proposal was discussed at a meeting on Tuesday, chaired by GMDA CEO PC Meena. Officials from Gurgaon Metro Rail Ltd, GMDA, NHAI's consultant and other departments held discussions on proposals submitted by Delhi International Airport Limited (DIAL) to identify long-term traffic decongestion measures around IGI Airport and key Gurgaon corridors.

NHAI has planned a 20-km six-lane corridor from AIIMS in Delhi to Gurgaon-Faridabad Road via Mahipalpur. Officials said the connectivity till Khushboo Chowk is already part of the proposed NHAI decongestion plan, and GMDA has now suggested studying its further extension till Ghata Chowk to create a wider bypass-like movement corridor for commuters travelling from south Delhi towards southern Gurgaon and Jaipur-bound

routes without the need to enter NH8. A separate meeting with senior NHAI officials will be held soon to deliberate on the proposal, possible alignments and feasibility aspects, the GMDA official said.

A senior GMDA official said, "The



proposed connectivity till Khushboo Chowk is already under consideration by NHAI. GMDA has now requested NHAI to examine whether it can be extended further till Ghata Chowk so that the alternative route could function like a ring-road connectivity for through traffic, reducing dependence on NH8 and easing pressure on key bottlenecks near the airport. For instance, traffic coming from south Delhi towards Jaipur can access Delhi-Mumbai Expressway through the

proposed Greater Southern Peripheral Road or SPR. "Officials said the idea is to reduce dependency on the heavily congested NH8 stretch near IGI Airport by creating alternative movement corridors for through traffic. "The objective is to reduce pressure on NH8 and improve dispersal of traffic coming from the Delhi side towards Gurgaon and Jaipur-bound routes without forcing vehicles to enter city bottlenecks," the official added.

Other proposals, including elevated corridors and a grade separator at Rezag La Chowk connecting Dwarka Expressway and NH8, were also discussed, though officials clarified that most suggestions remain at a preliminary conceptual stage and are yet to undergo detailed feasibility assessment.

DIAL also presented proposals including extension of Dwarka Expressway till Mayapuri, extension of Barapullah Road from INA till Mahipalpur, extension of UER-II till Tughlakabad and construction of a bypass at Rangpuri. But GMDA officials clarified that these projects fall

Amid rent row, 2 on scooter fire 10 rounds at vacant house

Two unidentified persons on a scooter fired more than 10 rounds at a vacant house in Sahibabad on Monday. Police found a chit bearing the threat, 'Agli baari teri' (You are next) in the front yard of a neighbour. The property's owner, based in Delhi, has been pursuing a rent recovery case at the ADM court against former tenant Sanjay Gupta, who vacated the premises three months ago after allegedly defaulting on rent for more than 18 months. The house owner Asha Rani's son, Sachin Kumar, filed a complaint at the Sahibabad police station. He told the cops that around 11 pm on Monday, two unidentified men opened fire at our house. "I suspect our

former tenant, Sanjay Gupta, is behind it. A piece of paper has been found in the house of our neighbour Bharat Singh. It bears a threat message," he said. Sachin said he had rented out the house to Sanjay Gupta in 2024. In 2025, when he asked him to vacate the house, he refused and stopped paying rent. He took the matter to the ADM court. On the court's order, Gupta vacated the house in March 2026, and Sachin filed a case against him for the recovery of outstanding rent. "A hearing was scheduled for the case on Tuesday," he said. According to eyewitnesses, the men fired several rounds in quick succession. The sudden firing created panic in the area. A car parked near an adjacent house was also

damaged. A police team found 12 empty cartridges at the spot. A forensic team also collected evidence. An initial investigation linked the matter to the old rivalry and the dispute over vacating the house. ACP Amit Saxena said information about the firing was received around 11 pm. They reached out to the house owner Asha Rani, who lives in Shahdara. An FIR has been registered against Sanjay Gupta and unidentified persons under sections 125 (act endangering life or personal safety or others) and 351(2) (punishment for criminal intimidation) of BNS. "Teams have been formed to nab the accused while police teams are also checking the CCTV cameras of the nearby areas.

Special public prosecutor Utkarsh Vats said the survivor's account was reliable and consistent, with no contradiction between her statement recorded under Section 164 CrPC and her deposition before the court. "Her evidence is corroborated by the testimony of the plaintiff and the investigating officer," he said. The examining doctor, Sonia Sehgal, testified that the survivor had an abrasion on the inner thigh and that medical examination indicated vaginal intercourse, with redness and swelling in the internal parts. The defence contended that the FSL report did not establish a match between the male-specific allele recovered from the survivor and the accused, and argued he

First batch yet to hit Gurgaon roads, GMCBL seeks 500 more e-buses to plug commute gaps

Even as the first batch of electric buses is yet to hit the city roads, GMCBL has started the process to expand its planned fleet. GMCBL has sought 500 more electric buses from the Centre to address the city's widening public transport deficit. Officials said GMCBL — through MCG — has submitted the requirement proposal for additional electric buses to the ministry of housing and urban affairs (MoHUA) under the Urban Challenge Fund. This comes amid growing concerns over inadequate public transport infrastructure in the city, where commuters continue to rely heavily on private vehicles and app-based cabs due to the unreliable bus services, worsening congestion and pollution levels. According to officials, the proposal has been prepared keeping in view the city's growing population, rising vehicular congestion and the need to strengthen urban mobility and last-mile connectivity.

GMCBL CEO Vishwajeet Choudhary told TOI, "The proposal has been submitted to improve urban mobility and ensure accessible, end-to-end public transport connectivity across the city. With the expansion of urban areas, efforts are being made to improve the city bus fleet



and provide reliable public transport to commuters." As per MoHUA guidelines, cities with a population above 20 lakh should have at least 50 buses per lakh population to ensure adequate public transport coverage. With Gurgaon's population estimated to be nearly 25 lakh, the city ideally requires around 1,250 buses. However, it is currently managing barely over 12% of the required fleet strength.

At present, GMCBL has around 200 buses, of which 50 are currently operating in

Faridabad following directions from the state govt.

With fewer than 150 buses effectively available for Gurgaon, public transport coverage remains sparse in several parts of the city. Many of the existing buses are ageing and prone to frequent breakdowns, affecting service reliability and commuter confidence.

GMCBL officials said that the first batch of e-buses is likely to be added to the fleet by next month. The city saw the last addition of eight CNG buses equipped with AC in

2021. In Feb, the state govt approved the acquisition of electric buses for Gurgaon.

Delhi braces for severe heatwave as mercury may hit 45°C

New Delhi: The Capital is staring at an intense spell of heat this week, with the India Meteorological Department (IMD) warning that temperatures in Delhi could climb close to 45 degrees Celsius over the next few days.

Cials said hot winds and unusually warm nights were likely to add to public discomfort, especially during afternoon hours. On Sunday, Delhi recorded a maximum temperature of 41.9 degrees Celsius, while the minimum settled at 25.9 degrees Celsius.

for Tuesday and Wednesday, warning of heatwave conditions across the Capital. During this period, maximum temperatures are expected to hover around 44 degrees Celsius, while minimum temperatures

may remain between 27 and 28 degrees Celsius. The IMD usually declares a heatwave in plains such as Delhi when temperatures cross 40 degrees Celsius and remain significantly above normal lev-

els.

UNSC must be a living instrument, not a fossil: India renews call for reforms, expansion of Security Council

New York . (Agency)

India on Tuesday reiterated its call for reforms at the United Nations, stressing the need to enhance the organisation's productivity and effectiveness, and highlighting that it cannot address contemporary global challenges while remaining frozen in an architecture designed in the 1940s.

The remarks were made by Ambassador Harish Parvathaneni at the UN Security Council Open Debate on 'Upholding the Purposes and Principles of the UN Charter and Strengthening the UN-centered International System'.

He presented India's suggestions to reinforce a UN-centered international system and said that these include strengthening the General Assembly of the body; undertaking meaningful reforms, expanding the UNSC to reflect contemporary geopolitical realities, and making its functioning more transparent and accountable. "The wider UN membership is an important stakeholder on all Security Council matters. Denying access to historical and contemporary documents and maintaining the rules of procedure at a provisional status are not tenable in this age. The working methods must be refashioned appropriately in tune with our times", he said.

Ambassador Parvathaneni further stated, "The UN Security Council must be a living instrument, not a fossil. More than any other member state, the permanent members must deliberate on this matter."

The Ambassador highlighted how the present-day geopolitical developments have strained multilateralism, thus growing concerns towards the legitimacy, efficacy and relevance of the United Nations. He noted that while the UN Charter had mandated a review conference in 1955, no such review was ever undertaken.

Trump signals "PERFECT" health after medical checkup

Washington.(Agency)

US President Donald Trump on Tuesday said that he has completed his six-month physical examination at the Walter Reed Military Medical Center, declaring that all results were "perfect".

In a post on Truth Social, Trump thanked the doctors and medical staff for their care, adding that the check-up went smoothly and reaffirming his health status.

"Just finished my 6 month physical at Walter Reed Military Medical Center. Everything checked out PERFECTLY. Thank you to the great Doctors and Staff! Heading back to the White House. President DJT", he said.

This was Trump's third visit to Walter Reed National Military Medical Center will for a medical exam since becoming the oldest president ever inaugurated last year, CNN reported.

Citing The White House, it added that the check-up would include "routine annual dental and medical assessments," despite him having already visited a dentist in Florida twice this year.

Last year in July, Trump, who is now 79, was diagnosed with a "benign and common" vein condition known as chronic venous insufficiency after he noticed swelling in his legs. Since his return to the White House, Trump has been spotted with several visible ailments. Quoting the White House, CNN reported that the swelling in his ankles that was revealed last summer was a result of chronic venous insufficiency, a common issue related to age.

The bruises on Trump's hands, which are often seen covered with thick makeup, occur because he takes a large dose of aspirin -- higher than his doctors recommend -- and shakes many hands, the White House said.

India gifts 10 prisoner carrier trucks to Nepal

Ten prisoner carrier trucks were ceremonially handed over by Consul General Devi Sahai Meena to Bhola Dahal, Chief District Officer, Parsa, Government of Nepal, at an event held in Birgunj on Tuesday.

This is a part of supplies by the Government of India that have helped enhance Nepal's capacities related to law enforcement.

In his remarks, Bhola Dahal thanked the Indian side for the gifted trucks and conveyed his appreciation for the comprehensive and mutually beneficial nature of cooperation between the two countries, according to an official release. Earlier this year, the Government of India had gifted about 640 vehicles - including SUVs, pickups and trucks- to Nepal as part of the assistance requested by the Government of Nepal for the House of Representatives elections held on 5 March 2026.

In previous years, more than 2,000 vehicles were gifted by the Government of India to security agencies, including the Nepal Police, Armed Police Force, and Nepali Army, the release stated.

The ongoing cooperation and support from the Indian side reflect the multi-faceted and multisectoral development partnership that exists between both countries. It also symbolises the deep mutual trust and friendship between the people of India and Nepal. Last month, the foundation stone for the construction of a school in Nepal's Far-Western region with Indian assistance was laid.

Issuing a press release, the Indian Embassy stated that the foundation stone was laid for the construction of the building of Shree Basuki Secondary School in Mellekh Rural Municipality-4 of Achham district in Sudurpaschim Province of Nepal.

As per the embassy, the foundation stone was jointly laid by Narayan Singh, First Secretary, Embassy of India, Kathmandu, and Jwala Singh Saud, Chairman of Mellekh Rural Municipality.

Biden sues Justice Department to block release of private interview audio

Joe Biden has sued the US Department of Justice to stop the release of audio recordings and transcripts of private interviews with his biographer. The move comes before the department's planned handover of the materials to the House Judiciary Committee and the Heritage Foundation.

Washington.(Agency)

Former Democratic US President Joe Biden sued the US Department of Justice on Tuesday, seeking to bar the release of audio recordings and transcripts of private conversations with his biographer in 2016 and 2017.

The lawsuit, filed in federal court in Washington DC, comes ahead of the department's planned June 15 release of the materials to the US House Judiciary Committee and the conservative Heritage Foundation.

The foundation sought them after they were used as part of then-Special Counsel Robert Hur's 2023 investigation into Biden's handling of classified documents. Hur declined to bring criminal charges.

The department fought the Heritage Foundation's 2024 request for the records as exempt from the Freedom of



Information Act until President Donald Trump took office, the lawsuit claims. It announced it would be releasing the records in response to the committee's

request, which the lawsuit claims is meant only to skirt federal law barring their release.

The lawsuit asks the court to declare the

committee's request pretextual and invalid, and permanently bar the release of the records to the committee.

Representatives for the Department of Justice did not immediately respond to a request for comment.

The recordings, made in Biden's home, were part of the writing process for his 2017 memoir, "Promise Me, Dad: A Year of Hope, Hardship, and Purpose," which detailed Biden's decision to pursue the presidency while his eldest son Beau fought brain cancer.

Earlier this month, Biden sought to intervene in the Heritage Foundation's lawsuit against the Justice Department over the materials. Last week, a judge allowed Biden to join the case but barred him from pursuing claims about the committee's request for the materials, according to court records.

Ex-JPMorgan banker's lawyer resigns ahead of sex assault lawsuit hearing

Former JPMorgan banker Chirayu Rana faced a major setback on Tuesday after his attorney Daniel Kaiser abruptly withdrew from representing him just hours before a scheduled court appearance tied to his explosive lawsuit against the banking giant and a senior executive.

According to sources cited in The New York Post and The Wall Street Journal, court filings showed that the attorney formally requested to be discharged from the case, leaving Rana temporarily without legal representation.

The surprise exit came shortly before a New York court hearing where Rana was expected to fight for the right to continue proceeding anonymously under the name "John

Doe". According to the filing, Rana currently has no replacement lawyer and will represent himself "pro se" unless he hires new counsel.

earlier this year accusing senior executive Lorna Hajdini of sexually assaulting and abusing him during his time at the bank.

The lawsuit also alleged that Rana experienced racism and retaliation within JPMorgan's leveraged finance division. JPMorgan and Hajdini have strongly denied the accusations.

In a formal court filing submitted last week, JPMorgan described Rana's allegations as "false and malicious".

The bank stated that it "denies that Plaintiff was sexually assaulted, harassed, discriminated or retaliated against". JPMorgan also said it reserved the right to pursue its own claims against Rana over alleged wrongdoing.

Iran accuses US of violating ceasefire with Hormuz strikes

Fresh US strikes near the Strait of Hormuz prompted Iran to accuse Washington of breaching the ceasefire. The incident has clouded talks on shipping, frozen assets and wider regional de-escalation.

Fresh US strikes near the Strait of Hormuz have drawn sharp condemnation from Iran, threatening to derail a fragile ceasefire and complicate ongoing negotiations aimed at ending the conflict that has disrupted global oil supplies and regional stability.

Iran's foreign ministry accused the United States of violating the nearly seven-week-old ceasefire after attacks in Hormozgan province early Tuesday. Iranian media reported explosions in the area, while Washington described the operation as

defensive, saying it targeted missile positions and boats allegedly attempting to lay naval mines near the strategic waterway.

US Secretary of State Marco Rubio said negotiations to secure a broader agreement could still take "a few days", despite earlier signs of progress between Tehran and Washington on an initial framework intended to halt hostilities and restore maritime traffic through the Strait of Hormuz.

FROZEN FUNDS EMERGE AS KEY STICKING POINT

The proposed preliminary agreement would reportedly establish a 30-day framework to reopen shipping routes and reduce fighting across the region, while leaving more difficult issues such as Iran's nuclear programme for later talks.

Iranian negotiators are also seeking the release of roughly \$24 billion in frozen Iranian assets as part of the deal, according to Iranian media reports. Reports said the issue has emerged as the main unresolved obstacle in efforts to finalise the

memorandum of understanding between Tehran and Washington. Iran has also pushed for an end to hostilities in Lebanon, where fighting between Israeli forces and



Hezbollah militants has continued despite an April ceasefire.

OIL MARKETS REACT TO HORMUZ TENSIONS
The conflict, which began with US and Israeli strikes on Iran in late February, has severely disrupted energy markets. Traffic through the Strait of Hormuz—a key route for nearly one-fifth of global oil and liquefied natural gas trade—remains far

below normal levels.

Iran's Revolutionary Guards said 25 oil tankers and commercial vessels crossed the strait with Iranian permission over the past 24 hours. However, tensions escalated further after the Guards claimed Iranian air defences downed one US drone and engaged another drone and a fighter jet over the Gulf region.

Global oil markets reacted sharply, with Brent crude prices rising around 3.5 percent to nearly \$100 per barrel amid fears of prolonged supply disruptions.

REGIONAL CONFLICT SHOWS NO SIGNS OF EASING

Iran's Supreme Leader Mojtaba Khamenei declared that anti-US and anti-Israel slogans would continue to define the Islamic Republic's stance, saying "the clock cannot be turned back".

Meanwhile, Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu said Israel was expanding military operations in Lebanon, where clashes with Hezbollah have continued despite the truce announced earlier this year.

Israel pushes ground ops beyond security zone after massive strikes in Lebanon

Israel pounded Lebanon with more than 120 air strikes on Tuesday in one of the heaviest days of bombing in weeks, Lebanese security sources said, as Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu said his military was deepening its operations in the country.

The bombing raids further frayed a tenuous ceasefire announced on April 16 that was meant to halt fighting between Israel and Lebanese armed group Hezbollah, and came as Iran said the United States had violated a separate truce by striking southern Iran. Lebanese security sources told Reuters that Israeli strikes had hit across southern and eastern Lebanon on Tuesday. Lebanon's National News Agency said at least 10 people, including women and children, were killed in one strike on the town of Burj al-Shamali in southern Lebanon.

Some strikes hit near the Beaufort Castle, a nearly 900-year-old fortress in southern Lebanon that UNESCO has described as one of the best-preserved examples of medieval castles in the region. At least three strikes also hit near Lebanon's largest water reservoir at the Qaraoun Dam in east Lebanon, Lebanon's National News Agency said.

In a statement on Tuesday, Netanyahu said the Israeli military "is operating with large forces in the field and capturing and controlling areas."

"We are fortifying the security strip to protect the northern communities," he said in a reference to a self-declared security zone occupied by Israeli troops several kilometres inside southern Lebanon.

HEZBOLLAH FIRES AT ISRAELI TANKS

Two sources said on Tuesday that the Israeli military had expanded its ground operations in southern Lebanon past the security zone but gave no further details on the extent of the advance beyond the so-called Yellow Line.

That line, separate from the U.N.-demarcated "Blue Line" marking the frontier between Lebanon and Israel after Israel's withdrawal in 2000, forms part of a proposed buffer zone extending 5 km to 10 km (3 miles to 6 miles) into southern Lebanon. Israel's military had ordered residents not to return to dozens of villages in the zone, and its troops have been destroying homes in the area.

An Israeli military official said the military was "operating in a targeted manner beyond the Forward Defense Line in order to remove direct threats to the citizens of the State of Israel" and Israeli soldiers, "in accordance with the directives of the political echelon."

Netanyahu said on Monday Israel would intensify its strikes against Hezbollah, while a U.S. official said the Iran-backed group had ignored warnings to halt attacks that risked undermining negotiations to end the U.S.-Israeli war on Iran.

For Telangana lorry operators, fuel hikes are 'slow poison'

HYDERABAD.(Agency)

Every few days, the numbers on fuel station boards change again. For most commuters, it may mean spending a little extra to fill a bike or car tank. But for thousands of lorry owners and drivers across Telangana, each small diesel hike is becoming a question of survival.

With diesel prices now touching Rs 103.74 per litre and petrol at Rs 115.58, transporters say the repeated increases are quietly pushing the road transport sector into a financial squeeze from which many small operators may not recover. Transporters describe the rising fuel prices as "slow poison" for the industry.

"A heavy vehicle travelling nearly 700 km a day consumes around 250 litres of diesel. With the latest increase alone, operators are spending nearly Rs 2,500 extra every day," said Telangana Lorry Union president Rajender Reddy.

For small and single-lorry owners, the impact is sharper. Many say they are caught between rising operational costs and transport contractors who largely dictate freight rates. "If diesel prices rise sharply once, we can revise charges accordingly. But when prices go up by Rs 2 or Rs 3 every week, we cannot keep increasing freight charges," Rajender Reddy said. Lorry owner Rajanna said transport contractors largely control freight pricing, leaving vehicle owners with poor returns and little bargaining power. With nearly 6.6 lakh commercial vehicles on Telangana roads and 65-70% of goods transport dependent on lorries, transporters warn rising fuel costs could soon force many operators out of business.

Ahmedabad: Arson, vandalism flare up after Satellite murder tension

Mumbai . (Agency)

Tension following a murder in Satellite area earlier this month appears to have led into incidents of arson and vandalism, with two separate complaints lodged at Satellite police station on Monday alleging that unidentified persons set houses and a CNG autorickshaw on fire in Rajivnagar area.

In the first complaint, a 65-year-old homemaker alleged that a mob of around 15 unidentified persons broke into her locked house in Rajivnagar Division-2 near Shakti School around 3am on May 25 and set the property on fire, causing damage estimated at nearly Rs 1 lakh.

According to the complaint, the woman and her relatives had temporarily shifted to their native village after the murder of a local resident on May 2 triggered tension in the locality. She stated that relatives and associates of the deceased had allegedly been visiting the area and creating disturbances, prompting the family to keep the house locked and move out for safety.

The complainant said she received a call from a neighbour informing her that a group had broken the lock of her residence and set household belongings on fire. On reaching the spot, she found furniture, bedding, fans, a television set, a water motor and a sewing machine partially burnt. Locals also informed her that fires had been reported at a few other houses in the locality.

13,000 students who passed Classes 10, 12 finals to retake Gujarat board exams for better marks

Ahmedabad.(Agency)

Over 13,000 students who already cleared their board exams will reappear for the Gujarat Secondary and Higher Secondary Education Board (GSHSEB) supplementary exams from June 11 to June 20 to boost their scores under the state's "Best of Two" policy.

This trend is driven primarily by Class 12 science students, with around 11,000 candidates aiming to improve their percentile ranks to secure seats in premier medical, paramedical, and engineering colleges. Additionally, nearly 2,000 Class 10 students and 400 Class 12 general stream students will reappear for a score upgrade.

Overall, approximately 1.94 lakh students have registered for the supplementary exams this year. This includes 1.23 lakh Class 10 students, nearly 30,000 from Class 12 science, and over 40,000 from the general stream. Major urban centres account for the bulk of the candidates. Ahmedabad leads with over 28,000 students, followed by Surat (over 16,000), Vadodra (over 13,000), and Rajkot (over 8,000).

The evaluation process will begin on a priority immediately after the exams conclude on June 20. The board aims to declare results early to ensure students can secure timely higher education admissions for the current academic year. All administrative arrangements at exam centres have been completed.

Unusually warmer nights increasing faster in Mumbai than hotter days: CEEW analysis

Mumbai .(Agency)

Hot days and warm nights have both increased in Mumbai, driven by a combination of global warming and urbanisation. But warm nights have increased much more sharply, according to an analysis of IMD data by the Council on Energy, Environment and Water (CEEW).

The number of 'unusually warm nights' in a year more than doubled from an average of 12 nights in 1981-2010 to 26 in 2011-2024, according to CEEW's analysis.

Unusually hot days also rose in this period, but not quite as sharply, increasing from an average of 12 days a year to 18 days a year in the same period.

An unusually hot day or warm night is defined as one in which local temperatures are higher than on 90% of days or nights recorded during 1981-2010. The trend has implications for the city's health and productivity. "Poor nighttime cooling disrupts sleep and recovery, especially for people doing physically demanding outdoor



work," said CEEW analyst Vishwas Chitale. In coastal cities like Mumbai, high humidity also makes it harder for the body to cool itself through sweating, he noted. "Warmer nights prevent recovery from intense daytime heat, increasing the risk of heat exhaustion and heat stroke while worsening conditions such as diabetes and hypertension."

Globally, temperatures are rising as greenhouse-gas emissions from burning coal, oil and gas warm the atmosphere. India's

mean temperature has increased by about 0.9°C since 1901. But urbanisation amplifies this warming. That's because the asphalt and concrete of cities trap heat during the day and release it at night — part of a phenomenon known as the 'urban heat island' effect.

Across India, the rise in warm nights has been greatest in densely populated districts housing tier 1 and tier 2 cities like Mumbai, Delhi, Chennai and Jaipur, according to CEEW. Interestingly, CEEW's analysis also reveals a seasonal trend for the city. While minimum temperatures rose across all seasons, the increase was sharpest in the post-monsoon months between Oct-Dec. In summer, average minimum temperatures rose by around 0.5°C in 2011-2024, compared with 1981-2010, similar to the daytime maximum increase of 0.4°C. But in the post-monsoon months, average minimum temperatures rose much more sharply — by 0.8°C, compared to a 0.1°C rise in daytime maximum.

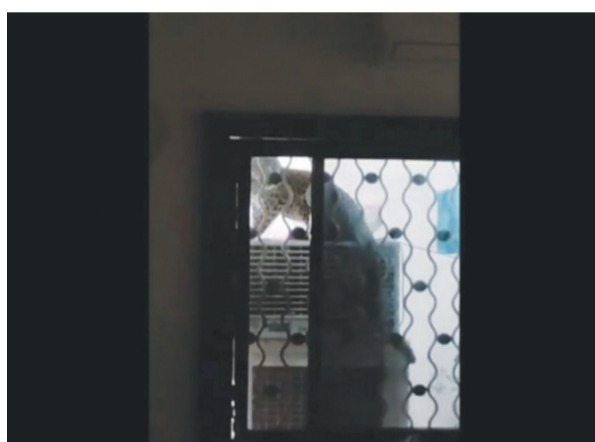
Leopard strays into residential area in Maharashtra's Amravati; safely rescued after joint rescue operation

Amravati. (Agency)

A leopard cub entered a residential locality in Maharashtra's Amravati district, triggering panic among residents before it was safely rescued after a joint operation by police and civic authorities.

According to officials, the leopard—estimated to be around nine to ten months old—was spotted in the Rampuri Camp area of Amravati on Tuesday.

A rescue team comprising local police personnel and staff from the Amravati Municipal Corporation immediately reached the spot and launched an operation to safely capture the animal. The rescue operation lasted around two to three hours. Meanwhile, amid the ongoing heatwave in Odisha, the administration of Nandankanan Zoological Park in Bhubaneswar has implemented an



extensive summer management plan to protect animals and ensure visitor comfort. The zoo, home to around 169 species and nearly 4,000 animals, has introduced species-specific cooling measures to help them cope with rising temperatures and prolonged exposure to extreme weather conditions.

For large carnivores such as tigers, lions,

leopards and bears, shaded resting spaces, water pools and ponds have been arranged inside enclosures. Foggers and mist spray systems have also been installed to reduce heat stress. Primates are being given water-rich fruits in addition to their regular diet, while bird enclosures have been equipped with abundant water and cooling spots.

The zoo administration has also stepped up arrangements for visitors by setting up multiple drinking water points with cold water, along with fans and mist foggers in high-footfall areas such as entrances.

The measures come as Odisha continues to reel under severe heatwave conditions. The India Meteorological Department has issued orange alerts for several districts, warning that extreme temperatures are likely to persist through May 28. Jharsuguda recorded 45.2 degrees Celsius earlier this week, with temperatures in several areas remaining above normal and prompting health advisories across the state.

Hit by desertions and dissent, BJD faces a battle for survival

The BJD finds itself at a critical juncture with yet another senior leader, former Rajya Sabha MP Debashish Samantaray quitting the party and joining the BJP on Tuesday.

The immediate fallout of Samantaray's relinquishing the Rajya Sabha seat is that the BJD's number in the Upper House has further reduced to five, diminishing the party's presence at the national level.

After the 2024 election debacle, three Rajya Sabha MPs including Mamata Mahanta, Sujeet Kumar and now Samantaray have left the party for BJP. The string of exits from BJD exposes a deep internal turmoil within the party. The BJD seems to have not been able to restabilise itself even after two years of the 2024 debacle. The promised reflection of the reasons, organisational shake-up to revitalise the party and a course correction have



not materialised. Senior leaders continue to feel sidelined with the party apparatus being run by comparatively junior-level functionaries controlled by the same powers that be. Despite party president Naveen Patnaik's attempts to lead from the front as has been reflected on various recent issues, there is no abatement of the resentment among leaders over party affairs. This was openly displayed during the recent biennial Rajya Sabha election when as

many as six MLAs cross-voted defying the whip to vote for BJD's second candidate.

A senior leader disclosed that there is severe dissatisfaction within the party ranks over the manner in which it is being run. "The situation has again come to the pre-2024 period when party president's close aide VK Pandian was running the show. There is no change. Many leaders and workers feel that Pandian is still in charge albeit behind the scene. This has created a division in the party. Though the situation remains manageable, the restlessness among the party leaders is growing," he cautioned. He said, with panchayat election less than a year away, the party has an urgent job of stopping the exodus at the grassroots level. "However, the leadership continues to be in a denial mode. BJP is framing the exits as BJD is a sinking ship. The perception is gaining ground," he said.

'Custodial torture, illegal detention' haunt cops, locals gherao Cuttack's Barang police station

Barang police continued to witness protest with around 50 women belonging to Chandi Prasad village staging demonstration in front of the police station on Tuesday alleging custodial torture on Rakesh Behera who was detained in connection with the recovery of half-buried woman's body from the bed of Kathajodi river.

Alleging that Rakesh was illegally detained even after confirmation that it was not his wife's body, the agitators demanded an inquiry into the incident, treatment and compensation.

The women even tried to enter the police station but police station gate was locked up from inside following which the protesters staged a dharna in front of the entrance.

One platoon police has been deployed to prevent any untoward incident. Speaking to mediapersons, Cuttack DCP Khilari Rishikesh Dnyandeo said a probe would be conducted into the allegations by verifying the CCTV footage and action initiated basing on the outcome of the investigation. Rakesh was detained by police on May 21 after half-buried body of a woman was recovered from the bed of river Kathajodi near Brahmanigaon. Incidentally, his wife had become untraceable on May 15 and he had filed a missing person report the next day which attracted police attention. His family alleged that Rakesh was detained despite police being informed that his wife was in Delhi.

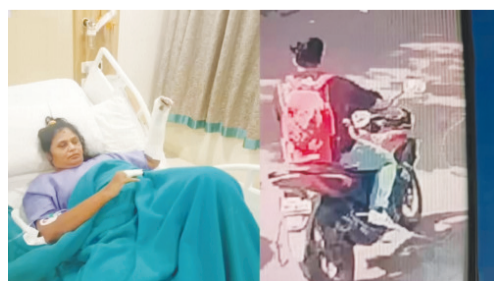
Woman journalist injured in hit-and-run in Navi Mumbai, biker escapes

A Navi Mumbai based journalist Sandhya Jain (56), who writes on women's rights and safety, was badly injured in a hit-and-run accident recently on the Palm Beach Road, as a speeding motorcyclist jumped a red signal to crash straight into her scooter.

Shockingly, the culprit biker has not been caught due to "poor CCTV camera quality" as the registered number plate of the motorcycle could not be captured on camera on the city's landmark road stretch.

For the past nine days, Jain has been lying at Apollo Hospital at Seawoods with multiple fractures in both her hands, a nose fracture, facial trauma and various other smaller injuries. Talking to TOI from her



hospital bed, Jain said, "On May 18, I was driving my scooter in order to go to NMMC head-office at Belapur to meet a civic official for some work. As per the CCTV recordings of two cameras at the NRI Junction of Palm Beach Road, at exactly 4.39 pm, this biker wearing a maroon shirt jumped the red signal and speeded ahead

to dash into my scooter, while I was moving forward as my traffic light was green at that moment."

Jain, who edits two magazines 'Women Zone' and 'Kanchan Kanika', added that as she fell down unconscious on the busy road, the biker simply lifted his motorcycle and slyly pushed it away from the accident scene in order to escape.

Her husband, Sandeep Kumar Jain, who resides at NRI Complex, said, "It is surprising that while an FIR has been registered at NRI police station against the unknown biker for reckless driving, he has not been arrested as we do not have his vehicle number. The accident happened in broad daylight on the supposedly best road of Navi Mumbai, where several

surveillance cameras are installed."

The investigating officer (IO), Kiran Swar, of NRI police said: "We have checked some of the CCTV recordings at the time of accident in order to identify the culprit. However, the bike number plate is not properly seen in the video recordings. We are further inquiring into this matter." Commissioner of Navi Mumbai Municipal Corporation (NMMC), Kailas Shinde, told TOI: "While NMMC does have a CCTV monitoring room at our Belapur head-office, the police also have a similar CCTV control room with them. They are the primary users of CCTV in order to check various traffic violations etc. Hence, the police should have reported earlier if there is any issue.

Red alert issued as heatwave grips Telangana

HYDERABAD. (Agency)

The India Meteorological Department (IMD) has issued another red alert for several districts, warning that severe heatwave conditions are likely to continue for the next three days. The districts under red alert are Peddapalli, Jayashankar Bhupalpally, Mulugu, Bhadradri Kothagudem and Khammam.

Nights are also expected to remain unusually warm, with temperatures likely to hover around 35°C, significantly above the normal range of 28°C to 30°C. On Tuesday, the highest temperature in the state was recorded at Vemulapalle in Nalgonda district at 46.5°C. In Hyderabad, the highest temperature was recorded at Charminar at 42.5°C. Parts of the state also saw light to moderate rainfall, with Siddipet recording 4 cm.

Hyderabad also saw light to moderate showers along with thunderstorms at night. The IMD said severe heatwave conditions are likely to persist in some northern and eastern districts on Wednesday, while heatwave conditions may continue in parts of northern and eastern Telangana on Thursday.

According to the department, conditions are favourable for the southwest monsoon to advance further over parts of the southeast Arabian Sea, Comorin region, Bay of Bengal and adjoining areas during the next two to three days. The IMD stated that a north-south trough extending from south Bihar to north coastal Andhra Pradesh through Jharkhand and Odisha continues to persist at an altitude of 1.5 km above mean sea level.

Light to moderate rainfall is likely at isolated places in some districts over the next two days. However, maximum temperatures are expected to remain largely unchanged over the next three days.

Time to Dismantle the Architecture of Official Privilege

Age is just a number. Recently, a 68-year-old man was arrested for impersonating a government officer while driving an SUV fitted with a beacon light. In Mumbai, the Traffic Police booked around 80 vehicles in just two days—April 1 and 2—during a citywide crackdown on illegal beacons, fake police stickers, sirens, and counterfeit “press” tags. In Kolkata, arrests for similar offences have continued through 2025 and 2026. In Gurugram, a man was arrested for posing as an IAS officer while driving a vehicle emblazoned with “Government of India.”

A democracy should not resemble a royal procession. Yet India's roads continue to function as moving displays of power, where ordinary citizens are expected to step aside because the state believes itself superior to the very public it is meant to serve. What is revealing is that none of these impersonators pretended to be businessmen or celebrities. They chose to impersonate government officials because, in India, that identity still commands fear, obedience, and privilege. The beacon remains a shortcut to authority. And that is the real scandal. When Narendra Modi came to power in 2014, one of his most visible symbolic interventions was an attack on India's deeply entrenched VIP culture. On April 19, 2017, the government formally announced that red beacons—the notorious *lal batti*—would be removed from nearly all official vehicles. Modi described it as the end of “VIP culture” and the beginning of “EPI culture”: Every Person is Important.

For a brief moment, Indian roads looked different. Ministers removed flashing lights from their SUVs before television cameras. Convoys became smaller. The symbolism appeared powerful. But today, red and blue beacons have quietly returned—fixed illegally onto SUVs, hidden inside grilles, flashing from dashboards, and mounted on escort vehicles and private cars with no legal right to carry them. Across highways and city roads, the old message has returned: move aside, power is coming through.

The law itself is unambiguous. In its December 10, 2013 directions in SLP (C) No. 23984/2010 and 25237/2010, the Supreme Court of India directed state governments to sharply restrict the use of red lights and align regulations with the Central Motor Vehicles Rules, 1989. The Union government tightened these rules further in 2017. By May that year, red beacons had effectively been banned for almost all public officials. Only a limited group of constitutional authorities—such as the President, Vice-President, Prime Minister, Chief Justice of India, and Lok Sabha Speaker—retained restricted use while on official duty. Blue beacons were confined strictly to emergency services: ambulances, fire services, police, and disaster response vehicles. Yet the law is openly violated because enforcement remains selective. Police officers often hesitate to stop vehicles that appear official, even when they are clearly suspicious. Many would rather salute first and ask questions later. For decades, the Indian state has relied on spectacle to project authority: pilot cars, sirens, armed escorts, reserved lounges, separate entrances, sprawling bungalows, layers of protocol, and expanding security rings. The beacon sits at the centre of this culture because its symbolism is instantly understood. Even someone with no formal education recognises it as a signal that someone powerful is passing through. This culture survives because India still confuses public service with social status. Article 14 of the Constitution guarantees equality before the law. No citizen acquires a higher civic status merely by holding public office. The very concept of a “VIP” sits uneasily within a constitutional democracy. A minister is not a king. A bureaucrat is not a nobleman. A judge is not a lord. Public office is meant to signify responsibility, not superiority.

Nuclear consensus remains elusive

Non-Proliferation Treaty's Review Conference ends on a predictably disappointing note

THE 2026 Review Conference (RevCon) of the Nuclear Non-Proliferation Treaty (NPT) concluded at the United Nations in New York on May 22 without adopting a final consensus document. This is a major setback to the equitable regulation of the global nuclear domain, which is in considerable disarray due to the deep geopolitical discord among the major powers; the steady loss of trust about the intent and commitment of the five nuclear weapon states (NWS) towards disarmament; and the uncertainties induced by the emergence of new technologies, including AI (artificial intelligence) that can muddy the tenets of nuclear deterrence. The inability to reach a consensus was no surprise. It marks the third consecutive review cycle (following 2015 and 2022) to end without an agreed-upon statement among the 191 NPT member states. India, Pakistan and Israel are non-signatories to the NPT, while North Korea withdrew from the treaty in 2003. It is instructive that these four nations are nuclear weapon states, with Israel maintaining ambiguity about nuclear tests, unlike the other three. The NPT, a very unequal treaty, came into force in 1970. It sought to segregate the five nuclear haves or NWS (nuclear weapon states) — the US, erstwhile USSR (now Russia), UK, France and China — from the rest of the world, which was expected to remain non-NWS (NNWS) in perpetuity. The five NWS are also the permanent members of the UN Security Council, the P5, deemed to be the executive apex of the UN system and responsible for global peace and security. The NPT scaffolding was built around three pillars that sought to balance rights and obligations among the NWS and the NNWS — nuclear non-proliferation, disarmament and the peaceful use of nuclear energy. The five NWS agreed not to transfer nuclear weapons or help others acquire them, while the NNWS agreed not to acquire or develop nuclear weapons. The objective was to stop the spread of nuclear weapons beyond the original five. The disarmament pillar was framed as the NWS committed to pursue negotiations “in good faith” towards nuclear disarmament, leading to general and complete disarmament. This is the Article VI obligation and the reason why NNWS agreed to forgo acquiring the



apocalyptic nuclear weapon capability — the onerous promise by the NWS that existing arsenals would eventually be reduced to zero. The third pillar is the peaceful use of nuclear energy, wherein all parties have the “inalienable right” to develop nuclear energy for peaceful purposes. In return, non-nuclear states must accept IAEA (International Atomic Energy Agency) safeguards to verify that enriched material is not being diverted towards weapons. In essence, the NPT bargain was basically a template that was imposed on the NNWS

weapon capability against NNWS have also been tainted. In recent years, this has been evident in the actions of Russia and the US in the Ukraine and Iran wars, respectively. Both Ukraine and Iran have revealed the manner in which the core NPT provisions have been sullied. Paradoxically, Ukraine, which had nuclear weapons when it was part of the USSR, became a de facto NWS when the Cold War ended in December 1991; it was prevailed upon to renounce this status and become a NNWS. Solemn pledges were made that its sovereignty would not be violated, but then the February 2022 Russian invasion happened. And in the early stages of the war, Moscow engaged in not-so-subtle nuclear sabre-rattling. Iran, which is a signatory to the NPT as a NNWS and had accepted IAEA safeguards under the (P5 plus 1) negotiated nuclear deal during the Barack Obama years, was blatantly attacked by the US and Israel on “trumped-up” charges earlier this year. The “inalienable right” of a NNWS to peaceful nuclear pursuit is in tatters. India has no de jure locus apopos of the NPT since it is a non-signatory, but it has a de facto dialectical relationship with the global nuclear order. Since the 1950s, when Jawaharlal Nehru was at the helm, India was in the vanguard of global disarmament advocacy and contributed to the Partial Test Ban Treaty.

However, Delhi was cast as a nuclear outlier by the US till it became a nuclear weapon state in May 1998 and was then accorded an exceptional status in late 2008. This extraordinary *modus vivendi* was enabled in large measure

by then US President George W Bush; it has given India a distinctive perch in the global nuclear architecture. The 2026 RevCon ended on a predictably disappointing note, but the failure underscored the need to restore the sanctity of deterrence norms — it is more urgent now than ever before. The US, Russia and China have abdicated their responsibility in different ways. Alas, they are no longer the guardians they were expected to be. The world needs resolute stakeholders to repair the NPT pillars in an equitable, empathetic and consensual manner. In the mid-1960s, the Indian representative to the Eighteen-Nation Committee on Disarmament (ENDC) in Geneva, Ambassador VC Trivedi, described the nascent NPT as a means to “disarm the unarmed.”

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Wrestling justice: Vinesh verdict puts fairness above vendetta

Federations must evolve credible, transparent systems that reduce arbitrariness and inspire trust

THE Delhi High Court's decision allowing Vinesh Phogat to participate in the Asian Games trials is about more than the fate of just one athlete. It underscores that sporting institutions cannot function through opaque rules, selective application and personal vendetta. The court's sharp remarks against the Wrestling Federation of India (WFI), including its observation that the federation appeared “vindictive”, should worry everyone invested in Indian sport. Federations exist to nurture talent and ensure fairness, not to settle scores with athletes who challenge authority. The attempt to deny Vinesh a fair opportunity after her return from maternity leave and injury recovery exposed how Indian sports administration lacks transparent, humane and gender-sensitive policies. India has celebrated sporting mothers before. Mary Kom returned after motherhood to win world titles and an Olympic medal, while Sania Mirza made a successful comeback to international tennis after childbirth. Globally, champions like



Serena Williams and Allyson Felix transformed conversations around maternity rights in sport through their extraordinary post-pregnancy performances.

Motherhood, therefore, cannot become a professional handicap or an excuse for bureaucratic exclusion. The controversy also reflects the continuing fallout of the wrestlers' protest movement, where several athletes accused powerful officials of intimidation and misconduct. When outspoken sportspersons begin facing administrative roadblocks, public confidence in sporting bodies erodes rapidly.

India celebrates women athletes when they win medals, but often abandons them when they confront institutional power or biological realities such as pregnancy and recovery. Courts should not have to repeatedly intervene in athlete selection. Federations must evolve credible, transparent systems that reduce arbitrariness and inspire trust. Indian sport cannot aspire to global excellence while remaining trapped in internal politics and institutional insecurity. Athletes must be judged by merit and performance, not by their conformity or silence.

Why the Places of Worship Act matters

NATIONS progress when they address unemployment, inequality, education, public health, climate vulnerability, and the dignity of ordinary citizens. Not when they perpetually summon ghosts from history to dominate the present. The tragedy is that such disputes rarely remain confined to courtrooms. Once historical anxieties are released into public discourse, they travel rapidly into neighbourhoods, colour social relations, power electoral campaigns and seep into everyday conversations. The damage then is not merely institutional but also societal, destroying the possibility of peaceful coexistence. There are moments in the life of a republic when the letter of the law survives, but its spirit erodes through reinterpretation, circumvention and selective political invocation. The ongoing debates and litigations surrounding places of worship in India represent one such moment. The question before us is much more than legal. It is civilisational and constitutional. And it is likely to impact our nation and people in profound ways. The Places of Worship Act, 1991, was enacted in extraordinary times. It was born amidst one of the most volatile phases of post-Independence India, when communal anxieties had begun acquiring organised political expression and ‘historical grievances’ were being transformed into contemporary political mobilisations. Parliament, through this legislation, sought to draw a constitutional Lakhman Rekha. The law essentially conveyed that independent India would not become a battlefield for relitigating medieval history. At its core, the 1991 Act was an appeal for national maturity.

The wisdom of the law lay in recognising that ours is not a land of singular histories. Our cities, shrines and monuments carry layers of memory of empire-building,

trade, exchange, assimilation, coexistence, destruction and reconstruction. If every generation decides to reopen the wounds of the past in search of historical purification, the republic itself risks becoming permanently unsettled. Yet what we increasingly witness today is not so much a direct assault on the law, but a gradual weakening of its ethical and constitutional



intent. Its spirit is being bypassed through a climate where symbolic disputes are resurrected, historical claims are amplified for political mobilisation and the language of faith is deployed in ways that deepen social suspicion rather than democratic fraternity.

And the courts, which were supposed to defend the 1991 Act in letter and spirit, have appeared to waver in their commitment. Instead of treating the law as the decisive starting point, courts have increasingly anchored their reasoning in archaeological surveys, contested historical narratives and procedural workarounds, treating the statute as one consideration among many

rather than the governing rule. When the governing law becomes the final reference rather than the starting point, adjudication ceases to enforce the legislative bar and quietly enables its circumvention. The 1991 Act prohibits the conversion of the religious character of a place of worship and imposes an obligation on the state to maintain that character as it existed on August 15, 1947. The law preserves non-retrogression as an essential feature of our secular values. However, the recent decision of the MP High Court and several similar petitions pending in courts across India eviscerate the very core of the law. One must ask: what exactly is the republic attempting to achieve through this excavation of contested pasts? No democracy can move forward if governance becomes captive to civilisational score-settling. India's constitutional vision was never based on historical amnesia. The Constitution does not ask citizens to forget history; it asks them not to become captive to it. There is a difference between remembering history and weaponising it. BR Ambedkar warned that constitutional morality requires restraint, especially from those who wield political and institutional power. Restraint is not a synonym for weakness; it is the highest expression of democratic confidence. In deeply diverse societies, peace is sustained by a collective willingness to avoid converting every difference into perpetual conflict. The Places of Worship Act is about protecting the future from the burdens of an endlessly litigated past. It is an assurance that generations born after Independence would not inherit an India consumed by retrospective vengeance, and would, instead, march forward with peace and progress as the guiding lights.

What is equally worrying today is the normalisation of a

discourse where constitutional guarantees are increasingly evaluated through majoritarian sentiment. The republic cannot function on shifting emotional majorities. Let us reaffirm that constitutionalism, by definition, exists to provide stability against the volatility of passions. That is why the idea of India cannot be reduced to a project of historical rectification. A civilisation like India could survive invasions, colonialism, partitions and upheavals only because it possessed the ethical confidence to move without being consumed by inherited or manufactured grievances. Its continuity rested not upon revenge, but upon renewal.

The challenge before contemporary India is whether it possesses the democratic wisdom and civilisational maturity not to embark upon the perilous path of collective self-destruction. For, once the spirit of reconciliation is replaced by the politics of endless reclamation, there may never be any logical or moral point of closure. History across the world, is an infinite archive of wounds, conquests, humiliations and displacements. Every civilisation carries scars, but no modern republic can survive if each inherited wound is transformed into a perpetual political project.

The danger lies precisely here: when the past becomes the primary site of political legitimacy, the future becomes a casualty. Societies then cease to govern themselves through constitutional reason and begin navigating through accumulated resentments. Such resentments, unfortunately, are never in short supply in a diverse country like India. In this cycle of retribution, the republic risks exhausting itself in the endless management of inherited anger, suspicion and grievance. The Members of Parliament who framed the Places of Worship Act understood this danger with remarkable foresight and sobriety.

Bakrid goat dispute triggers communal tension at Mumbai's Mira Road housing society, 200 police deployed

Bajrang Dal activists clashed with Muslim residents at a housing society after objections to goats being brought in for Eid ul Adha sacrifice; the animals have since been moved out.

A simmering dispute over goats brought into a residential complex for Eid ul Adha sacrifice escalated into communal tension at Mira Road on Tuesday, prompting heavy police deployment after right-wing activists staged protests outside the housing society and clashes broke out between members of the two communities.

Tension flared at a residential complex in Mira Road ahead of Eid ul Adha, popularly known as Bakrid, after a dispute broke out over more than 50 goats being housed within the society premises, prompting heavy police deployment and detention of several persons. The unrest began at Poonam Cluster 1 on Monday

night after residents and right-wing activists objected to the construction of a temporary shed for sacrificial goats inside the housing complex. The society, which consists of over 550 flats, is a mixed-population locality with several Muslim families residing there. Locals said that over the last few years, Muslim families had been bringing sacrificial animals, especially goats, which are tied in sheds and later sacrificed during Eid. As per earlier rules, municipal corporations have the authority to grant temporary permission for sacrifice in housing society common areas if certain conditions are met, including hygiene, sanitation and the absence of nearby licensed slaughter facilities. "This



has been happening in the society for quite a few years, with goats being tied and even slaughtered. However, a section of the residents has opposed this for some time and a similar issue had occurred last time as well. Many residents feel uncomfortable with slaughter taking place and goats being moved around in the

society, and the problem escalated on Monday," a resident of the society, who did not wish to be named, said.

The issue escalated on Monday night when a section of residents called Bajrang Dal activists into the society complex to intervene in the matter. According to police, around 10 pm, local Bajrang Dal leader Pawan Thakur and several activists reached the society and asked residents to remove the animals, leading to an argument.

Around two hours later, Bajrang Dal functionary Nagnath Kamble arrived at the complex with supporters. At around 12.50 am on Tuesday, an unidentified man allegedly attempted to attack Kamble with a knife from behind. Harsh Singh, another

Bajrang Dal activist who was standing nearby, intervened and suffered injuries to his left hand while trying to stop the attacker.

In his complaint, Singh alleged that he and others tried to catch the suspect, but the man assaulted him and fled the spot. Singh was later taken to hospital for treatment. Story continues below. Subscribe to see few ads.

Based on his statement, the Kashmiri police registered an FIR against an unidentified person under relevant sections of the Bharatiya Nyaya Sanhita (BNS). Following the incident, police deployed more than 200 personnel around the residential complex and nearby areas to prevent any escalation.

CBI records statements of Twisha kin, conducts matrimonial home study

BHOPAL. (Agency)

Hours after taking over the probe into the May 12 alleged dowry death of model-actor Twisha Sharma, a team of CBI Special Crime Unit-III from Delhi started investigations on the ground in Madhya Pradesh capital Bhopal on Tuesday.

The CBI team comprising two female sleuths conducted a study of the crime scene – the terrace of Twisha's matrimonial house in the Katara Hills area, where the 33-year-old Twisha was allegedly found hanging to death on the night of May 12. The team also analysed other parts of the house.

Twisha's mother-in-law Giribala and husband Samarth are both accused in the suspected dowry death case registered by the CBI on Monday evening on the basis of the Bhopal Police's FIR in the case, which was registered on May 15.

After Twisha's matrimonial house in Katara Hills area, the CBI team drove around 25 km to the 3 EME Centre of the Indian Army, where they met Twisha's parents, army officer brother Major Harshit Sharma and recorded their statements.

The CBI team stood at the Kurukshetra officer's mess of the 3 EME Centre in Bhopal's Bairagarh area for around two and half hours. Subsequently, the Bhopal Police's SIT formally handed over the case diary and investigation-related records, including forensic analysis documents, post-mortem reports, witness statements and digital evidence, to the CBI team. A source privy to Tuesday's developments claimed that the CBI team wasn't satisfied with the head of Katara Hills Police Station, particularly as the documents weren't arranged in the right sequence.

Driver 'sidelined' from RTC work for remarks on paddy purchase in Telangana

KARIMNAGAR/JAGTIAL. (Agency)

A political row broke out in Jagtial after a driver operating a private bus hired by the TGSRTC was reportedly withdrawn from duty following his remarks on paddy procurement issues.

B Ashok, attached to the Jagtial RTC depot, was operating a private hire bus TS21-T 5006 on the Jagtial-Dharmapuri route while Congress leaders, including SC Welfare Minister Adhuri Laxman Kumar, were staging a protest against the recent hike in fuel prices.

Ashok reportedly remarked that leaders should focus on paddy and maize procurement instead of protesting against fuel price hikes. His comments triggered objections from Congress leaders, who later complained to RTC authorities.

Following the complaint, the RTC Jagtial depot manager reportedly issued notices to the bus owner, Chukka Venugopal, asking for Ashok to be withdrawn from RTC duties. Sources said Ashok was not a regular RTC employee. The issue soon took a political turn, with BRS leaders, led by Karimnagar MLA Gangula Kamalakar and senior leader T Jeevan Reddy, meeting RTC regional officials in Karimnagar and demanding that Ashok not be removed from RTC-related work.

In a video released later, Ashok clarified that his remarks were not directed against any political party or leader. He said he had only spoken informally to someone from his village about the difficulties being faced by farmers. "I did not criticise any leader. I only spoke about the welfare of farmers," Ashok said, adding that he was later informed by RTC officials not to report for duty and that work would not be allotted to him in five depots.

A week after tiger attack, Maharashtra Wildlife board approves Rs 260 cr plan to prevent human-wildlife conflict

Mumbai. (Agency)

In its bid to prevent human-wildlife conflict, the State Wildlife Board Standing Committee has approved the establishment of control rooms at ten locations in the first phase, the deployment of an AI-based alert system in one thousand villages and the creation of two rescue centers and ten treatment centers across the state. This project valued at approximately Rs 260 crore, aims to curb wildlife attacks on humans, said committee chairman and Forest Minister Ganesh Naik.

Last week, four women were killed after they were mauled by a tigress and her cubs in Chandrapur district. The incident marks the seventh fatal tiger attack reported from the district this year. As per the action plan, ten control rooms, modeled after police



control rooms, will be established in various parts of the state. These control rooms will be equipped with cutting-edge digital systems to track Forest Department resources, vehicles, and patrol units. Minister Naik stated that in the event of a human-wildlife conflict, these control rooms will immediately alert relevant parties to initiate necessary actions.

To ensure villagers are informed when wild animals are detected outside forest areas, an AI-based alert system—already implemented on a pilot basis in villages adjacent to forests—will now be expanded to about one thousand villages across the state.

This will provide villagers with immediate information regarding animal movements, allowing them to remain vigilant. Additionally, rescue centers will be built for captured wildlife, and ten transit treatment centers will be established for animal medical care. Twenty rapid rescue teams will be formed to assist in the rescue of wild animals. To protect forest-fringe villages, two thousand primary response teams will be created to support the Forest Department.

He then travelled to Dwarka with his driver Ramesh in an Innova car. Near a CNG pump in Sector 23, a Maruti car allegedly guided him to the meeting location. Upon reaching the premises, Nanda allegedly found Bhagat, who had earlier supplied vegetables to him, along with three associates. Police said the accused assaulted him with sticks and robbed him of a diamond ring and Rs 27,000 at knife-point. According to the FIR, the accused also forced Nanda to sign documents acknowledging payment of Rs 11 lakh towards alleged vegetable dues. Police alleged that Bhagat then chopped off both thumbs of the victim with a knife before the accused fled the spot. Nanda later reached DDU Hospital, after which police registered the

case on March 18, 2020. During investigation, three co-accused — identified as Jitender, Amardeep and Gautam — were arrested by local police, while Bhagat remained absconding for over six years. Delhi Police said the Crime Branch team used technical surveillance and local intelligence to trace the accused. Acting on a tip-off received on May 15, the team reached Purnia in Bihar and apprehended Bhagat after laying a trap. During interrogation, Bhagat allegedly confessed to his involvement in the crime and told police he had been changing locations to evade arrest. Police said Bhagat studied till Class 5 and earlier worked as a vegetable vendor before becoming a wholesale vegetable trader at Azadpur Subzi Mandi in 2015. He was reportedly running a grocery shop in Purnia at the time of his arrest.

Uganda-returned woman, isolated in Bengaluru, tests negative for Ebola

New Delhi.(Agency)

In a major relief for health authorities and the public in India, the test results of a 28-year-old woman who returned from Uganda and was isolated in Bengaluru due to a suspected Ebola infection have returned negative. Following the test result, the Centre confirmed that no case of Ebola Virus Disease (EVD) has been detected in the country so far. The woman, who had recently travelled from an Ebola-affected region in Africa and later developed mild symptoms such as body ache, had been shifted to the state-run Epidemic Diseases Hospital in Bengaluru as a precautionary measure amid heightened global concern over the outbreak. The Ministry of Health and Family Welfare said the woman was placed under isolation "as a matter of abundant caution" after reporting symptoms. A sample was subsequently sent

to the National Institute of Virology (NIV), Pune, for laboratory testing.

"The test result has returned negative for Ebola Virus Disease," the ministry said, adding that "No case of Ebola Virus Disease has been confirmed in India".

NO SEVERE SYMPTOMS OBSERVED Officials said the woman remained stable throughout observation and did not exhibit severe symptoms associated with the disease. As per established health protocols, authorities initiated monitoring and isolation procedures because of her recent travel history to Uganda, one of the countries affected by the ongoing Ebola outbreak. The government previously issued an advisory for its citizens to avoid all kinds of non-essential travel to countries, including the Democratic Republic of Congo, Uganda, and South Sudan, where over 220 suspected deaths

due to Ebola have been reported.

The development comes at a time when governments and health agencies across the world are on alert following the World Health Organization's declaration of the Ebola outbreak in these countries as a "Public Health Emergency of International Concern" (PHEIC).

The Africa Centres for Disease Control and Prevention has also designated the outbreak as a "Public Health Emergency of Continental Security" (PHECS).

HEALTH MINISTER REVIEWS PREPAREDNESS

In response to the global situation, Union Health Minister JP Nadda reviewed India's preparedness and surveillance mechanisms in a high-level meeting with senior officials. During the review, Nadda



directed authorities to ensure that Ebola screening arrangements at all airports, seaports and land border crossings remain "fully vigilant and robust". He also instructed the Indian Council of Medical Research (ICMR) and the National Centre for Disease Control (NCDC) to maintain readiness for "tracking, testing, and surveillance" in case of any suspected

infections.

Following Nadda's directions, the Union Health Secretary chaired a joint review meeting involving multiple ministries and concerned agencies to strengthen coordination and response mechanisms.

INDIA STEPS UP VIGIL

The Centre has also advised all states and Union Territories to intensify surveillance, hospital preparedness and screening of international travellers arriving from affected regions. In Karnataka, the health department has already activated precautionary protocols. Authorities have advised people returning from Ebola-affected countries to monitor their health and self-observe for 21 days. Rapid Response Teams (RRTs) have also been tasked with surveillance and contact monitoring activities.

The CIA, the T-72, and the Delhi Gymkhana Club - a Cold War tale

New Delhi.(Agency)

New Delhi's 113-year old Delhi Gymkhana club has been asked to vacate its premises by June 5, 2026. The eviction notice from the central government cites 'national security, defense infrastructure' and 'urgent public interest' in taking over the 27-acre club, located a stone's throw away from the Prime Minister's residence on 7 Lok Kalyan Marg. The club with its manicured lawns, two dozen tennis courts, a swimming pool, a wooden-floored ballroom, and multiple bars, serves Delhi's elite. Nearly fifty years ago, the club was also a drop site for the egregious leak of Indian military secrets. This incident was detailed in granular detail in 'See No Evil', the 2002 autobiography of a former CIA agent Robert Baer.

The Gymkhana Club then was one of the places where spies disguised as diplomats could mingle with Indian officials, bypassing government rules forbidding contact with foreign nationals. Spies could also enter the club and shake off determined 'tails' from India's Intelligence Bureau. The story began in the late 1970s with the arrival of Baer, a freshly minted CIA agent to the US Embassy. The Cold War was then at its peak. NATO and Warsaw Pact armies stood ranged against each other, on hair-trigger alert, across Europe. Among the growing mass of military hardware were some cutting edge Soviet platforms that caused the West serious worry. If the Cold War burst into a hot war, titanium-hulled Alfa class interceptor submarines would barrel down the Atlantic Ocean to hunt NATO warships, stratosphere-skimming MiG-25 'Foxbats' would shoot down US bombers, and on the ground, a new battle tank, the T-72 would lead Soviet armoured spearheads across the Fulda Gap into West Germany. The Pentagon and the CIA pursued these advancements in Soviet hardware with relentless zeal—to understand their capabilities, detect their vulnerabilities and field countermeasures.

Centre gets HC nod to resume eviction process of Race Club in central Delhi

New Delhi.(Agency)

The Delhi High Court on Tuesday allowed the Central government to resume eviction proceedings against the Delhi Race Club from its 53-acre government land in central Delhi. A bench of Chief Justice Devendra Kumar Upadhyaya and Justice Tejas Karia allowed the Centre's appeal against the interim protection granted earlier by a single judge.

The two-judge bench passed the order after the government submitted that the club had directly approached the high court even though the matter was still at the notice stage and no final eviction order had been passed yet. The dispute relates to around 53 acres of government land on Lok Kalyan Marg, occupied by the Delhi Race Club. The Centre told the court that the Public Premises Act already provided a process where the estate officer first hears the matter and any aggrieved party can later file an appeal.

"The questions, such as whether the lease still exists, whether the occupation is authorised and the effect of past payments, should first be examined by the estate officer.

The respondent (club) cannot, merely by asserting a subsisting lease, oust the jurisdiction of the estate officer or seek quashing of the show cause notice at the threshold," the Centre told the court.

It claimed that the original lease for the land was granted in 1926 for 25 years, with extensions possible subject to conditions and approval. The Centre said the last extension expired on December 31, 1994, and was never renewed after that.

A single judge on April 24 stopped the estate officer from proceeding further on a show-cause notice issued to the club on April 17. The notice had asked the club to explain why eviction proceedings should not be initiated against it.

The judge had restrained the Union Ministry of Housing and Urban Affairs from taking "forcible possession" of the Club at Kamal Ataturk Marg, as well as the Jaipur Polo Ground in the Race Course area. The judge had noted that the race club has been operating on the 53.242-acre premises since a lease was first granted in 1926.

Deletion of name in SIR doesn't end citizenship: Supreme Court's big order

Upholding the legality of the Special Intensive Revision (SIR), the Supreme Court on Wednesday said that the deletion of names from electoral rolls under the exercise does not determine citizenship. The verdict is crucial as the petitioners and the opposition had argued that the SIR exercise, which is being conducted by the Election Commission, was a citizenship verification exercise by backdoor.

On the larger question of whether ECI can determine citizenship, a bench of Chief Justice Surya Kant and

Justice Joymalya Bagchi underlined a key rider. The court said the ECI could examine the same, but from

The verdict came on a batch of petitions challenging the legality of the SIR process, which required voters whose names were absent from the 2002/2003 electoral rolls to establish ancestral linkage to a person whose name appeared in that list. The ECI defended the exercise as necessary to cleanse voter rolls and verify citizenship claims.

However, the petitioners argued that the determination of citizenship through SIR was not within the poll body's mandate.

Supreme Court upholds SIR, says it advances free and fair elections

New Delhi.(Agency)

In a shot in the arm for the Election Commission of India, the Supreme Court on Wednesday upheld its Special Intensive Revision (SIR) of electoral rolls as "legally tenable", ruling that the exercise advances the constitutional imperative of free and fair elections. The verdict comes just days before the third and final phase of the SIR begins on May 30 across 16 states and three Union Territories, where fresh verification and revision of voter rolls are set to be carried out by the poll panel.

A bench led by Chief Justice of India Surya Kant and Justice Joymalya Bagchi examined whether the EC had the powers under Article 326 of the Constitution, the Representation



of the People Act, 1950, and related rules to conduct the exercise in its present form.

"We are equally satisfied that the object sought to be achieved by the SIR bears a direct nexus to the constitutional goal of free and fair elections," the Chief Justice said while pronouncing the verdict.

"The impugned SIR does not detract from the constitutional obligation of free and fair elections," the court added while upholding the exercise

introduced in Bihar and later extended to other states.

The bench said the SIR did not override existing election laws. "Rather, it breathes life into the constitutional mandate under Article 324 within the precise statutory contours provided by Section 21(3)," it stated. "Therefore, it cannot be said that the Commission has acted in excess of its statutory powers," it added.

The top court made it clear that the exercise could not be struck down merely because its procedure differed from the ordinary revision process. The ruling was a setback for opposition parties, who have furiously opposed the revision process due to its timing and the fear of wrongful deletions.

India has more cities than it knows of. Why are they hiding in plain sight?

Are there other Lucknow, Pune and Rajkot than we know of? India might have far more cities than the government's numbers acknowledge. A working paper released by the Economic Advisory Council to the Prime Minister (EAC-PM) argues that India's actual level of urbanisation is significantly higher than what government data suggests. The paper says it impacts the residents because panchayats are forced to deal with urban issues, like waste management and traffic, that they aren't equipped to handle. Titled India's Hidden Urbanisation & Its Policy Implications, the paper by EAC-PM member Shamika Ravi and consultants Manuj Joshi and Apurv Kumar Mishra contends that millions of Indians live in settlements

that function like towns and cities but remain officially classified as rural.

According to Census 2011, only 31.1% of Indians lived in urban areas. But the paper cites satellite-based estimates showing India might already have been 63% urban in 2015.

The authors of the paper warn that the gap between administrative labelling and the ground realities is distorting governance, public spending and infrastructure planning.

The debate has acquired fresh relevance because the Registrar General of India has proposed retaining the 2011 definition of urban areas for Census 2027 to ensure comparability across decades. The authors of the paper, however, argue that

India's urban transition has outpaced the urban-rural definitions devised half a century ago. The concern over hidden urbanisation or hidden urban sports in

population was already giving in urban-like areas in the 2010s. It highlighted that a large degree of "hidden urbanisation" was beyond legal city limits.

INDIA'S CITIES ARE HIDING IN PLAIN SIGHT? BUT HOW?

The EAC-PM paper's central argument is that India is urbanising much faster than its administrative systems are recognising cities and towns.

It notes that the classification of human settlements as urban or rural determines governance structures, eligibility for schemes and allocation of public resources. Yet

many places that have urban characteristics (factories, shops, offices, transport, construction or services rather than farming) remain officially rural.



India is not entirely new. The World Bank's Agglomeration Index (published in 2015), developed by economists Uchida Hirotsugu and Andrew Nelson, estimated that 55.3% of India's

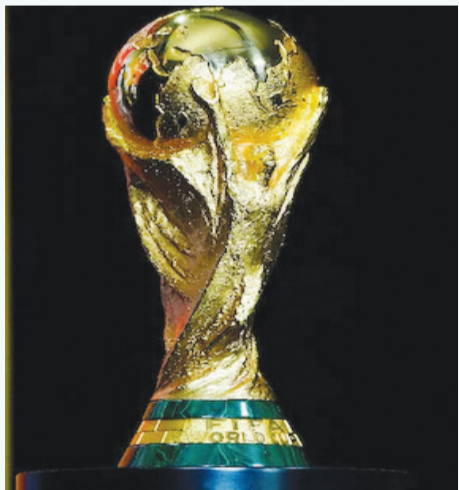

Zee Entertainment in talks with FIFA over World Cup broadcast rights in India

India's Zee Entertainment Enterprises is in talks with FIFA to acquire the streaming and broadcast rights for the 2026 FIFA World Cup in India, the company said in a statement on Tuesday. The move comes at a significant moment for the Indian sports broadcasting market, with negotiations between FIFA and the Reliance-Disney joint venture currently at a deadlock, just weeks before the tournament is scheduled to begin on June 11, 2026. The revised valuation still remains substantially higher than the reported \$20 million offer made by the Reliance-Disney combine, led by Mukesh Ambani's Reliance Industries. Japan's Sony Group Corporation had also explored the possibility of bidding for the India rights. However, Sony eventually chose not to make a formal offer for the FIFA package. Zee disclosed its discussions with FIFA during the launch of "Unite8 Sports", a dedicated portfolio of sports channels that the company said would strengthen its sports offerings and expand its reach among Indian audiences. The broadcaster has been looking to grow its sports business amid rising competition in India's media and streaming market, where premium sporting properties continue to play a major role in subscriber growth and advertising revenues. FIFA had previously said that it had already concluded broadcast agreements across more than 180 territories globally, though the India rights remain unresolved despite the country's rapidly expanding digital sports audience and increasing interest in football. India accounted for 2.9 per cent of the global linear television reach of the 2022 FIFA World Cup in Qatar, underlining the market's growing importance for international football broadcasters and rights holders.

After all, SRH remain the only team since 2016 to win the IPL after featuring in the Eliminator, and they would love to believe that "2026 is the new 2016" is more than just a banter. While Vaibhav has become the face of RR's late-season surge, Sunrisers Hyderabad quietly arrive with a serious psychological edge. They have already beaten Rajasthan twice this season and are currently riding a six-match winning streak against them dating back to 2022. The first meeting saw SRH dismantle RR by 57 runs in Hyderabad with Praful Hinge and Sakib Hussain combining for eight wickets. The second clash in Jaipur looked different only because Vaibhav exploded for a stunning 36-ball century, but even that ultimately ended in another SRH victory. RR only sealed their playoff berth on the final weekend after back-to-back wins over struggling opponents, recovering from a phase where even stand-in captain Riyan Parag admitted the side did not deserve a top-

four place if they continued playing the way they were. SRH, meanwhile, missed out on the top two partly because of that shocking 86 all out against Gujarat Titans, the collapse that ultimately damaged their net run rate



beyond repair. Which means both teams arrive with unfinished business.

One side wants to prove the teenage phenomenon can survive playoff pressure. The other wants to remind everyone why its batting lineup remains the scariest in the tournament.

VAIBHAV SOORYAVANSHI VS SRH'S HIT SQUAD

At 15, Vaibhav Sooryavanshi has already produced one of the wildest debut IPL seasons ever seen. The left-hander from Bihar has smashed 583 runs in 14 innings at a strike rate of 232.27, turning almost every powerplay into controlled madness. His 93 off 38 balls against Lucknow Super Giants remains one of the standout knocks of IPL 2026, while his 36-ball century against SRH officially turned him into the tournament's breakout superstar.

But playoffs are a different beast altogether. Every weakness gets examined harder. Every risky shot suddenly carries more consequence. And SRH probably have the exact bowling attack needed to test whether Vaibhav's fearless approach survives knockout pressure. Pat Cummins barely bowled at Vaibhav during that Jaipur century, sending down only four deliveries that disappeared for eight runs. It would be surprising if that happens again. SRH are expected to attack him much earlier this time with Cummins' hard lengths, Sakib Hussain's variations and potentially Harshal Patel returning as the Impact option.

Ranked 148th in the world, Basavareddy produced the biggest win of his young career on his Roland Garros main-draw debut, winning 7-6(5), 7-6(5), 6-7(9), 6-1 on Court Suzanne Lenglen.

Sportspersons' role in National Sports Board unclear

The NSB is going to be the sole authority that will grant recognition to National Sports Bodies including the Indian Olympic Association and Paralympic Committee of India

After notifying the National Sports Governance Act early this year, the Union government has notified the National Sports Governance Rules pertaining to National Sports Board (NSB) and National Sports Tribunal (NST) — the two legal arms of the sports ministry to settle dispute of various sports bodies, athletes and other

stakeholders. What seems interesting is that the gazette notification is silent on sportspersons holding office in any of the above bodies. Even the NSG Act does not



throw enough light on sportspersons' role in the board and says, "The Chairperson and the Members referred to in sub-section (1) shall be appointed by the Central Government from amongst persons of ability, integrity and standing who possess special knowledge or practical

experience in the field of public administration, sports governance, sports law and other related fields, on the recommendation of a search-cum-selection committee comprising of such number of persons, having wide experience in public administration, sports administration and recipients of national sports awards, as may be prescribed." Going by the government notification, an NSB chairperson's position will be equivalent to a secretary with the government of India, while members would be that of additional secretary. Even their salaries will depend on their positions held when they come to

office. Basically, it will be an extension of government service in the secretary and additional secretary level. Notification also states that a person from statutory and autonomous body is also eligible to hold office.

THE SUPERSTAR TRAP This superstar-centric failure is not unique to cricket. The sporting world is littered with "video game line-ups" that fall completely

flat in reality. Take football's most famous experiment: Real Madrid's Galacticos era in the early 2000s. Despite boasting Ronaldo Nazario, Luis Figo, David Beckham, and Zinedine Zidane under one roof, this visually stunning group famously weren't able to be actually crowned the best in Europe — meaning they did not win the Champions League together. The squad lacked balance, defensive workhorses, and structural cohesion.

A modern parallel emerged at Paris Saint-Germain. Pairing Lionel Messi, Kylian Mbappé, and Neymar Jr. alongside seasoned winners like Sergio Ramos and Achraf Hakimi created a marketing juggernaut, yet they did not live up to the billing either, routinely crumbling in Europe. Coincidentally, when both teams ended up overlooking the superstars and building an actual team, that's when they found success. RCB found themselves in that exact same boat. They possessed the ultimate draw cards, but they lacked a functional engine room.



India Women's pre-T20 World Cup checklist: Key areas to fix in England series

Air India, BigBasket, Tata Electronics: Inside Tata Sons' key boardroom discussions

Tata Sons' latest board meeting stayed calm as operating chiefs answered questions on Air India, BigBasket and other businesses. The discussions showed tighter scrutiny of profits, capital allocation and the group's long-term strategic bets.

The latest board meeting of Tata Sons may have appeared calm on the surface, but several difficult conversations around losses, investments and strategy continued to dominate discussions inside the Tata Group. The meeting had drawn unusual attention after reports that the previous board interaction earlier this year had become tense, with tough questions being raised over the financial performance of key Tata businesses, including Air India and BigBasket, reported The Economic Times (ET).

This time, however, the atmosphere was calmer. According to the report, Tata Sons chairman Natarajan Chandrasekaran adopted a different approach during the meeting by allowing operating company chiefs to directly explain the status of their businesses to

board members and trustees.

The report said Chandra largely "gave the floor" to Tata company executives and encouraged them to answer questions directly instead of centralising discussions around himself.

That change in style appears to have helped reduce friction and keep the focus on business performance and future plans. Still, beneath the calmer mood, the discussions reflected growing scrutiny within the Tata Group around investment discipline, profitability and capital allocation.

AIR INDIA REMAINED AT THE CENTRE OF DISCUSSIONS

One of the biggest focus areas during the meeting was Air India, according to the ET report. Board members reportedly

sought detailed updates on the airline's operational performance, integration process, fleet expansion plans and the



long road towards profitability.

The airline continues to be one of Tata Group's most expensive and strategically important bets after the conglomerate

acquired it from the Indian government. The report suggested that concerns remain around how much capital Air India may continue to require and how quickly the business can improve financially.

The Tata Group has already committed billions of dollars towards aircraft orders, fleet modernisation, technology upgrades, route expansion, and integration of Air India with Vistara and AirAsia India operations. The report suggested that board members wanted greater visibility into returns on these investments and the airline's long-term financial trajectory. Air India's losses and capital requirements had reportedly become one of the sharper points of discussion in earlier meetings too.

Sensex, Nifty open flat as Middle East tensions keep investors cautious

Benchmark stock market indices opened flat on Wednesday as investors remained cautious over the fragile ceasefire between the US and Iran and rising tensions in the Middle East.

The S&P BSE Sensex slipped 22.10 points, or 0.03%, to 75,987.60 in early trade, while the NSE Nifty50 declined 6.95 points, or 0.03%, to 23,906.75.

Investor sentiment remained subdued after Iran accused the US of violating the ceasefire by striking targets near the Strait of Hormuz, raising concerns that the three-month-long conflict may continue. Adding to worries, Israel launched more than 120 air strikes on Lebanon on Tuesday, according to Lebanese security sources. Iran has reportedly demanded an end to Israeli attacks in Lebanon as part of any broader peace agreement. The Indian rupee also weakened slightly, opening 0.07% lower at 95.75 against the US dollar, compared to its previous close of 95.68.

Broader markets traded higher despite the cautious mood. The Nifty Midcap 100 gained 0.43%, while the Nifty Smallcap 100 rose 0.35%. India VIX edged up 0.23%.

Among sectoral indices, Nifty Metal emerged as the top gainer, rising 1.48%,



while Nifty Media advanced 0.76%. Nifty Realty gained 0.50%, and Nifty Consumer Durables climbed 0.47%. Nifty Auto and Nifty PSU Bank also traded in the green. However, Nifty Oil & Gas declined 0.55%, while Nifty

Private Bank slipped 0.38% and Nifty Financial Services fell 0.32%.

Among Sensex stocks, NTPC led the gainers, rising 2.97%. Eternal Ltd climbed 1.62%, while Adani Ports and Special Economic Zone gained 1.16%. Power Grid Corporation advanced 1.13%. Asian Paints and Tata Steel also traded higher.

On the losing side, HDFC Bank dropped 1.57%, Infosys declined 0.61%, Bharat Electronics slipped 0.42%, Bharti Airtel fell 0.27%, and Reliance Industries was down 0.19% in early trade. Dr VK Vijayakumar, Chief Investment Strategist, Geojit Investments Limited, said, "With S&P 500, Nasdaq and Nikkei setting new records and KOSPI and Taiex getting bought on declines the bull rally in these markets is showing no signs of losing steam. So long as this trend continues, Indian market will remain on the back foot weighed down by FII selling."

From Messi to mounting lawsuits: Inside the collapse of Byju's empire

A Singapore court sentenced Byju Raveendran to six months in jail for contempt over asset-related orders. The ruling sharpens focus on Byju's steep fall from a \$22 billion edtech darling to a company facing debt, lawsuits and insolvency proceedings.

There was a time when Lionel Messi became the global ambassador of Byju's, a move that showed just how big India's most celebrated edtech startup had become. The company's logo appeared on the Indian cricket team's jersey. Global investors poured billions into the startup. Founder Byju Raveendran became one of the biggest faces of India's startup boom. Today, the same founder is facing a six-month jail sentence in Singapore.

The dramatic fall of Byju's, once valued at \$22 billion, is now being seen as one of the biggest collapses in India's startup history.

What began as a fast-growing education technology success story slowly spiralled into delayed audits, mounting debt, angry investors, insolvency proceedings, cross-border lawsuits and accusations of fund diversion. The latest setback came after a Singapore court sentenced Raveendran to six months in prison for contempt over disobeying court orders linked to his assets. But the story of Byju's collapse had started much earlier.

HOW BYJU'S BECAME INDIA'S BIGGEST EDTECH STAR

Founded in 2011 as Think & Learn Pvt Ltd, Byju's rapidly grew by tapping into India's massive demand for education and competitive exam preparation. The timing worked perfectly.

As smartphones spread across India and online learning became mainstream, the company positioned itself as the future of education.

Then came the Covid-19 pandemic. Schools shut down, students moved online and demand for digital education exploded. Investors rushed in with funding and Byju's expanded aggressively across India and international markets.

The company acquired several firms including Aakash Educational Services, Great Learning and Epic in deals reportedly worth nearly \$3 billion.

Its growth story looked unstoppable. The company launched massive advertising campaigns, signed celebrity endorsements and expanded globally at breakneck speed. The appointment of

Messi as a global ambassador became one of the clearest symbols of how ambitious the company had become.

LOAN THAT CHANGED EVERYTHING The turning point came in November 2021 when Byju's raised a massive \$1.2 billion term loan from overseas lenders.



At the time, the deal was celebrated as proof that Indian startups had entered the global big league. But that same loan later became the centre of the company's crisis.

Lenders began questioning the company's governance standards and transparency after delays in filing audited financial statements. The situation worsened when the

company's FY21 financial results eventually revealed losses of around Rs 4,588 crore. Investor confidence started weakening rapidly. Then came one of the biggest warning signs.

Audit firm Deloitte resigned after citing delays in financial statements and communication issues. Later, BDO Global's India affiliate also stepped down.

The exits triggered deeper concerns among investors and lenders about the company's financial management. ALLEGATIONS OF HIDDEN MONEY AND GLOBAL COURT BATTLES

By late 2022 and early 2023, relations between Byju's and its lenders had collapsed. According to the report, lenders accused the company of breaching loan conditions and later alleged that nearly \$533 million linked to the loan had been moved without proper disclosure.

The legal battle soon spread across multiple countries. US lenders launched cases in Delaware and New York courts while Singapore emerged as another major legal battleground.

Let me set the record straight once and for all. There is no alimony. There are no disputes. There is no third party involved."

He added, "Mouni and I chose to part ways together, with mutual respect and with full consideration for each other's well-being. That is the truth. Everything else being reported is fiction, and in some cases, a deliberate attempt to vilify two people who have done nothing but ask to be left alone."

He further added, "I want to state this clearly and finally: there is no truth to any of the claims being made about either of us, or about any third party. Dragging other people into this is not cool. Specially innocent friends who have nothing to do with this. Mouni and I have both conducted ourselves with dignity through this period and we expect that same dignity to be extended to us by those reporting on it."

Suraj further wrote, "Media houses have chosen to fabricate narratives that do not exist. These reports have been published without a shred of verification, which is highly unfair. I am calling this out clearly and directly, because staying silent in the face of deliberate misinformation is not something I am willing to do." "Our joint statement said everything that needed to be said. I request everyone to honour it and to allow both of us the space to move forward in peace. Thank you," he concluded.
